

It was my first trip to Europe, and my son was a wonderful tour guide. I also visited in parts of Germany and Holland while I was there. I was able to see many of the old beautiful churches and cathedrals and old castles, the most beautiful and interesting one being in Heidelberg, Germany. We visited sights in Frankfort, Germany and followed the Rhine River to St. Goar, Germany. While in Belgium I also visited Antwerp and Bruggs, seeing interesting museums, castles and cathedrals. I also took a boat ride down the canal in each of the countries. All of the cities where I visited had narrow cobblestoned streets and sidewalks. Yet people drove fast, and made their way down these narrow two lane streets, along with the street cars and bicycles. One of the interesting facts about Amsterdam, Holland is that the population is between seven and eight hundred thousand, with five hundred thousand bicycles! Another interesting fact is that dogs are allowed everywhere. One night we were dining at a small restaurant, and the people next to us had a big sheep dog under the table with them! Public rest rooms are labeled W. C. (Water Closets). People who reside in Brussels speak mostly French and Flemish, although there are many other nationalities who also live there.

I enjoyed my fantastic trip, but it was good to return to the good ole U.S.A. where I could hear English spoken, and understand our monetary system. (Each country has their own monetary system - in Belgium it is Francs).

## Vermillion-Schneider Panthers Outlast Rattlers 44-29; **Travel To Cross Plains Friday Night**

The Gorman Panthers opened District 14A play on a bright note on Friday as they defeated the Tolar Rattlers 44 to 29 at Brogdon Field. The win gives the Panthers a 4-2 season mark and a 1-0 district record.

The Panthers started off right as they stopped the Rattlers and took the ball on their own 36 following a punt and moved to the Tolar 18 in 11 plays and scored on a 28 yard field goal by Kevin Hirst with 6:14 left in the initial period.

The Rattlers came back to tie the score at 3-3 when David Felkins booted a 25 yard field goal with 1:44 left in the period. This score followed the recovery of a Panther fumble at the Gorman 19. The field goal came after the Big Red defense held the Rattlers to 3 yard on three plays.

Then following the Tolar field goal the Panthers took the kickoff on their own 45 and scored in 10 plays with Kevin Hirst racing for the final 14 The couple will reside in the yards on a keeper play with 9:18 left in the second period. The drive featured a 13 yard first down run by Stephen Scitern and a 13 yard pass th Matt Jones to set Gorman up at the Tolar 14. The kick for point after failed and the score was 9 to 3.

The Rattlers came back to take the lead after getting the ball on the Gorman 49 and scoring in 6 plays with Michael Phillips doing the honors from 2 yards out with 1:58 left in the period. Felkins added the point after and Tolar led 10 to 9.

But the Panthers were not to be denied as they took the ball on their own 34 with 1:50 left and scored in 6 plays with Jeremy Ditmore scoring on a beautiful 16 yard pass with 56 seconds left. The drive featured a 15 yard run by Hirst and a 30 yard pass reception by Jason Ditmore. Jason Ditmore added the two pointer on a run and Gorman took the lead at 17 to 10.

During the halftime activities the Panther Marching Band gave a very enjoyable performance with precision marching and outstanding playing and received overwhelming applause from the crowd. The band is looking forward to the upcoming band contest and is improving greatly week by week. Following the halftime intermiss-

ion the Rattlers got possession of the ball on the Gorman 30 following a fumble and scored in just three plays. The first play lost 8. Then Bell ran for 34 yards to the Gorman 4. From there Troy Bell carried it in with 10:53 left in the third. The kick for point failed and Gorman led by a 17-16 margin.

However, the Panthers showed their desire to win by coming right back and going 63 yards in just two plays with Jason Ditmore getting the final 61 yards on a beautiful run with 10:04 left. The try for point failed and the Panthers extended their lead to 23 to 16.

After getting the ball via a fumble recovery at the Tolar 43 the Panthers scored in 7 plays with Jason Ditmore going in from two yards out with 6:43 left in the third. The drive featured a 12 yard pass to Stephen Scitern and a first down run of 8 yards by Hirst. The point after try failed and

The Rattlers were not ready to throw in the towel and after recovering the ball on their own 25, went the distance in 13 plays with Pete Gonzales getting the final three yards with 23 seconds left in the and the score stood at 29 to 23.

The Panthers then took the ensuing kickoff on their own 34 and Ditmore again getting the honors from 6 yards out with 8:19 left in the fourth. The drive featured 9, 7 and 18 yard runs for first downs before the TD. Stephen Scitern scored the two pointer on a run and the Panthers upped the score to 37 to 23.

Gorman added another touchdown with 2:19 left after taking the ball on their own 16 and scoring in 9 plays with Kris Scitern racing in from 20

yards out on a thrilling run for the TD. Hirst added the point after and Gorman took a 44 to 23 lead.

But the Rattlers weren't through as they took the ball on their own 40 and moved the distance in 8 plays with Phillips getting the final yard on a run with just 41 seconds left. The try for two points failed and the final score was 44 to 29.


Jason Ditmore led the Panthers with 151 yards on the ground and 33 yards in passing, with three touchdowns and a two point conversion. Hirst had 78 yards on 10 tries. Kris Scitern got 36 yards on 6 runs. Stephen Scitern had 13 on 3 totes. Rajee Patel ran i time for 6. Cory Pack ran once for a -2.

The Big Red defense did a good job of holding the Rattlers, who heavily outweighed the Panthers on the front line. With the exception of Gorman extended the lead to 29 to a couple of long runs and a couple of long passes, the Big Red did their job well.

This Friday night the Panthers travel to Cross Plains to take on the Buffaloes in a crucial District 14A contest. The Buffs were defeated last week by the Rising Star Wildcats 34 third. Felkins added the point after to 0, so they will be trying to get back in the district race with a victory over the Panthers. So the Big Red defense will be really tested as the Buffaloes scored in 10 plays with Jason have an outstanding runner named Todd Brown, who was out last week due to injuries. And the Buffs are a different team with Brown in the backfield.

However, we look for the Panthers to also be ready for the battle and to continue their winning ways in the district race.





#### **ABSENTEE VOTING BEGINS** WEDNESDAY, **OCTOBER 17TH**

AUSTIN - The extended absentee balloting period began on Wednesday, October 17th for those registered to vote in the Tuesday, November 6th general election, Texas Secretary of State George Bayoud

During the extended absentee voting period, which runs through Friday, Nov. 2, registered voters can appear at county courthouses and other absentee polling places across Texas to cast ballots for the Nov. 6 election, said Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer. The deadline to vote in the Nov. 6 election was October 9.

"What this absentee voting period does is provide Texans with an additional 17 days to vote, instead of just on election day," Bayoud said. "If you are registered to vote, there simply is no excuse to stay away from the polls."

Under a 1987 state law that relaxed absentee voting requirements, registered voters need not give a specific reason for casting in-person, ballots during the extended voting period, Bayund explained.

"If you have made up your mind who you are going to vote for, consider taking advantage of the extended period," Bayund said. "It's real convenient and you can avoid the lines on election day."

This year Texans will elect a U. S. Senator, governor, lieutenant governor and scores of other statewide and local officeholders.
