

Peanut producers in Eastland County can now get the latest market information through a 24-hour national toll-free hotline.

By calling 1-800-346-1066, producers can access a brief, taped message concerning the peanut market and other issues of concern. Recorded messages are updated as needed, once or twice weekly in the off season and daily during the peak marketing period.

In addition to current peanut market information, the service also provides timely reports on such issues as peanut contracts, legislattion, and rules and regulations.

The hotline is provided by the Agri-Products Marketing Services, Inc., whose staff collects, edits and narrates the hotline information. The hotline is supported by state peanut producer organizations, including the Texas Peanut Producers' Board and several commercial companies that serve the peanut industry.

New testing procedures for detecting sulfamethazine and other sulfa products in slaughter hogs will be discussed at an educational meeting at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Stephenville on May 26th, at 7:30 p.

The meetings will be conducted by the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service to brief swine producers and veterinarians on a new sulfa screening program that uses the sulfa-on-site (SOS) test. The SOS test is a quick, in-plant urine screening test.

By May 28, federal meat inspectors in each major U. S. packing plant will use the SOS test to screen urine from up to six hogs per day. The new testing procedures will affect most Texas producers who sell marketweight hogs.

Sulfa residues can be a particular problem in slaughter-weight hogs fed on dirt or collected for sale at gathering points or auction sales on dirt because sulfa products stay in the environment for years.

In addition to the nes SOS test, information will be presented on proper methods for using sulfa products and on procedures for dealing with positive SOS tests. Extension Service Veterinarian Dr. Bruce Lawhorn will be on hand to lead the discussion and to answer questions.

PECAN TREE SPRAY TIME

The next six days will be the time to spray pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearers in Eastland County, reports County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. May 25 to May 31 has been determined to be the best time to spray if you hope to have a pecan crop this year.

The adult moths of the casebearers have started laying eggs on the tips of the small pecans. The best time to spray may vary with location

in the county and between varieties, says Gordon. Pecan producers and homeowners should check their trees closely for the small white eggs which are deposited on the black tip of the pecans. The eggs hatch four or five days after they are deposited by the moths. About three days after the small larvae emerge from the eggs they begin eating into the

Insecticide applications should begin after the first nutlet damage is observed, the agent says. Many producers treat too early and miss most of the insects. It's best to have 1 to 2 percent entries before sprays are applied. If nut damage continues seven to ten days after the first spray application, the trees should be sprayed again. However, one spray application usually is sufficient.

Effective insecticides include Gu-

thion, Malathion, Thiodan, Zolone,

Diazinon, Pydrin, Ammo, and Cymbush. Before using any of these materials, read the label directions and follow them carefully. It is also important to spray pecan trees with zinc. Zinc sulfate is a wettable powder that may be mixed with insecticides. NZN is a liquid zinc that is preferred for yard trees and may

also be used in orchards. For more information on pecan pest control contact the County Extension office.



The track is .2 of a mile long, or five laps to the mile. It loops around the school yard and football field behind the old Desdemona High School building on Farm-to-Market Road 8.



 - (4) A listing of all obligations owed by the District including the name, address and amount owed to each creditor. These shall be summarized on a cover sheet with appropriate categories and the total liabilities shown.
 - (5) A delinguent tax roll giving the name and address of each delinquent taxpayer, the amounts owed by that taxpayer by years and the total amount now due. A cover sheet shall summarize the delinquent taxes by year and show the total amount of delinquent taxes.
 - (6) The tax roll for 1988 if it has been prepared. If the tax roll for 1988 has not been prepared, the oral presentation shall include a statement as to the estimated total valuation for 1988 taxes, the estimated tax rate and the estimated total taxes.
