PEANUT FESTIVAL SET FOR FRIDAY NIGHT AND SATURDAY

Charlie Jordan To Be Grand Marshal For Festival Parade

Charlie Jordan, "Boss Man" at the Ben Richey Boys Ranch, and the former "Weatherman" on KTAB TV in Abilene for many years, will serve as the Grand Marshal for the Peanut Festival Parade on Saturday morning at 10 in downtown Gorman.

The Festival Committee feels very fortunate to secure someone like Charlie to lead the parade this year.

A large number of entries have signed up for the big parade, which continues to grow each year, and all entries except horses, must be in place by 8:30 for judging competition and horses may be in place by 9:30.

The parade will begin at 10 a. m. and will proceed up the main street of Gorman and proceed to the Brown Feed Store, turn left on McCall to

Fisher Street, then left on Fisher and back to the school.

Children entering the Pet Parade are to meet at the former Federal-State Inspection Bldg and will be judged at 9:30 prior to the parade. Trophies and other awards will be presented. The pet parade will proceed up main street to the end of the business district.

There are numerous arts, crafts and food booth spaces reserved and they may open whenever they wish. Anyone desiring a space may contact Gerald Scitern.

Gorman's population will increase many fold this weekend as folks gather in town to enjoy the Annual Peanut Festival and all the activities that the Festival Committee has planned for their enjoyment.

The activities will begin on Friday with an old fashioned picnic supper auction at 7:30, followed by a free street dance at 8:30 with country and western music.

On Saturday the booths will set up and open from 6 to 10 a. m. The parade will begin at 10 a. m. The parade route will come up through town to McCall St., turn left on McCall to Fisher, then left on Fisher and back to the school. There are a very large number of entries in the parade and it should be the best one yet.

The Peanut Cookoff/Bakeoff will be held from 8 to 11 a. m. Then there will be a break from 12 noon to 1 p. m. so folks can enjoy all the wonderful food served from the food booths set up to feed folks. Folks can eat and play games.

Then beginning at 1 p. m. there will be several groups to entertain throughout the day.

There will be shoot-outs held during the afternoon, and the "Gun-Toters" will become "Deputies" to help Judge "Ma Buzzard" with arrests and jailing the "criminals". Of course this is all in fun and the "fines" will go to the Eastland County Crimestoppers Reward Fund and folks will receive a Crimestopper Bumper Sticker. This should prove to be very good.

PANTHERS SINK THE PIRATES 35-12; TRAVEL TO CISCO FRIDAY NIGHT

The Gorman Panthers opened their 1990 season a bright note Friday night as they defeated the Perrin-Whitt Pirates by a score of 35 to 12 on a nice night at Brogdon Field.

Jason Ditmore sparked the Panther offense as he scored two touchdowns with runs and added another on a beautiful 50 yard pass and run play. The Panther defense was also a big highlight on the evening holding the Pirates to just 66 yards on the ground and 156 in the air.

Gorman hit the scoreboard first after taking the ball on the Perrin 49 yard line and scoring in just three plays. The first play was a beautiful pass for 37 yards to Jason Ditmore to the Perrin 12. Then following an 8 yard run Jason took the ball in from the four with 3:04 left in the period. Kevin Hirst kicked the point after and the Panthers led 7-0.

Then the Panthers hadn't stopped celebrating before the Pirates took the ball on the first play following the score and tossed a 67 yard pass and run play that caught the Gorman secondary by surprise to put the ball on the Gorman 3 yard line. Following a 2 yard gain on the next play Mitchell Ables, Pirate quarterback, went over from the one yard line with 1:51 left in the period. The kick for point after failed and the score was 7-6.

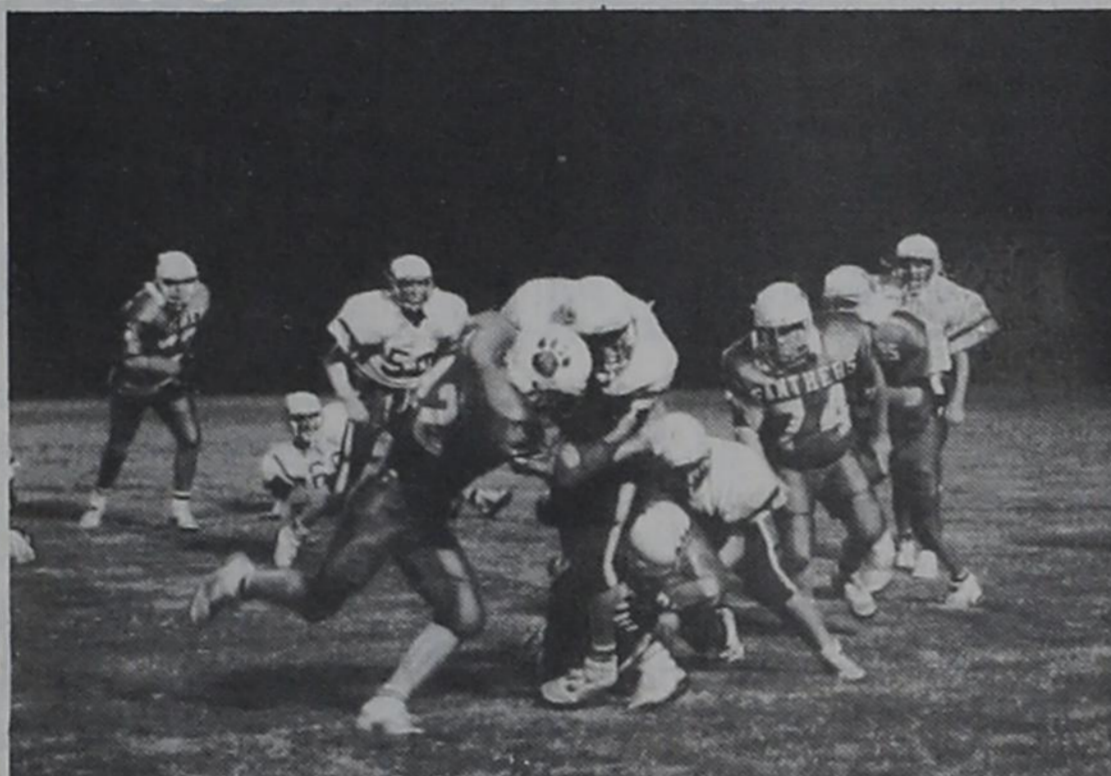
Then on the next possession the Panthers took the ball on the 50 yard line and scored in 6 plays with Kevin Hirst getting the touchdown on 1 yard out with 11:29 left in the second period. The drive featured first down runs of 11 and 14 by Jason Ditmore, a 12 yarder by Jade Warren and a 9 yard run by Stephen Scitern. The kick for point after failed and the score stood at 13 to 6.

The Panther defense held the Pirates on their next possession and got the ball on their own 34 after the Pirates punted. On the first play the Big Red got a 15 yard penalty. On the next play they gained 7 yards on a run. Then Stephen Scitern set up a first down with a 7 yard run. Then Kevin Hirst raced for 43 yards and a first down at the Perrin three. From there Jason Ditmore got the call and scored with 7:38 left in the second. Then Jason added the two pointer on a run to make the score read 21 to 6.

Following a couple of change of possessions by each team the Panthers took the ball on the 50 after an interception by Stephen Scitern and scored in one big blast as Kevin Hirst faded back behind some beautiful pass protection by the offensive line and threw a perfect strike to Jason Ditmore who caught the ball and raced for the end zone with 3:01 left in the half. Kevin added the point after and the score was 28 to 6 at the halftime intermission.

Then following halftime activities in which the Gorman Panther Marching Band put on an outstanding performance, the Panthers took the ball on their own 40 and scored in 6 plays with Matt Jones racing for the final 9 yards for the score with 1:46 left in the third. The drive featured 12 and 23 yard runs by Jason Ditmore and a 19 yard run by Cory Pack. Kevin Hirst added the point after and the score went to 35 to 6.

The Pirates came back late in the fourth and scored on a beautiful 35 yard pass and run by Tony McGee. The drive covered 70 yards in 5 plays. The pass try for two points

failed and the final score read 35 to 12.

The Panther defense really did a great job against the Pirates holding them to only 66 yards on 26 carries. The Pirates got 156 yards in the air but most of that was on a couple of long pass completions to McGee, who accounted for 154 of the 156 yards passing for the Pirates. But the Panther defense did a good job all evening against the Pirates. The Panther defense was led by Matt Jones, Jeremy Ditmore and Jason Ditmore. But the entire Panther defense is to be congratulated for a job well done.

Jason Ditmore led the Panthers with 96 yards on 9 carries. Jade Warren had 39 yards on 5 tries. Kevin Hirst got 28 on 7 keepers and his yardage was held down because

of being tackled for two big losses on pass tries. Cory Pack got 19 on 1 carry. Stephen Scitern had 27 yards on 4 totes. Matt Jones and Rajee Patel each had 16 yards. Jeremy Ditmore got 12 on 3 tries and Kris Scitern had 2 yards on two tries.

This Friday night the Panthers travel to Cisco (again) to take on the Lobos. The Panthers will be looking to even things with the Lobos who defeated the Panthers last year in Cisco by a 16 to 14 margin. But the Panthers will have to have an outstanding performance from both the offense and defense to get a victory at Cisco as the Lobos have another very fine team. So let's all travel to Cisco to boost the Panthers on to victory.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

thank the good Lord for the moisture at a time when it was needed the most.

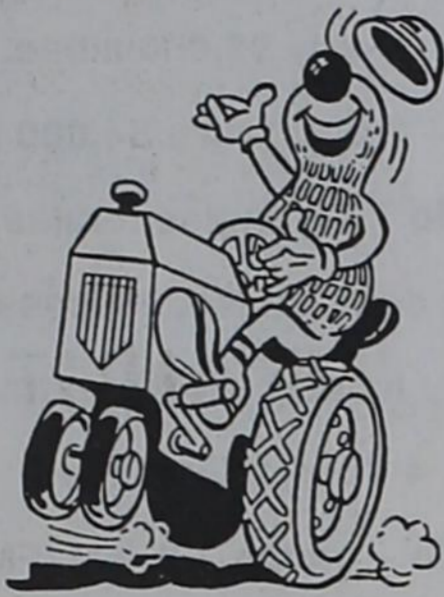
