LARGE NUMBER ATTEND HOMECOMING

The 38th annual homecoming was well attended with 152 registering, and exes and teachers enjoyed a double treat as the annual Peanut Festival was held on the same weekend.

Many arrives early for the football game Friday night. The football stadium was overflowing and many had to stand during the game. Many more arrived early enough to view the Peanut Festival Parade at 10 a. m. Saturday morning.

The Panthers lost the homecoming game to Hico's Tigers on Friday night before a very large Homecoming crowd by the score of 20 to 14. The Panthers couldn't seem to get started the first half and were trailing 14 to 0 at the intermission. The Tigers scored first with 3:21 left in the period. They took the ball on their first possession on the Gorman 43 and scored in 1 plays with Brad Owen getting the final one yard for the score. A pass to Jake Gill added the two pinter and Hico led 18 to 0.

Then on their next possession after holding the Panthers the Tigers took the ball on their own 40 and scored in 7 plays with Brad Owen going the final 24 yards on a fine run with 8:24 left in the second. The try for two points failed and Hico led 14-0.

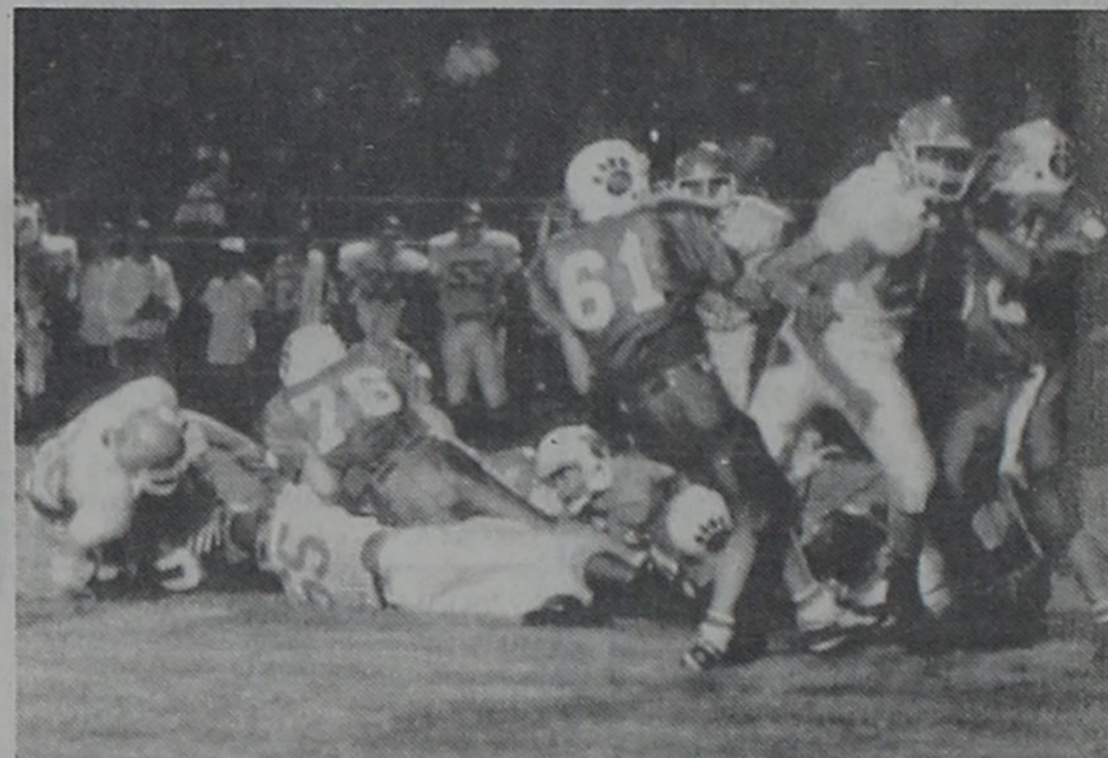

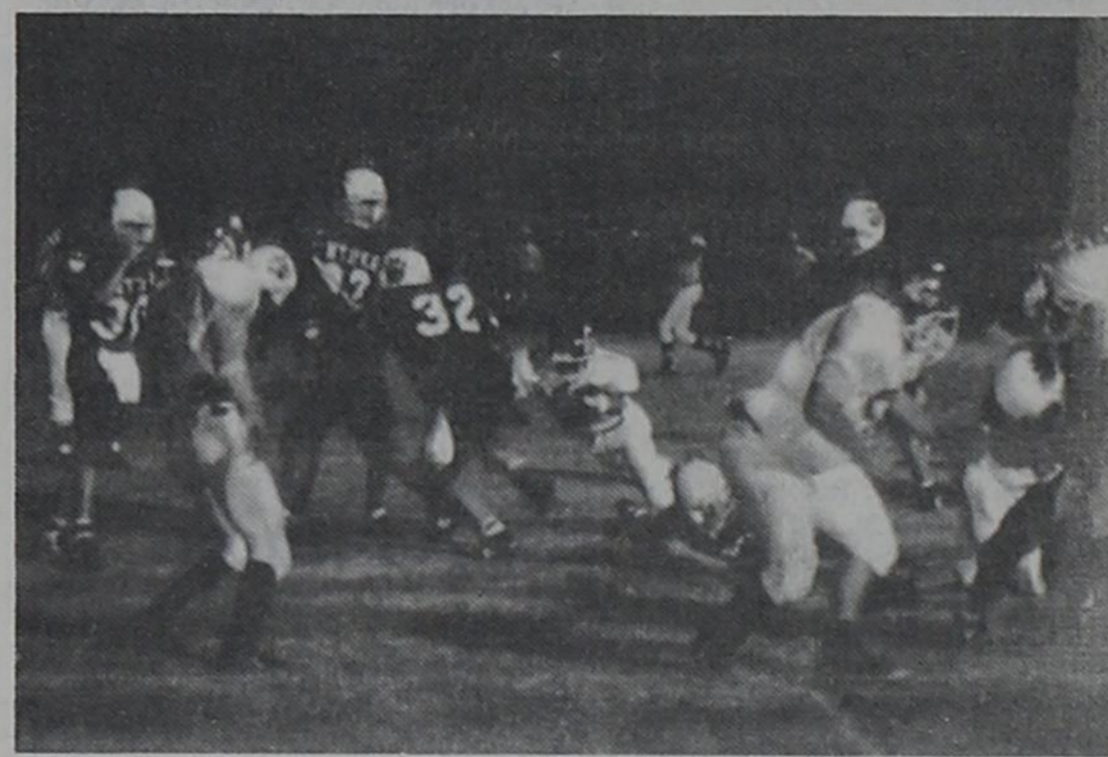

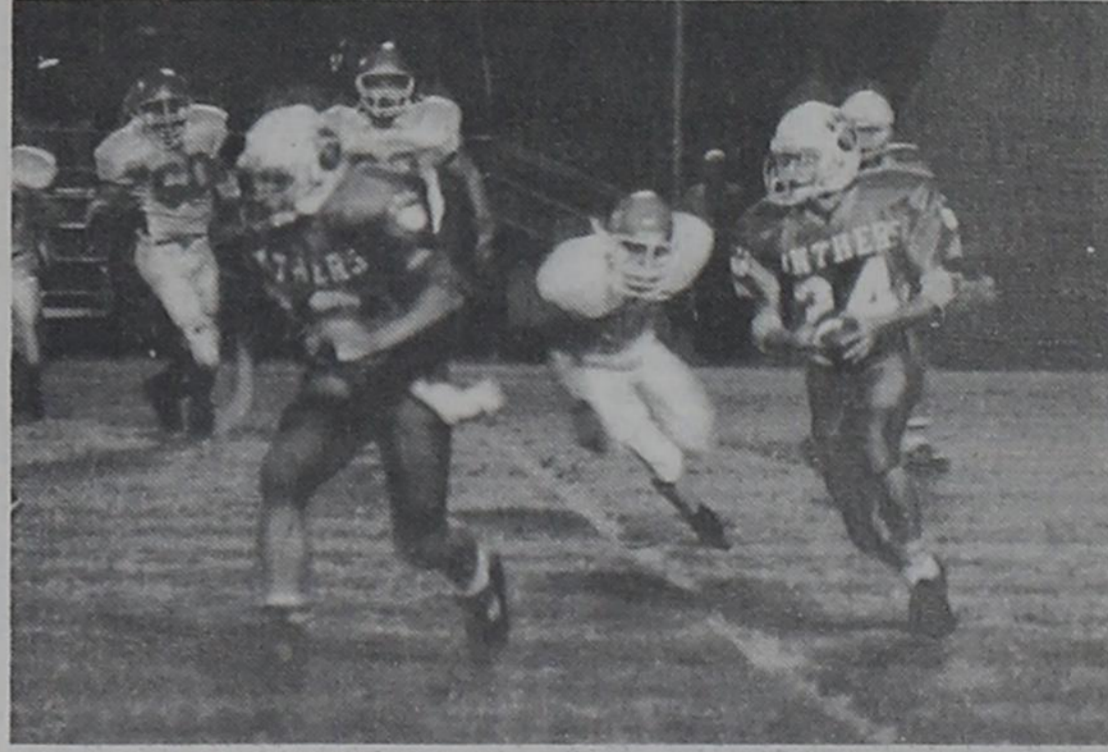

Alcohol abuse is a common problem today with our youth. Parents should be alert to the following trouble signs:

TROUBLE SIGNS

How can you recognize if people you love have turned to drugs or alcohol? Use these signs as a guide:

* They avoid family members and family gatherings and tend to isolate themselves in a bedroom.

* They prefer to spend lots of time with friends the family doesn't know.

* Family valuables, such as credit cards, cash, radios and cameras, come up missing without explanations.

* Alcohol or drugs are missing from liquor or medicine cabinets.

* They have problems at school or with the law.

* They lose interest in their usual activities, sports and hobbies.

* They complain about vague health problems, such as stomach aches, headaches and recurring colds.

* They become verbally or physically abusive, or they rebel and show anger toward authority.

* They have long, unexplained absences from home and unexplained visitors and phone calls.

* They show observable signs of alcohol or drug abuse, such as staggering, slurred speech and the smell of alcohol on the breath.

Remember alcohol is a "gateway" drug that often leads to youth using other drugs. With more parents both gone from the home because of their jobs, it is so important to know and observe for these problem signs.
