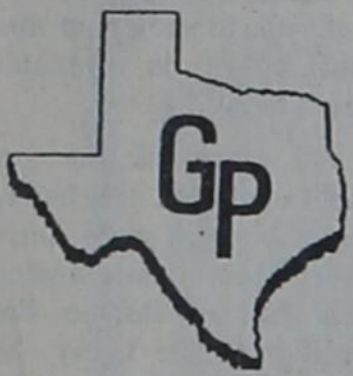

## Pride Station To Open In De Leon

A computerized Fueling Station operating 24 Hours a day will open in De Leon soon at Highway 6 East of Caddo Street.

The system is being installed by Pride Marketing of Texas, Inc., A subsidiary of Pride Refining, Inc. of Abilene, and will operate under the name Pride Fleet Fuel.

A Grand Opening of the facility-the first of its kind in De Leon is planned for the first of April.

The De Leon outlet will be the first of several such operations planned for this area, although Pride has numerous similar facilities throughout West Texas.

De Leon's facility will serve both the General Public and Commercial Customers, with a separate Fuel Island with high volume pumps for large Diesel account.

The system will be completely automated with an on-site computer relaying sales information back to Pride's Abilene office.

Customers will purchase fuel by using a plastic credit card similar to those used by 24-Hour Banking facilities. The computer will "read" the magnetic strip on the card to determine ownership and any restrictions that a customer might want placed on a particular card. This option has proven to be of great interest to businesses in their attempts to better manage fuel cost.

Fuel provided at the site will come from the refinery owned by Pride Refining, Inc. and located eight miles north of Abilene.

Pride operates a crude oil gathering facility just East of De Leon, and has purchased up to 45,000 barrels per month in the De Leon area.

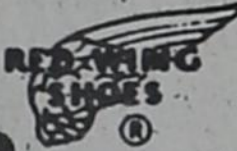
