The bidding gets a little heated at times and auctioneer John Weaver, sells items, going, going and gone.

Next year the place will be in Meridian at a new community building there with Marquita in charge.

One of the cousins from Mississippi brought a copy of an article written about a reunion on June 30, 1911.

Reunion of the Living Sons and Daughters of Samuel Benton and Louemily Miears. "Sixty-six years ago S. D. Miears and Louemily Burk were married in matrimony after which were bron six sons and five daughters. Two boys died in infancy. Four boys and five girls grew up to man and womanhood. The marriage of our father and mother took place in the state of Alabama. They lived there about ten years and then moved to Pontotoc Co. Miss, where they lived until the beginning of the war between the States. Our father went to the cruel war and lost his life in the bloody battle at Franklin, Tenn., which was fought on the 30th day of November, 1864. Mother was left to educate the nine children. It was quite a burden for her as we were left in poor circumstances financially, and school houses in those days were negro cabins vacated by the negroes that had been freed by the struggle between the North and South not withstanding these disadvantages we all succeeded in learning to read and write. Two of the sisters now sleep in the old family cemetery ten miles south of Pontotoc town in Pontotoc County, Miss. The oldest boy of the family, J. P. Miears, rests in the De Leon, Texas cemetery. H. T. Miears, the next oldest boy, is buried at Red Rock, Texas.

"Mrs. Mattie J. Simmion, the oldest one of the family of children now lives in De Leon, Texas. She has raised a large family of children. Mrs. Ann Cost, the next oldest girl, lives in Taylorsville, Texas, Caldwell County. She also has raised a family of children. Mrs. Mollie King with her family, lives at Long Beach, Miss. A. J. Miears lives at Dale, Texas, Caldwell County, where he has lived for the last thirty years.

"S. D. Miears, the youngest one of the family, moved from Mississippi some six years ago, and now lives four miles northeast of Gorman, Texas in Comanche County. Some of the family came to Texas thirty-five years ago, when she was known as grazing lands, where thousands of cattle and horses roamed at will over the vast prairies that stretched their broad acres from the Red River to the Gulf of Mexico.

"The two boys and three girls now living, met at S. D. Miears home June the 30th, 1911, it being the first time we had all met together since Dec. 4, 1893.

"We all truly rejoiced that we had the privilege of meeting on earth once more. It is true we miss the two loving brothers and two darling sisters who have been taken from us. We are all growing old and in a few more short years will pass over the chilly waters where we hope to be united again as one family of children as in our youthful days.

"We have separated once more, of the least idea of ever meeting again with all the now living members of the family.

"May God bless us all as He sees best.

"A. J. Miears"

S. B. Miears is buried in the Civil War Cemetery in Franklin, Tenn. Other notes of interest: Samual Duncan Miears, who resided in the Gorman area married and had five boys by this first wife, and after her death, and the death of one of the young men, married Miss Martha and had several more children.

Several of the decendants now living in the Gorman-De Leon area are Ruby Bush, Ann Weaver, Jerry Bush, Doris Burleson, James Edward Miears, John Miears, Doil J. Miears, Johnny Weaver, James W. Miears, Bill Miears and W. H. Smith, Jr.

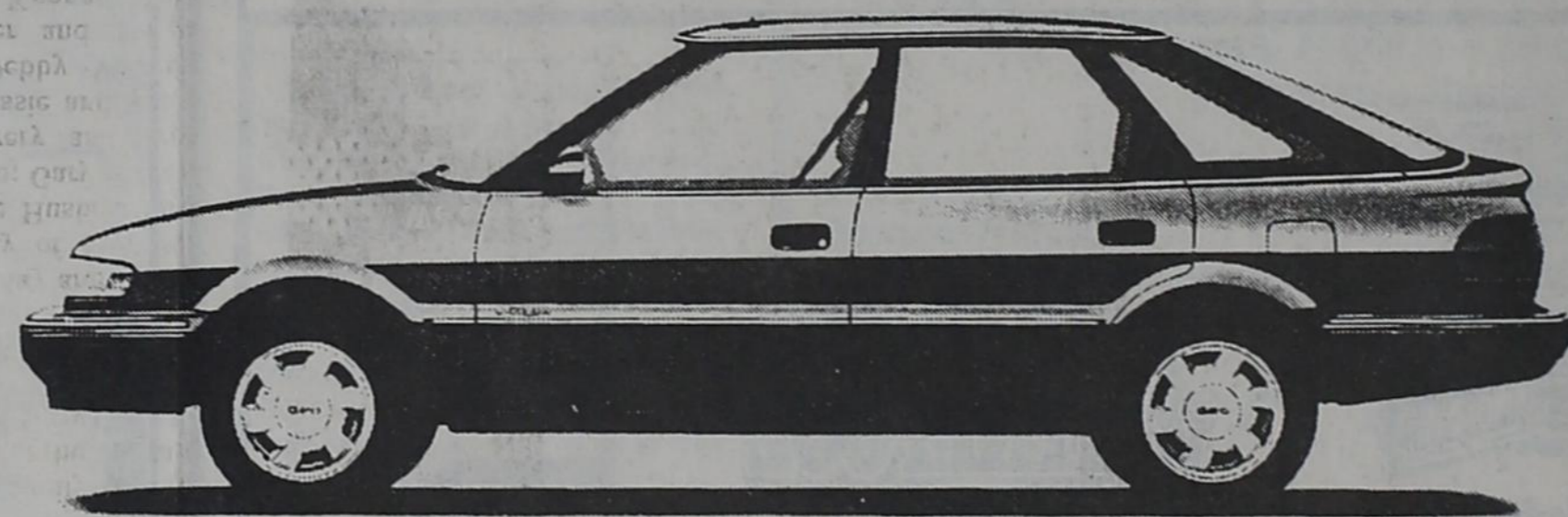
