#### PECAN NUT CASEBEARER CONTROL

The time to be looking for pecan nut casebearer is here. This is one insect you really need to look for before you try to control it.

By using a computer and weather data Extension Entomologist try to predict when the first significant nut entry will occur. The closest reporting location to Eastland is Stephenville. The first significant entry is predicted to occur May 24th in Stephenville. This prediction is simply an aid to help you to know when to look for eggs.

The adult moth deposits the eggs on the tips of the nutlets. The newly laid eggs are greenish white in color and are just visible to the naked eye. The egg will turn brown before the larva hatches. The larva hatches from the egg in 4 to 5 days.

Nut entries can be easily seen by the bits of frass and webbing projecting from entered nuts. A single larva can destroy several of the nutlest in a

The general recommendation is to examine 300-400 nutlet clusters for

the greenish white eggs. Treatment is needed if one percent or more of the nutlet clusters have casebearer eggs or have been tunneled by casebearer larvae. Spray trees thoroughly when egg hatch is occuring.

There are several products available to homeowners to control the casebearer which includes diaxinon, Cygon, or malathion. Commercial pecan orchards also have products such as Lorsban, Asana, Thiodan, Guthion or Cymbush available to use for casebearer control. Check the label of the product you are using closely for any restrictions if there is a chance of drift onto a vegetable garden or pasture area where livestock will graze. Read and follow label instructions when using any pesticides.

You sholud inspect nutlest 5 to 10 days after the first application and another application may be required if the first generation is split.


Control measures of the second generation pecan nut casebearer should be applied 42 days after the first casebearer spray.



#### **GEAR UP FOR GARDEN PESTS**

Gardening season is here and with it come insect pests that are sure to be around. Gardeners need to prepare for garden pests early.

First, gardeners should inspect insecticides left over from last year to determine if they are still

If properly stored, most products should have at least a two-year shelf life once they begin to be used. Dusts sometimes have a tendency to absorb moisture if the bag is not sealed tightly after each use; they should not be used if lumpy.

Place bags containing insecticides in a clear, polyethylene bag and seal it with a rubber band to keep moisture out.

If dusts are two years old or older and there is any doubt about their storage, dispose of them according to label directions and buy new insecticide.

Although liquid materials are not as likely to absorb moisture, storage is still important. Caps should be resealed tightly on the products after each use. Do not use liquids which are cloudy or milky in color or which have sediments on the bottom of the container.

Do not store pesticides on a shelf in front of a window, especially if the window gets strong afternoon sun. Do not store liquids in an area subjected to extreme temperature fluctuations. Extremes from summer to winter temperatures may not furt the active ingredient in the insecticide, but it may damage the ability of the product to mix properly in water.

If liquid materials are at least two years old and have not been stored properly, monitor vegetables closely after spraying to determine if the pesticides are controlling insects.

pesticides that will be needed for the cropes to be grown. Select insecticides by considering the plants and the period for insect control before repeating the application. This also will affect time from application until a safe time for harvesting.

Finally, know exactly what is being sprayed on plants and the amount. Don't jeopardize plants by spraying first and then checking for possible plant damage.

To help you identify the right insecticide for the pest you may have, I have a publication called "Vegetable Garden Insects and Their Control". This publication may be picked up at the county Extension office located in the basement of the county courthouse.

Participating in the Leader Day from Eastland County Farm Bureau were Mr. and Mrs. Leo Williams.



Cotton was not represented due to a serious last minute conflict, but they provided us with written material to leave with Congressmen and gave us full authority to speak in their behalf. Larry Meyers and I represented peanuts.

The full team met with Congressman Charles Stenholm and his ag aide, Stan Ray, with Jennifer Yezak on Senator Bentsen's staff (Bentsen had to be on the Senate floor at that hour) and House Ag Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza.

In addition, Larry and I met with U. S. Senator John Warner from Virginia, Oklahoma Congressman Glenn English, Hazen Marshall with Oklahoma Senator Don Nickles, Dan Weber with Oklahoma Senator David Boren, Chuck Penry with Alabama Senator Howell Heflin, Mark Eaton

Larry and I also met with James D. Grueff, Director of USDA's Multilaeral Trade Policy Affairs Division and his Deputy Craig Horn. The purpose of that meeting was to check our interpretations of what the U.S. Trade officials are proposing for peanuts under a GATT Agreement. We can say what is being proposed is about what we have been saying for several weeks.

The Section 22 Commodity Coalition joined for lunch to get acquainted prior to the meetings with Congressmen. It was agreed that we will continue as a close knit working group until such time as any GATT Agreement is submitted to Congress and until Congress takes final action. Our dependence on Section 22 or some provision offering similar protection is, of course, the common thread that will keep us together.

The concensus of all those we talked to is that the President will get his extension of fast track authority. The common theme of all of our meetings with Congressmen was to ask that they use their influence to help us in securing provisions as a part of any eventual GATT Agreement that will allow us to continue to have workable programs.

If there is to be a GATT Agreement, it could occur toward the end of this year and, if so, could affect 1992 crops. If GATT discussions are extended into 1993, farm changes would be delayed for another year.

Most of the elected officials we met with (or their staff members) indicated or stated out right that they would vote to extend fast track, but without exception they assured us of their help in our effort to retain our

We have some ideas of compromise provisions that possibly could work in lieu of Section 22 and to satisfy the reduction of "internal subsidies", but there are some gray areas and numerous unexplained questions. We are very much in a learning process at thia time and most of the GATT concepts are new

For these reasons we feel it would be premature at this point to begin to attempt to be specific with you. We will, along with our Section 22 Coalition members, closelt monitor developments so as to be in a position to react at the appropriate times. We must also realize that a GATT Agreement may not occur, although there will be a major push if fast track becomes a reality next week when votes are expected in both the House and Senate on that question. Some we talked with believe there will be some kind of an international agreement; others feel it will not happen, principally because of the reluctance of the European Countries to reduce their programs. Some believe because of recently much higher farm program costs in Europe, the E.C. will agree to lower their subsidies. We were told that Japan wants our Section 22 on the table so that its rice import barriers are not so vulnerable.

One prominent Congressman feels strongly that if there is A GATT Agreement Peanust must be a part of it. We said, otherwise when farm bill time comes, peanut program adversaries could blow us out. But, he hesitated to say if Section 22 must go, we can have a Section "22A" that can afford us the essential protection.

A Dairy Bill will be moving through Congress very soon. It will be patterned after the Peanut Program, except that the quotas will not be capitalized - - they can be used onlu by the producer so long as he continues in production - - not leased or sold or otherwise acquire value. In fact the production apportionments will be called franchises. The program is to be fashioned so as to be GATT legal. There was a suggection by one Congressman that under some conditions supply management programs can be eligible for certain GATT exemptions. Although the legislative activity on the Dairy Bill will be much in public view because of GATT talk and for other obvious reasons, we are told that these discussions will not constitute an opening of the 1990 Farm Bill for be limited to the Dairy Program.

We feel that our time in Washington was very productive. First, we cemented our Section 22 Coalition. Second, we made it clear to our key. Congressional players that since they are supporting fast track, we are depending on them to give, strong support to our effort to. develop workable program alternatives if GATT negotiations progress steadilly toward a binding international agreement. Third, we had most of our original perceptions of what the Administration Trade Team has in mind for peanuts confirmed and fourth, the various discussions, on GATT opened some avenues for, further exploration of program alternatives that might be available. under GATT.

You will be interested in knowing that CBS News in Washington taped a TV interview yesterday (May 16) with James Mack of the Nut Salters and Peanut Butter Association and Texas Congressman Dick Armey on one side of the peanut import issue and Larry Meyers on the other side, Armey and Mack reportedly had two days notice. Larry filled in on only a few minutes notice since several key Congressmen contacted by CBS were not available. The tape was short and was shown at a late hour, other changes. Considerations will but we understand Larry did an excellent job.

The Church of Christ here in Gorman will begin showing a series of films this Wednesday night, May 22, beginning at 7:00 p.m., that will deal with this subject.


