

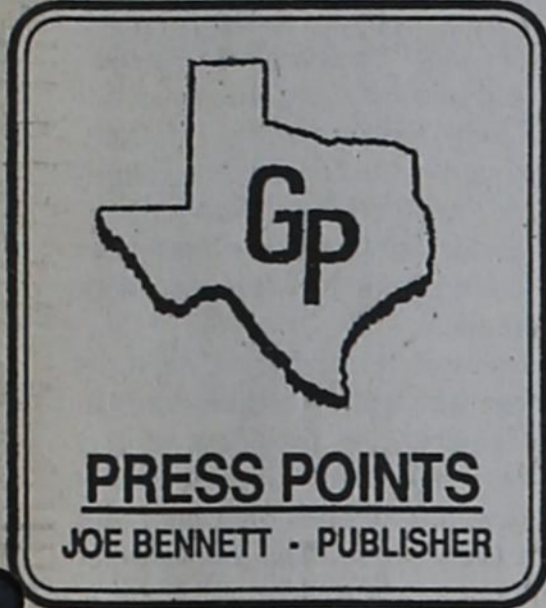

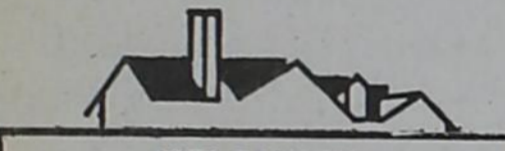

Alteranti Care For Older and Disabled Adults

The Department of Human Services offers an alternative to the elderly and disabled adults who once had to rely on their families or nursing homes when caring for themselves became difficult. The alternative is Adult Foster Care. This Adult Residential Care provides a 24-hour living arrangement for persons who, because of physical, mental or emotional limitations, are unable to continue independent functioning in their own homes. Services may include meal preparation, house-keeping, minimal help with personal care, help with activities of daily living, and provision of or arrangement of transportation. Providers of this service will live in the household and share common living area with the clients.

Success of this program depends on those who will open their doors to these adults. The providers of this service can be individual or family who is willing to open their door and share their home. The Department reimburses the provider and there is also a room and board arrangement. If you are interested, recruitment is currently underway for care givers. 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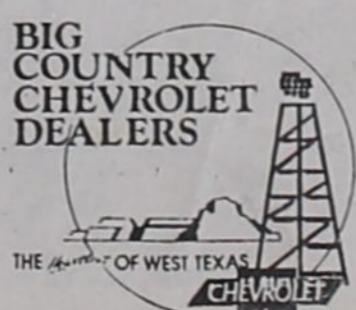

Eastland County has been officially notified that the Texas Legislature at its most recent special session has approved the use of state bond funds to finance four additional state prison units. The Texas Board of Criminal Justice will select sites for these prisons at its 10 July, 1990 meeting. The Board intends to select sites from among the twenty communities on a short list released on October 5, 1989. Eastland County was listed in this group.

From the 20 original short list contenders a final short list will be developed from which the four winning sites will be selected.

This is to advise the public that Eastland County may be selected on the final short list. If so the public is invited to appear at an open hearing in Austin concerning the site selection. Top 1990 Rural Minister Search Now Underway

To be eligible for the award, a minister must have served for at least two years in a congregation in a rural community or town of less than 10,000 population.

"Show how the minister's leadership has helped bring the people together to fulfill their community and religious needs," he said.

FINAL REPORTING DATE

The final date to file a report of planted acreage of peanuts, corn, grain sorghum, cotton, conserving use and ACR (set aside) is July 16th. Other crops for which an acreage report will be accepted include commercial vegetable crops, melons, guar, and any other crop that the farm operator wishes to establish a record of crop history.

PEANUT SEED RECEIPTS

Peanut producers are reminded to bring their receipts for peanut seed purchases when they request measurement service or when they file their report of acreage.

HOLIDAY NOTICE

The ASCS office will be closed Wednesday, July 4th in observance of Independence Day.

PEANUT CROP SHARES

Lease documentation will be required again this year when a peanut producer claims 100 percent share of the peanut crop. Producers are requested to bring copies of their cash lease when reporting their peanut acreage or when requesting measurement service.

OFFICE TO BE OPEN FRIDAY

The previously authorized policy of closing the county office for one work day to allow employees to complete paper work, issue payments, and perform computer upgrades, installs and backups has been withdrawn. 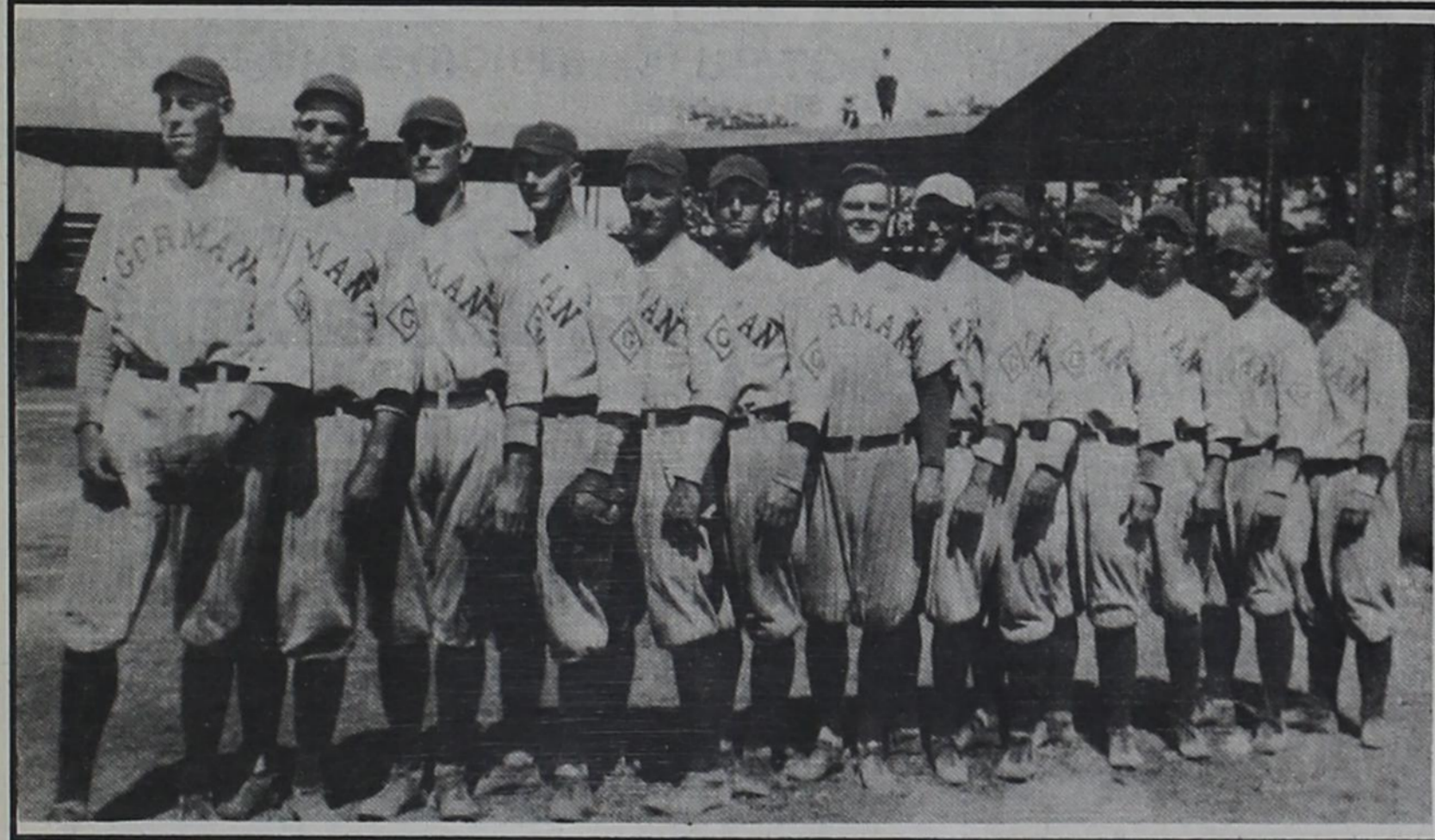
