Last Rites For **Chester Vaughn Held Saturday**


Chester Vaughn, 91, Abilene, passed away Thursday, January 4 im a De Leon nursing home.

USDA ANNOUNCES 1990 NATIONAL PEANUT POUNDAGE QUOTA

Agriculture Richard T. Crowder announced on December 15th the national peanut poundage quota of 1,560,000 short tons, or 3,120 million pounds, for the 1990 marketing year. The quota is 120,000 short tons more than the 1989 quota.

Crowder said that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is required by law to announce the final national poundage quota for the 1990 marketing year by December 15.

As required by the Agricultural Adjustment Act, as amended, that national poundage quota for the 1990 crop has been set at a level that is

American Legion Post 471 To Have Chili Supper and Apple **Pie Contest**


