Effective September 1, 1991: Hunters whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971, through August 31, 1975, must have successfully completed the August 31, 1975, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Effective September 1, 1992: Hunters whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971, through August 31, 1976, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Effective September 1, 1993: All hunters who are at least 12 years of age and whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

NOTE: Instructors certified in the voluntary Texas hunter safety education program are certified instructors for the mandatory program. Certified teachers must successfully complete a student course, complete a "mutual agreement" application and attend a minimum four-hour program orientation.

**Decertification of Instructors** 

The Department may decertify instructors for violating provisions of these regulations, falsification of records or documents, or for actions that are detrimental to the objectives of the program.
