Tax Rate Set At .97683 For Gorman ISD

The Gorman Independent School District Board has had several workshops on determining the tax rate for the school year 1990-91. As published in the paper August 16, 1990, the effective tax rate for the 1990-91 school year is .94838/100. The increase for the effective rate was due to loss values in the district. The tax rate of .94838 will generate the same amount of monies as the district received from local taxes in 1089-90.

At a workshop meeting on August 29, 1990 the board chose to use the .94838 times 1.03 percent to give the total tax rate of .97683/100. This rate will be adopted at the regular board meeting on September 10, 1990. The total tax rate will be for both maintenance and bond indebtedness. This rate will insure the district to receive state funds that will be sufficient to operate the budget set for 1990-91 school year.

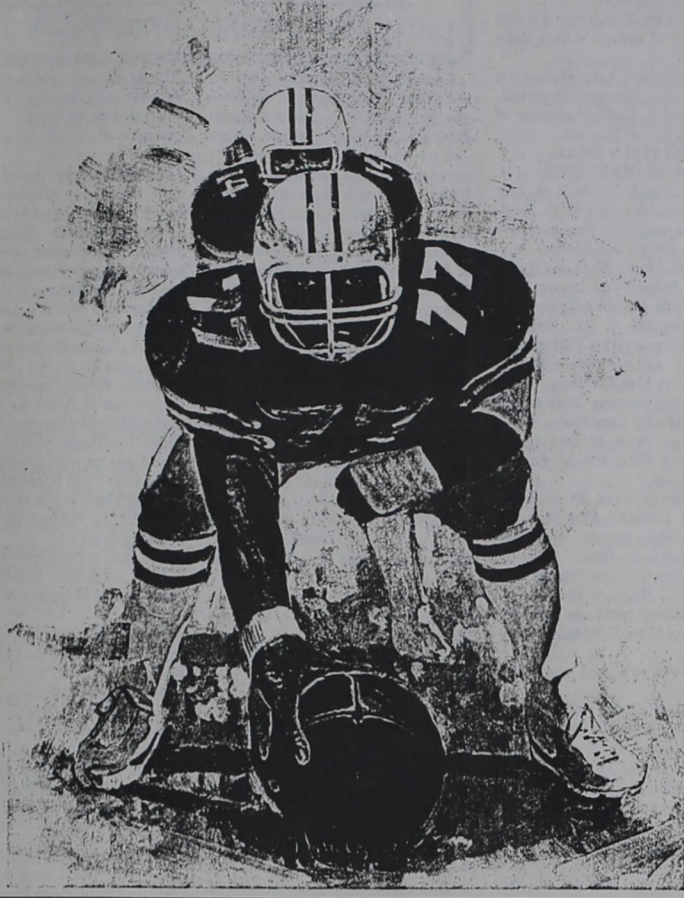

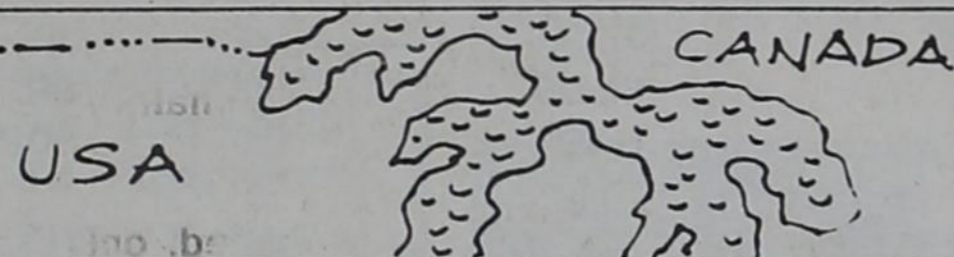

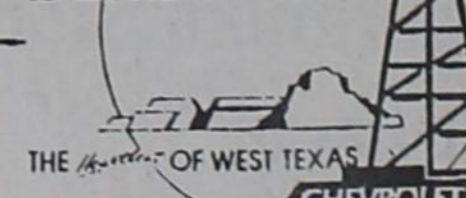

George Ellis, Associate Deputy Commissioner for Programs with the Texas Department of Agriculture, will moderate a panel of area producers and environmentalists, in Abilene, Thursday, September 6, to discuss the implications of the proposed changes in the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). The meeting will be at 2 p. m. in the Jury Assembly Room, third floor of the Taylor County Court-house.

Those participating in the panel discussion will be Mary Webb, Texas Peanut Producers Board, Gorman; Wes Sims, American Milk Producers, Inc., Sweetwater; Billy Vinson, Texas Wheat Producers Board, Abilene; Joe Rankin, Texas Farmers Union, Ralls; and Mike Hightower, an environmentalist from Abilene. Also attending the meeting to listen to the producers and environmentalist concerns will be Congressman Charles Stenholm from Stamford.

Many farm organizations maintain that the GATT proposals being advocated by the Bush Adm. will cost Texas farmers 1 Billion dollars a year in lost income, will force producers to rely upon greater pesticide use to increase their crop yield, and will, therefore, heighten consumer food-safety concerns.

Sen. Gramm Announces Federal Hwy. Adm. Grant

WASHINGTON — U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced the award of a \$3,099,000 grant to the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Austin by the Federal Highway Administration.

The funds are for emergency repairs to federal aid highway systems in 34 counties that were damaged by the unusually heavy rains and floodings of April, 1990.

The Federal Highway Administration administers an emergency program to assist in the repair or reconstruction of federal-aid highways and certain federal roads that have suffered serious damage by natural disasters over a wide area or catastrophic failures.

Included in the list of counties to receive funds are Eastland, Comanche, Erath and Palo Pinto.

Preliminary State Census Figures Released

The Federal Census Bureau has released preliminary Texas population figures showing the state's population to be 16,824,665, said State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville), Chairman of the Senate Legislative Redistricting Committee.

Texas local governments will have 15 days to review these figures and report to the census bureau as to whether or not they believe the figures to be accurate. The figures released reflect the count according to the forms returned during the month of February and visits made by local census takers.

"It is of extreme importance for all local governments to carefully review these figures. Local governments have only the 15-day period to make comments to the census bureau concerning the figures that will affect literally billions of dollars of Federal funds returned to the States over the next 10 years," said Glasgow. "In addition, census figures will decide the number of representatives a community may have in Congress, as well as the Texas Legislature. So, its important local governments help the census bureau to gain an accurate count of their area."

Population estimates made by the Texas Legislative Council differed 1.667 percent from the census bureau's data. Texas Legislative Council figures estimated Texas to have an additional 285,335 residents.

Assuming Texas gains an additional three congressional seats, Congressional Districts would contain 561,000 Texans. State Senate districts would have a population of 543,000, while Texas House districts would have 112,000. Figures will be released to the State later this week as to the population of the other states and where Texas ranks in terms of population growth.
