



While my family and myself are newcomers to Desdemona, this is the community where we have chosen to live. This is where we have made a personal and emotional investment as well as financial one. I have no personal axe to grind for power, glory or simply "being in charge". I know that small towns and communities accept newcomers in 10-15 years as being vital parts of the community. Patience is not really one of my virtues, but I am aware of certain realities. I know who and what I am and there are a few things I'd like to present from "A Different Viewpoint".

This is why we volunteered to assist at Homecoming, even if we didn't go to school there. That's why we'll continue to do what we can, say what we think and honor those commitments we make.

In conclusion, if there's work to be done or beneficial changes to be made, let's get on with the program. If you have something to contribute, step out of the shadows and into the mainstream. Remember these two


