

In the girls game at Lingleville on Tuesday night the Pantherettes were defeated by a score of 59 to 49 in a District 23A game.



TU Electric today filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas and its rates since 1984. The 10.2 its municipal regulators for a 10.2 percent increase in rates, which would raise the Company's annual revenues by \$442 million.

This increase, which is not expected to go into effect before next summer, will be the first increase in TU Electric's rates since 1984.

"We are requesting the minimum amount needed to restore the financial integrity that will allow us to continue providing reliable and competitively priced electric," said Erle Nye, Chairman and Chief Executive of TU Electric. "Our present rate levels will not allow us to continue to attract capital necessary to maintain, improve and expand our services when our customers need them."

TU Electric's residential rates are sixth lowest among the 25 largest cities in the United States, and after the 10.2 percent increase they would remain below the national average, Nye said.

By taking advantage of de-

clining fuel costs. tric has been able to lower percent requested today will only bring rates back to about their 1984 level. The percentage of the proposed increase is about half as much as the rate of inflation in the Dallas-Fort Worth area for the same period.

TU Electric's dedication to cost control, productivity and efficiency has brought about estimated savings of about \$800 million dollars since 1984, Nye said. The Company is serving 480,000 additional customers with the same number of employees it had at the beginning of 1982. A corporate reorganization in 1984, which significantly reduced operating costs, plus other efficiency and productivity improvements have allowed the Company to absorb customer growth and inflation without requesting an increase in rates until now.

TU Electric has maintained a high level of service reliabilty while instituting strict cost control measures. However, the Company can no



longer continue to provide the same level of service to its customers without a rate increase, he said.

The increase will recover costs in connection with the operation of Unit 1 of the Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant. This 1,150,000 kilowatt generating unit is expected to be providing service needed by now uses to generate electric-TU Electric customers in the ity. Gramm Anti-Crime Bill Keeps Felons In Prison

WASHINGTON - U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm is preparing tough new legislation "to address the number one problem in America: crime without punishment."


The plan, which was unveiled in Washington, requires mandatory federal sentences for violent and drug-related crimes. It will also require felons to work while in prison and allow temporary facilities such as tents to be used for housing some lation, in 87 counties in North Central, West and East Texas.



The Gramm bill declares a fiveyear national emergency and imposes much stiffer sentencing and incarceration measures.

Mandatory sentences wiuld be set for certain crimes, including a minimum of 10 years for the sale of drugs to a minor, 20 years for use of a firearm during a crime and death or life imprisonment with no parole for murder committed during another crime.

In an attempt to cut prison costs, the bill will allow use of barracks or tents on closed military bases for temporary detention of convicts and would allow prison authorities to eliminate "non-essential prison construction costs" such as air conditioning.





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
