De Leon Hospital Purchases Gorman Medical Clinic

On July 17, 1990, the Gorman Medical Clinic was sold to the De Leon Hospital. The tentative plans are to open the clinic as a Rural Health Care Clinic. It will be staffed by a physician assistant and a nurse Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. The staff at the Gorman Medical Clinic will be available to handle all routine health problems. Health care needs that require more extensive care will be referred to De Leon Hospital. Should the need arise, the physician assistant can be in immediate communication with the De Leon physicians during normal clinic hours.

The target date for reopening the Gorman Medical Clinic will be 9-3-90. Additional information about the reopening of the clinic will be available within the next few weeks.

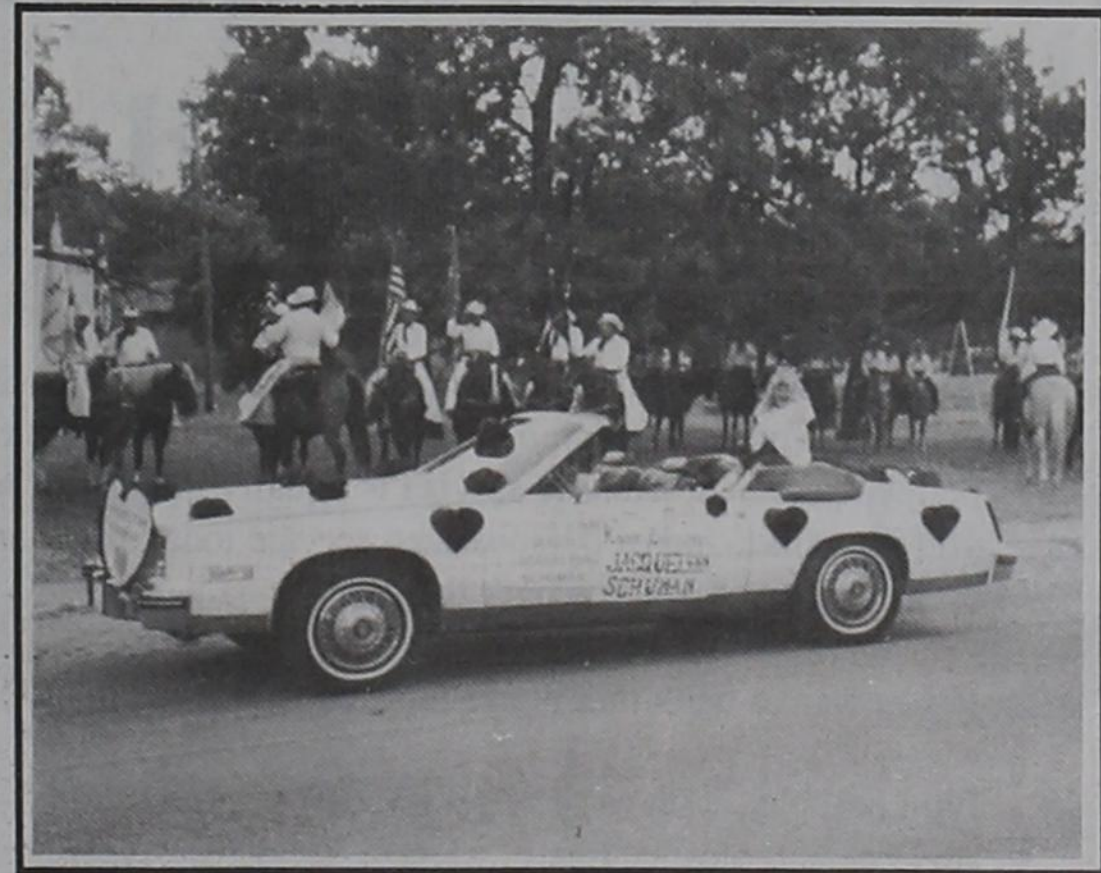

Gorman PTO members met Tuesday to finalize plans for the installation of the Elementary playground equipment set for August 11th.

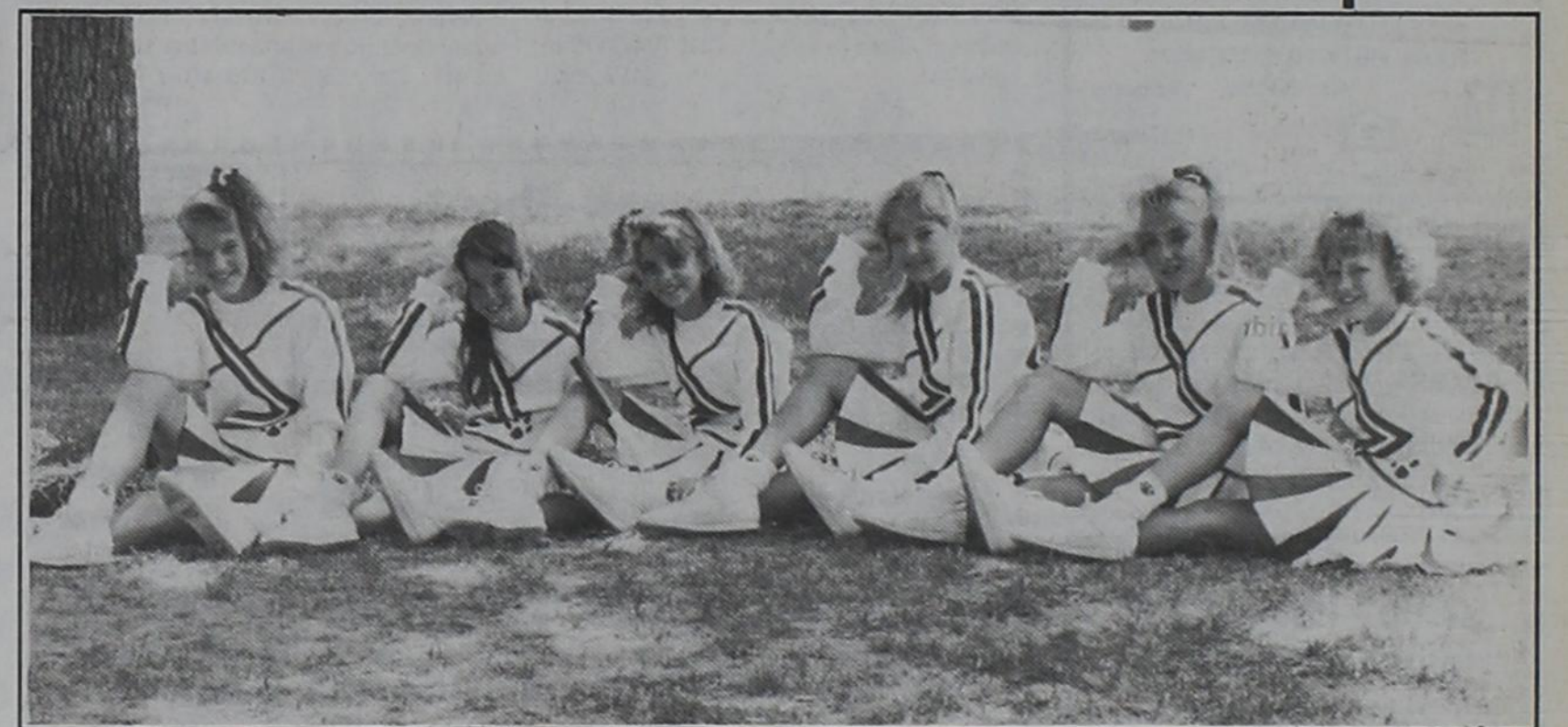
