The Gorman Medical Clinic will open on Tuesday, September 4th and will be a satellite of the De Leon Hospital and licensed by the state as a Rural Health Clinic. It will be staffed by Ron Conklin, who is a Physician Assistant, a L.V.N., and a medical receptionist.

The Gorman Clinic is available to provide basic health care needs for the community of Gorman. The Physician Assistant's supervisor will be Dr. Dwayne Miller of the De Leon Clinic Associates. Dr. Miller will be available for consultation should the need arise. Health care needs requiring more extensive care or hospitalization will be referred to the De Leon Clinic or De Leon Hospital. Basic lab and x-ray will also be available at the Gorman Medical Clinic. Extensive lab and x-ray will be referred to the De Leon Hospital.

In order to better serve the Gorman community, the clinic will be open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday thru Friday, starting on Tuesday, September 4th. De Leon Hospital will be available for after hours emergencies. The telephone number for appointment is 734-2292.

De Leon Hospital is looking forward to serving the health care needs of Gorman on a full time basis.

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

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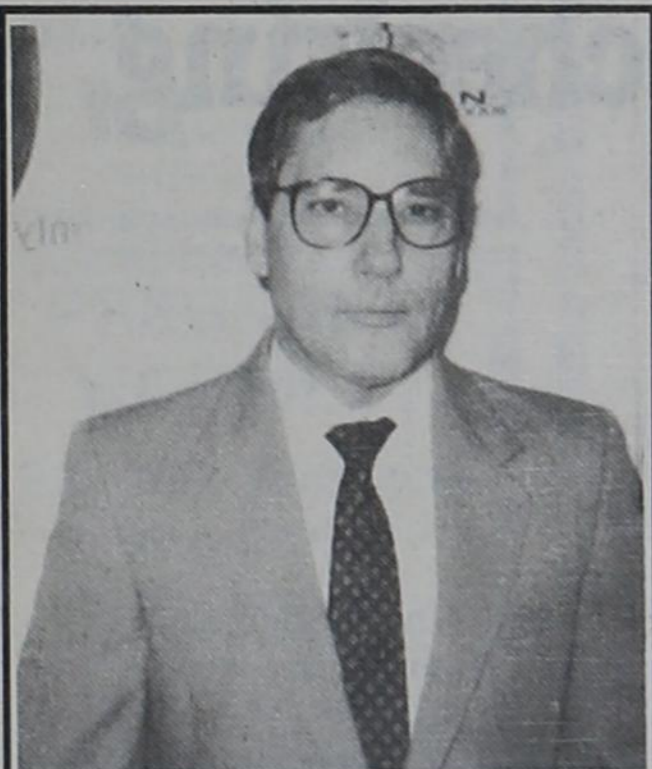


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GORMAN MEDICAL CLINIC TO OPEN TUESDAY SEPTEMBER 4TH

A Different Viewpoint

On August 11, 1990, Homecoming was held once again in Desdemona, Texas. Many people worked extremely hard to make the big event of the year happen. On the other hand, someone else tried extremely hard to embarrass the community as a whole, certain people as individuals, and to create a bad impression for visitors/returnees from out of town. I, of course, am speaking of the individual known by his/her nom-de-plume; "Author Unknown".

While my family and myself are newcomers to Desdemona, this is the community where we have chosen to live. This is where we have made a personal and emotional investment as well as financial one. I have no personal axe to grind for power, glory or simply "being in charge". I know that small towns and communities accept newcomers in 10-15 years as being vital parts of the community. Patience is not really one of my virtues, but I am aware of certain realities. I know who and what I am and there are a few things I'd like to present from "A Different Viewpoint".

No. 1: I tend to be anachronistic about some things. I take them personally. Therefore, when I am about to enjoy a leisurely breakfast outing with my family, and must go out and remove some litter and trash that has been thrown on the main street of town in the middle of the night; I get a little irate. Littering is basically a \$200 fine for a misdemeanor. I realize everyone is guilty of littering to a certain extent, but on this scale, it's really a crime.

No. 2: Since I have not lived in the community long enough, I can't/won't make any value judgements about the past, or about the way things used to be. I live in the present and the things that I think and do now are what is important. They determine how I live now and want to live in the future. Upon reading the "literature" that was "Littered", a few things were apparent to me even as a newcomer:

a. A few things contained therein are possibly actionable as libel/slander.

b. What "Author Unknown" really wants is personal power, not necessarily community betterment. (There are no solutions/changes offered; only a diatribe.)

c. "Author Unknown" does not keep up with current events. (You have to sign to vote in any election in the USA.)

d. An action attributed to the "Trustees" should not have been. (I was the one who suggested signing voting slips, in response to a question from the floor on how to prevent multiple voting.)

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
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
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
