1988 ANNUAL PEANUT FESTIVAL - SEPT. 17

Our city will celebrate its Centennial (100th) year in conjunction with the Third Annual Peanut Festival which was renewed in 1986 following a 30 year layoff.

The Gorman Business Alliance formed in 1986 to try to help put the "Go" back in our town, organized the Peanut Festival two years ago. The first two festivals have been fantastic successes, and this year's

event on Saturday, September 17th promises to be even better than the previous two.

There will be booths opening at 10 a. m. The big parade will get underway at 11 a. m. followed by many activities during the day. There will be all kinds of games and contests for all ages to enjoy and keep folks busy all during the day and night.

There will be all kinds of food booths for a variety of foods, and the Senior Citizens will serve stew cobbler from 11 a. m. to 2 p. m. in the Senior Citizens Center.

The Lions Club will be serving those famous "Lion Burgers", sausage-on-a-stick, pickles, cold drinks, etc.

Those entering the parade should gather at the football field parking

lot in time to let the judges get a better look at the entries and judge the winners. Floats and entries to be judged should be on the parking lot by 9:30. Leading the Parade as Grand Marshal will be Laurie Stevens of KRBC-TV in Abilene.

Those entering the pets and decorated bicycles in the parade are to meet at the Texas Federal Inspection Building lot, just south of Smith Bros. Chevrolet.

Baked items for the Peanut Baking Contest may be brought to the Senior Citizens Center from 8 a. m. to 12.

There will be two performances of the "Old Fashioned Shoot-Out", with the first one at 1:30 and the second at 4:30 p. m.

There will also be all kinds of peanut contests.

Judging of the peanut bakery contest will be at 1 p. m. (Judges only). Baked goods will be displayed in Business Alliance booth following judging.

The Beard Contest will be judged at 10 a. m. with the winners being presented trophies at 1:15 p. m.

At 2 there will be peanut games for all ages. Also the Gorman Do-Better Boys Band will perform.

At 3 p. m. Ike Whitson will perform. At 4 p. m. winners of the peanut contests will be announced. Then at 4:30 there will be another "Shoot-Out".

At 5 p. m. the Gorman Ret Hots

gymnasts will perform, followed by a presentation of the Square Dancers at 6 p. m.

An auction of baked goods will be held at 7 p. m., followed by the big drawing for the TV giveaway.

The climax to the big day's activities will begin at 8:30 with a big Free Street Dance. The group "Bandera" will be playing for the dance.

All events will be held downtown and it will be a fun-filled day and night of activities for young and old, so ya'll come!

The Gorman Panthers fell behind 12-0 in the first half on Friday night when they hosted the tough Cisco Lobos at Brogdon Field, then came back with just 50 seconds left in the second period and scored to make the score 12 to 8 at intermission. The game was pretty evenly played until 10:21 of the final period, then the Lobos added the insurance touchdown, then scored again with just 10 seconds left to make the final score 27-8.

The Lobos scored first with 6:40 left in the initial period with David Zell running 3 yards for the TD. The run for points failed and the score stood at 6-0. The drive started at the Gorman 24 following a fumble.

Then the Lobos came back with another score with 3:58 left in the second period when Harvey Perkins caught a 9 yards pass from Doug Whitt. Again the try for points failed and the score moved to 12-0.

The Panthers started a drive late in the second period after an interception by Jay McCormick at the Gorman 15. From there the Big Red moved the distance in just seven plays with Jay McCormick catching a beautifully thrown pass from running back Joe Rodgers with 50 seconds left on the clock. The drive featured runs of 15 and 10 by Rodgers and also a 14 yard scamper by Brandon Gilmore. Rodgers added the two pointer and the Panthers had gained momentum with a 12 to 8

score at halftime.

The third period was played on fairly even terms with neither team being able to cross the goal line until 10:21 was left on the clock in the fourth period. The Lobos recovered another fumble on the Gorman 34 and scored in 8 plays with Zell getting the final yard on a run. Larry Fields ran for the two pointer and the score moved to 20 to 8.

The final score came with just ten seconds left on the clock when the Lobos scored on a 5 yard run by an unlisted player (No. 37). The drive covered 56 yards in 15 plays. Zell then kicked the point after and the final score was 27 to 8.

The ball game was a hard fought battle all the way, but the Panthers just lost the ball too many times on turnovers with 4 fumbles lost and one interception to the Lobos. And with that many turnovers its just

to enjoy, including another performance of the Gorman Red Hots and the Square Dancers, and so many things. So come on out and enjoy the big day in Gorman. We will do our best to show you a great time.

According to a report to us from the South Eastland County Hospital District on Tuesday the net amount raised from the auction sale of equipment and supplies totalled \$61,040. 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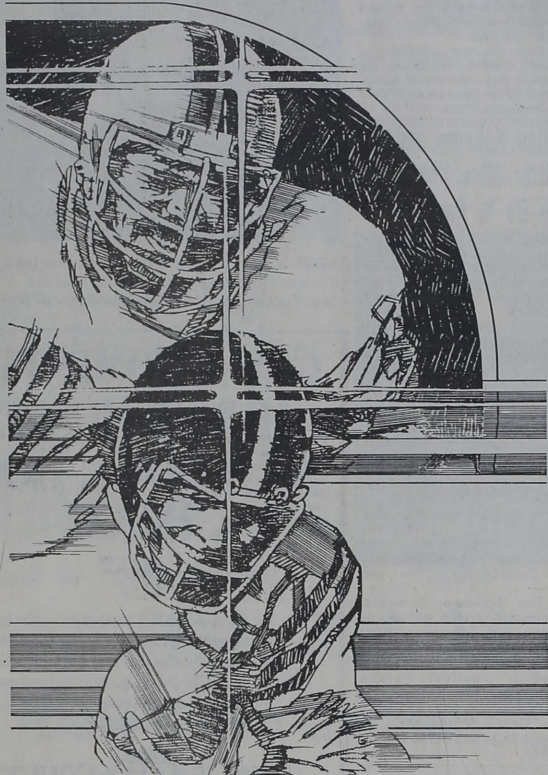

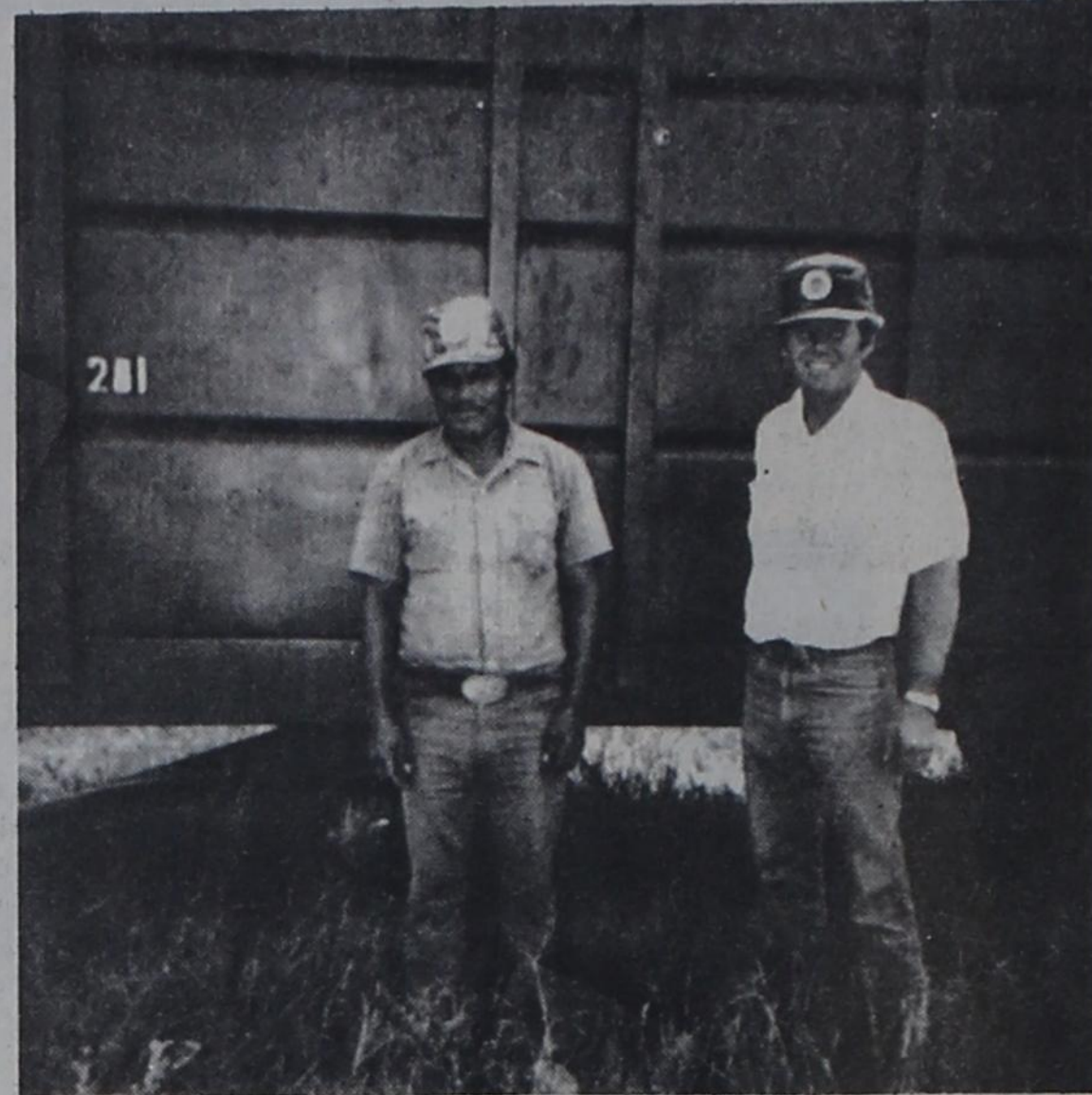

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium. The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE

Deceptive Trade Practices - Consumer Protection Act

All of us are consumers, and as such are given certain protections under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices - Consumer Protection Act. This was enacted during the 63rd Session of the Texas Legislature in 1973, to provide consumers with protection from false, misleading or deceptive trade practices. This applies whether we purchase

goods or services as individuals or as a businesses.

This Act makes it possible for a consumer to sue for damages, court costs and attorney's fees as a result of deceptive trade practices, as defined in the statute. Reasoning for such law was based on the recognition that the consumer should have access to a direct legal process

when it was felt that he or she had been victimized by unfair business practices prohibited by law.

The Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's office, as well as District and County Attorneys, enforce this law; however, manufacturers, merchants and consumers can all benefit from

an understanding of their rights under this Act. Amendments have been made to the original law in virtually every Legislative Session since its enactment, in an attempt to further define the original legislative intent.

Cases which have been tried under this statute include misrepresentation of merchandise or services and various violations of certain deceptive trade practices. One successful suit under the scope of this Act involved a certain group which had sold memberships on a door to door basis, but had misrepresented the memberships as a type of insurance. The defendants were also found in violation of the mandatory "three day cooling off period" provided by another Texas statute. Thus, this Act also adds additional enforcement measures to other existing laws.

During the 70th Session of the Texas Legislature in 1987, the Joint Committee on Deceptive Trade Practices were formed. This Committee consists of three State Senators and three members of the public appointed by the Lt. Governor, and three State Representatives and three members of the public appointed by the Speaker of the House.

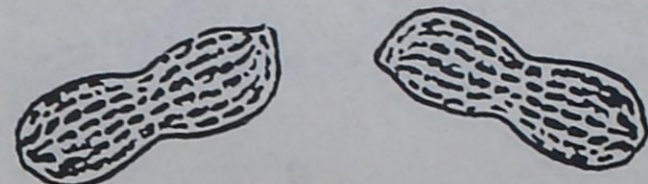
The purpose of this Committee is to study the economic impact on businesses and consumers resulting from the manner in which the Deceptive Trade Practices Act, or Article 21.21, V.A.T.S. Insurance Code, has been interpreted and applied and the extent to which the interpretation of that Act contributes to unpredictability in this State's civil justice system. Additionally, there is some concern that actions are being brought under this Act that go beyond the original purpose and intent of the Act.

Specific issues of study, adopted by the Committee, deal with the following questions. 1). Deceptive Trade Practices Act and the 1987 tort reform laws: to what extent, if any, should exemptions in these laws be repealed or modified? 2). Notice: is the notice provision ineffective in avoiding litigation and/or promoting fair and timely settlements? 3). Trebling Provision: should there be limits to the size of the claim subject to the trebling provision? 4). Applicability of the DTPA to business consumers: should the applicability of the DTPA to business consumers be expanded or contracted? 5). Applicability of the DTPA to financial institutions: to what extent, if any, should the DTPA be clarified or modified regarding its applicability to financial institutions? 6). Enforcement of the DTPA by the Texas Attorney General, Office of Consumer Protection: should revisions be made regarding the authorities and procedures currently granted to the Office of Consumer Protection? 7). Alternative Dispute Resolution: what provisions, if any, should be made for DTPA disputes to be adjudicated through some type of alternative dispute resolution procedure such as arbitration? 8). Miscellaneous issues: includes questions regarding limited exemption for health care providers being eliminated and need for modification of the definition of "consumer" in the DTPA.

Should you wish to report a violation of the Deceptive Trade Practices - Consumer Protection Act, contact your County or District Attorney; also, the closest office of the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division within my Senatorial District 22 is located at 714 Jackson, Suite No. 700, Dallas, TX 75202-4506, and their phone number is 214/742-8944.

I would also like to advise that this Committee has set its next public hearing for Friday, September 23, 1988, in the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol in Austin, with a tentative beginning time of 9:00 a.m. Should you wish to present testimony, you may register at the entrance to the Senate Chamber. Recommendations by this Committee will be given to the 71st Legislature when it convenes in January of 1989.

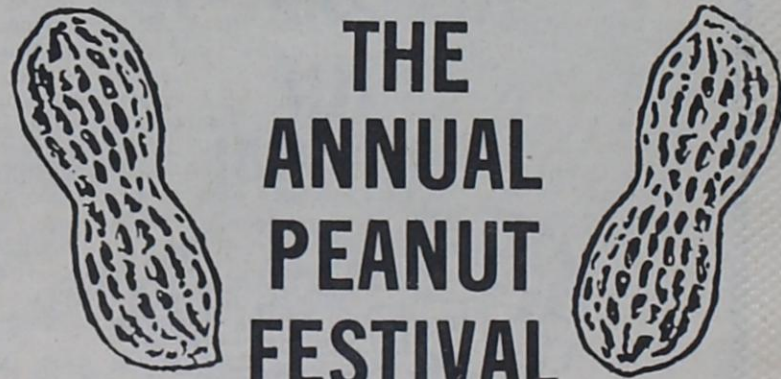

1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
3/4 cup of water
Dash of salt
3-inch stick of cinnamon
3 cups of peanuts
Combine sugar, cream of tartar, water, salt and cinnamon in large heavy kettle. Cook, stirring only

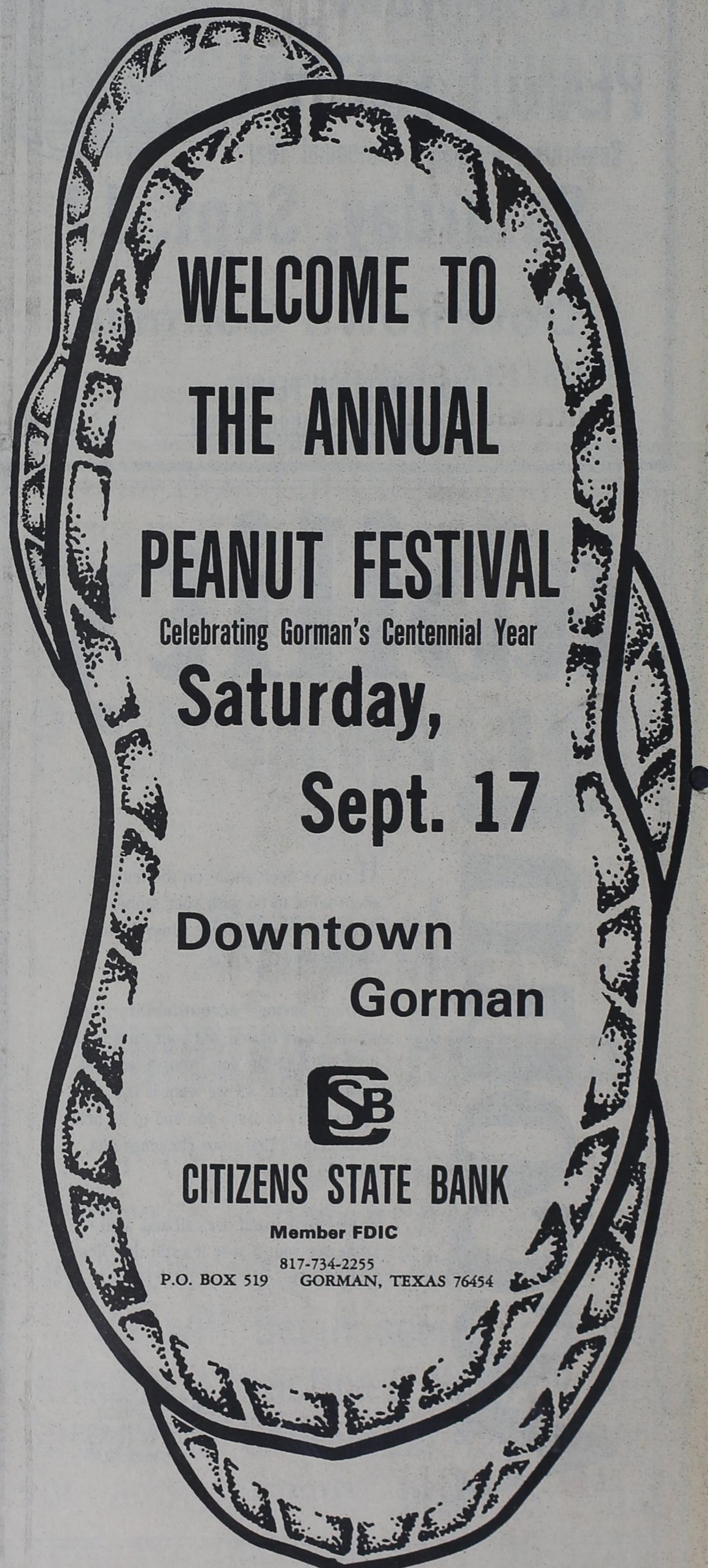



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

Homemaking Trends

The refrigerator is a modern day marvel no home can do without. Most Americans take it for granted day in and day out...opening it and closing it...filling it and unloading it.

According to home economists from KitchenAid, we may be taking it a little too much for granted. In order to do the very best job of keeping our perishable foods their freshest, it needs a little help from us. The key to preserving the natural moisture and storage life of refrigerated foods is proper prepara-

tion and wrapping, say the home economists.

Here are some tips to refrigerate for better taste and less waste:

- Vegetables and fruits are best kept in your refrigerator's crisper or in an airtight container. Trim the bruised areas from leafy vegetables, such as lettuce, celery and parsley. Rinse them in cool water and then allow to drain. Place them in the crisper with some of the water still clinging.
- Vegetables and fruit with skins, (tomatoes, peppers, peaches, etc.) should be washed and dried before placing in the crisper.
- Berries keep better if not washed until ready for use. Simply sort, wrap loosely and store in the

crisper or a closed container on a refrigerator shelf.

- Fresh meats—remove the market wrapping and rewrap in aluminum foil. Store in meat tray.
- Cooked meat—cover with

plastic wrap or aluminum foil and store on a refrigerator shelf.

- Cured or smoked meats—ham, bacon, cold cuts, keep best in original wrapping. Once opened, tightly rewrap in plastic or foil.
