Registration for Credit by Exam

Gorman ISD students needing to register for Credit by Exam have until June 14, 2001 to sign up for these tests. Melon Production Tour to Focus on Potential Problems

Watermelon and cantaloupe producers in the Cross Timbers area of Texas are off to the best start ever. Watermelon plants are thriving under the moderate temperatures but intense sunlight on black plastic. In the midst of this optimism there is a black cloud. There have been recent discoveries of squash bugs and yellow vine disease, both in seedless watermelons. Just recently Dr. Benny Bruton, ARS Plant Pathologist, has identified squash bug as a yellow vine disease carrier and transmitter. The Melon Production Tour will be held Thursday, June 14, 2001 and will give growers a chance to learn all about melon diseases and insect problems and how to control them, including yellow vine. Tour registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. at Atriplex Producers in Gustine, Texas on Highway 36 and the tour will leave at 9:00 a.m. Tour participants will visit several melon fields and hear Extension specialists discuss melon production. Two continuing education credit hours will be offered to private, commercial and non-commercial applicators. To preregister please contact the Texas Agricultural Extension office in Comanche at 915/356-2539.

Pet Bird Diets
Pet birds are becoming increasingly popular. So if you are thinking of buying a pet bird, it is important to remember that they do not take care of themselves and need a lot more than fresh water and a newspaper on the bottom of the cage. The key to a healthy and happy bird is a well-balanced diet, a safe environment and a little common sense. When you combine these three — your pet will be singing a happy song for many years.
According to Dr. Rich, the bird owner's goal should be to match, as closely as possible, the diet that would be provided to the pet by Mother Nature. Remember there are no sunflower plants in South America, the natural home of many pet birds. A poor diet can have serious consequences. Canaries lacking Vitamin A in their diets may have excessive scale buildup on their legs and feet. Parrots with diets deficient in Vitamin A can exhibit poor feathering, mouth ulcers or bumble foot. Dr. Rich recommends a high quality seed diet, but reminds owners that green leafy vegetables and sweet potatoes are also high in Vitamin A and should be included in the diet. Be sure to discuss your bird's nutritional needs with your veterinarian, and for more information about caring for your pets, visit the American Veterinary Medical Association's web page on the Internet at: www.avma.org. 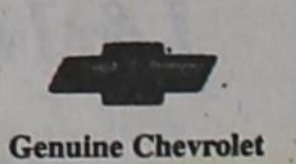
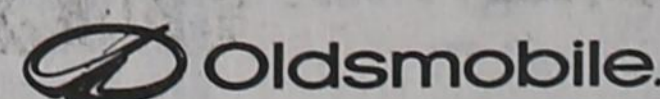

Keeping an Eye on Texas

Protecting Precious Cargo

In 1999, 202 children from infants through age 14 were killed as a result of traffic collisions in Texas. Even though Texas has child occupant restraint laws protecting this age group, more than half of the children killed were riding unrestrained.

Restraint Guidelines:

- Infants, until at least 1 year old and at least 20 pounds, should ride in rear-facing child safety seats.
- Children more than 1 year old and between 20 and 40 pounds should ride in forward-facing child safety seats.
- Children ages 4 to 8 and weighing about 40 to 80 pounds should ride in a car booster seat and be restrained with a lap/shoulder belt.
- Children ages 12 and under should be restrained in a back seat.
