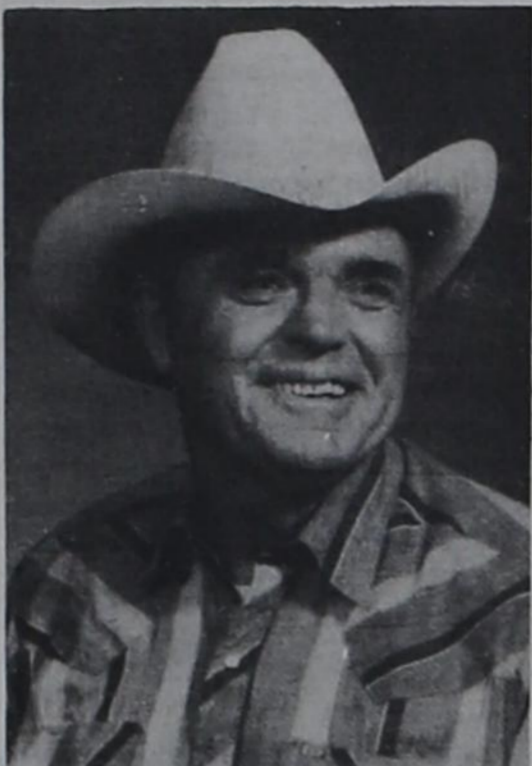

Calvin Ainsworth Seeks Office Of Commissioner Precinct No. 2



Calvin Ainsworth, a candidate placed on the ballot for the March 13, 1990 Democratic Primary election for Eastland County Commissioner, seeks the support of Precinct 2 voters.

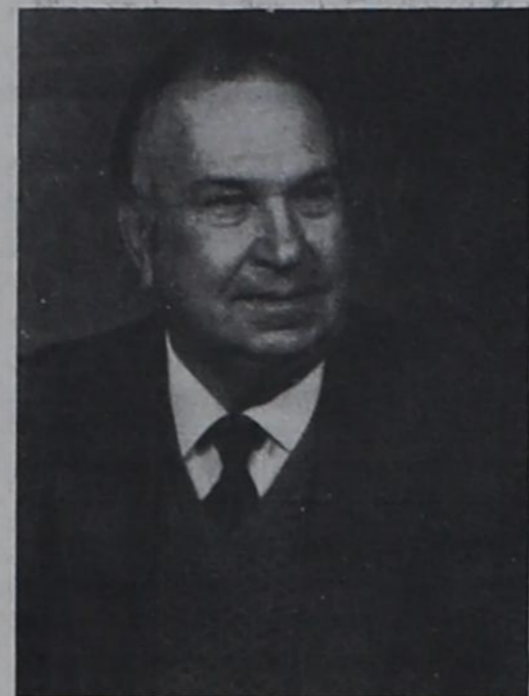

Truman P. Kirk Announces For District Attorney



Truman P. Kirk is an attorney and counselor at law and has been in general practice of law in Eastland County for over 20 years. Before that, he was prosecutor for the cities of Odessa and Abilene (as a City Attorney). He also served on the city council for Abilene and taught government classes in Odessa and Cisco Junior Colleges. He is a graduate of Abilene High School, Hardin Simmons University and the University of Texas School of Law. He and his wife, Evelyn, were married February 14, 1948 and have four children and nine grandchildren. Their youngest son, Kevin, is a student at Baylor University where his brother and sister graduated several years ago. Evelyn has been an elementary teacher in Eastland County for 22 years. She has taught in both Eastland and Cisco.

Mr. Kirk makes this statement for his candidacy for 91st Criminal District Attorney:

"By law, every four years the office of District Attorney becomes vacant and the citizens of the county are given the privilege of voting to fill that vacancy. I would like to make application to our Eastland County voters for that position. I feel that I have the qualifications for the job and I would work hard to give the kind of performance you have the right to expect.

I spent the first several years, after I earned my law degree, in law enforcement (city prosecutor and city judge). I left that field to enter general law practice. South Eastland County Hospital District Election Slated For February 24th

South Eastland County Hospital District Board of Directors set February 24th for the Election of Dissolving the Hospital District in a meeting held Monday night.

The district was created in 1967 to supplement the expenses of the Hospital.

Blackwell Hospital closed September 16, 1986 after 67 years of Medical Service to the Community. The Hospital had approximately \$600,000 in debt when it closed.

The District declared bankruptcy in January 1988 and an Auction was held in August the same year to help pay some of the Creditors. Also Taxes continued to be collected and with the sale of the Hospital on May 12, 1989 to Dr. Clay Salyer of Dublin, the district was debt free.

Gov. Bill Clements has signed into law H.B. 1841 which provides for the dissolution of South Eastland County Hospital District. The Bill became effective on August 28, 1989.

H.B. 1841 states when the District is dissolved this would transfer any remaining assets and obligations to Eastland County after December 31, 1981. The County will also assume responsibility for indigent health care in the district at that time.

Any and all delinquent hospital taxes will be collected by the County of Eastland.

The former Blackwell Hospital is currently undergoing renovation under the direction of the new owners, Dublin Recovery Centers, Inc. The 20,000 square foot health facility will house approximately 80 patient beds for Acute Care and Chemical Dependency patients.

The Center will be staffed with Physicians and Chiropractor. The opening is slated for some time in June.

W. C. "Check" Smith Laid To Rest Tuesday

William C. "Check" Smith, 86, a longtime Chevrolet and former John Deere farm equipment dealer in Gorman, passed away on Sunday, January 14th at Canterbury Villa Care Center in Gorman.

Services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel with burial in the Oaklawn Cemetery of Gorman.

Mr. Smith was born November 20, 1903 in Rucker and spent most of his life in Gorman. With his older brother, Ed, he opened an auto repair shop in the 30's and in 1945 became the Chevrolet dealer, which has continued through the present.

He was a member of the Gorman Masonic Lodge No. 716, a 32nd degree Nason and a member of the Moslah Temple of Fort Worth.

Mr. Smith was an aviation pioneer and a longtime member of the Texas Private Flyers Association.

Active in his community, he was the founder of the Gorman Housing Authority and served numerous years as mayor.

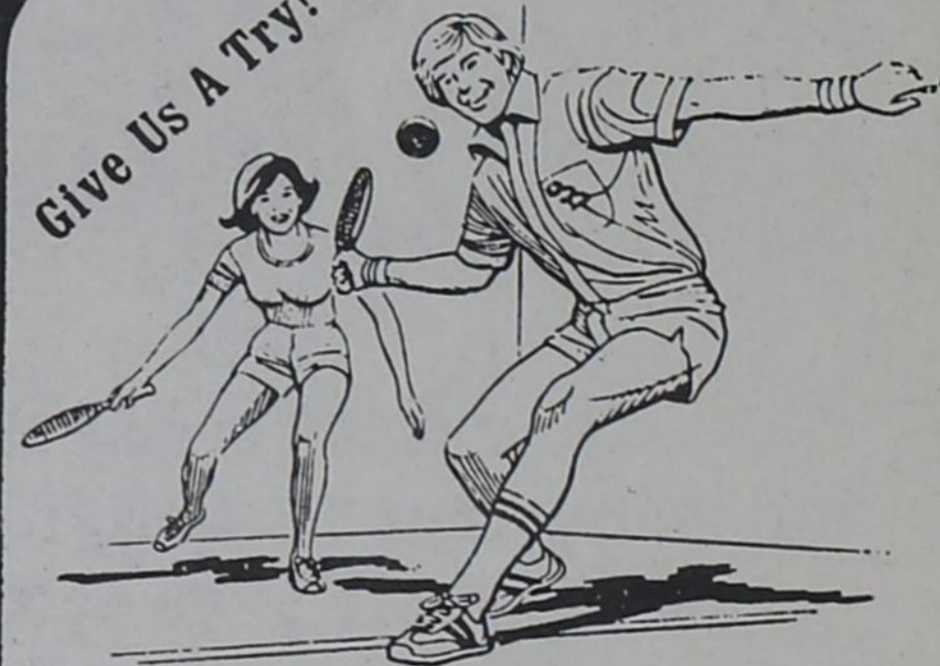

Regional 9-1-1 Implementation Underway

With the beginning of the collection in January, implementation of a 9-1-1 system has begun in the West Central Texas Council of Governments' region, according to Sue Smith, WCTCOG 9-1-1 Director.

"Residents in 12 regional counties will see the first \$5.50 per month per customer line fee appear on their January telephone bills," said Smith "with the remaining five counties phased in during February, March and April." Eastland and Comanche County collections began in January.

System activation will occur approximately 24 months after the beginning of fee collection with assistance from state surcharge funds collected for this purpose from a surcharge on customer bills in the state's largest counties since last July. "Policy across the state has been to collect fees for a planned time period, while the 9-1-1 system is being installed, so that when the system goes on line, all initial costs are paid," Smith stated. "With the help of approximately \$450,000 in surcharge monies," Smith continued "our regional system can start operations in the black." To cover ongoing costs, the \$5.50 fee will continue after the system begins operation.

During the implementation phase, many telephone switching offices will be modified, equipment purchased and field-tested for each answering point, calltakers trained, and in many places, rural addressed developed for individual citizens.

Smith stated, "9-1-1 can help to save lives and property and we are excited about the prospect of this service being available in all rural areas of our region."

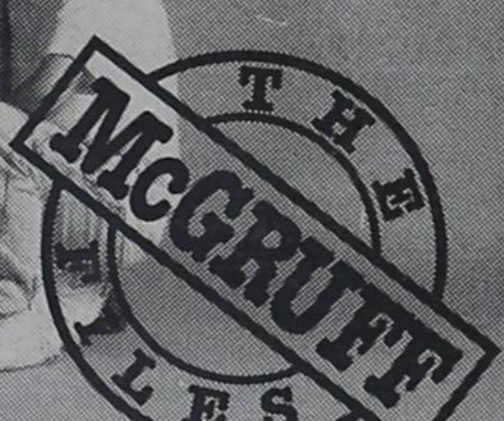
