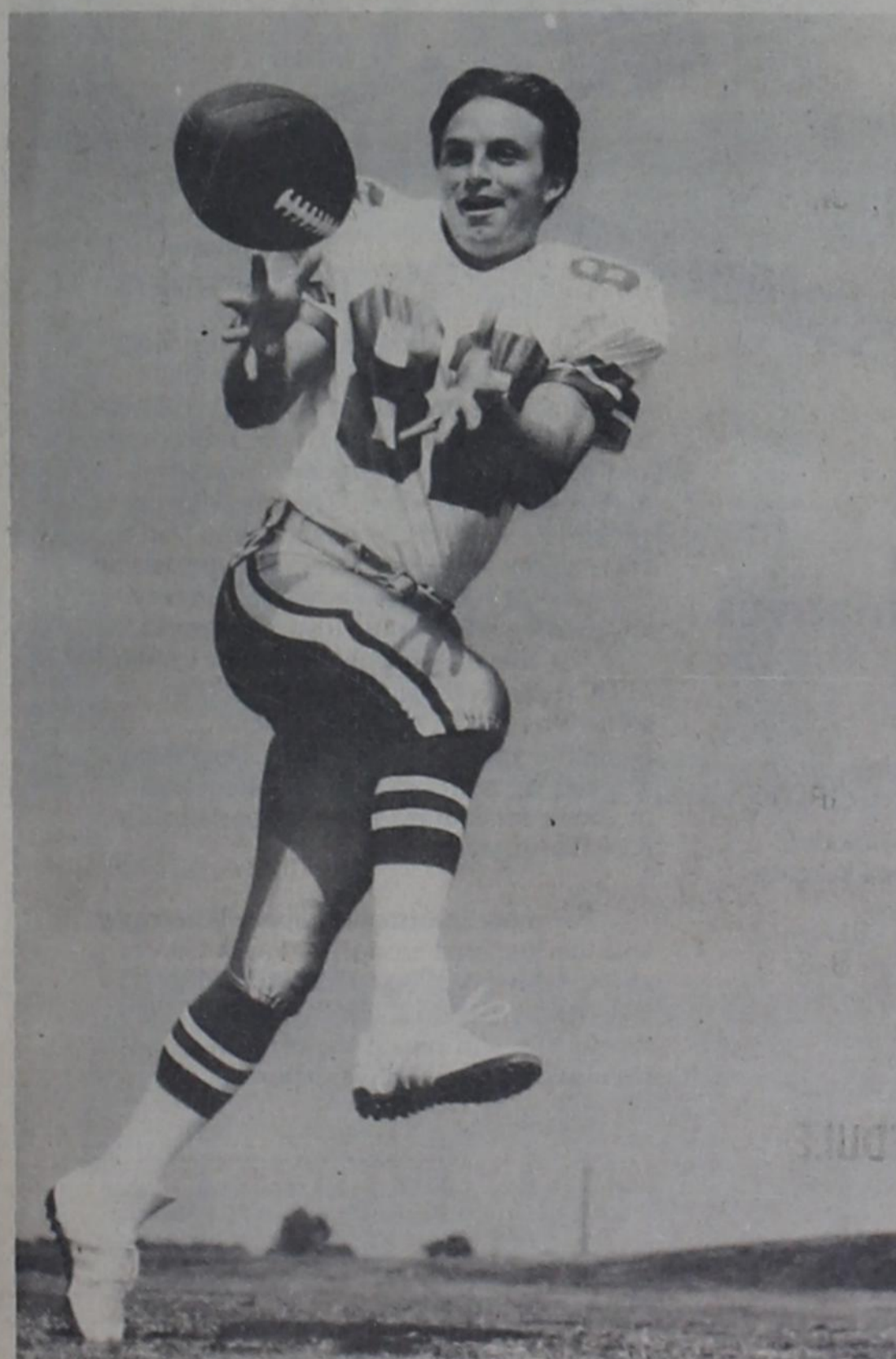
### Three File For Two Places On School Board

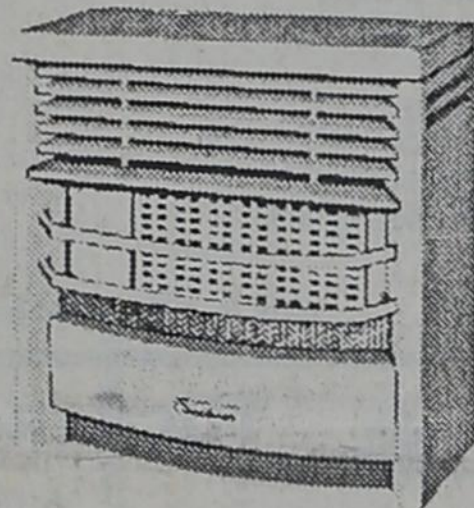
