Soon To Be Graduates Find Cold Prospects - Region South of Border

(TSTC at Waco) — Mention the South Pole to Texas State Technical College Student David Gibbs, and he thinks of snow, extremely cold temperatures and the opportunity of a lifetime. Gibbs, who will graduate from the Automotive Technology program in August, has signed a 12 month contract with the Antarctic Support Associates, a Colorado-based company which recruits qualified personnel to work in the South Pole. The contract states that Gibbs will work in McMurdo Station in the South Pole from October until October of 1992. The 22-year-old from Gorman, a small Texas town that Gibbs refers to

as "a little bitty town of about 1000 people," is looking forward to the adventure. He said the position he is taking is that of an inventory control specialist. "I'll be working in their warehouse overseeing all the automotive parts. There will be parts there for everything from C-130's down to snowmobiles," Gibbs explained. Gibbs has some idea of what to expect when he gets to McMurdo Station. He has been told that the ice there is 1500 feet thick, which is not surprising since the average temperature is only 50 degrees below zero. There is a bright side to that cold fact; Gibbs was told that ity sometimes gets up to 40 degrees in the summer months. As Gibbs put it, "They have cold summers, and even colder winters."

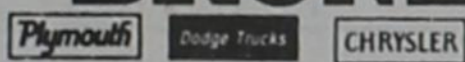

Sen. Bob Glasgow Introduces Sales Tax Bill

AUSTIN — Legislation authored by Senator Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville, that expands the number of cities that may adopt a local sales and use tax to be used to reduce local property taxes was approved today (August 23) by the Texas Senate.

Under the Glasgow amendment, all municipalities not served by

PEANUT FUNGICIDE UP-DATE

No good news available for peanut producers who have to fight Sclerotinia blight and Southern Blight. The EPA has turned down the Section 18 label request for Botran for use on peanuts. As of press time, the EPA has not granted a Section 18 label request for Tilt and it is questionable if they will approve the request. This means that both of these products cannot be used on peanuts.

The only fully labeled product for Sclerotinia Blight control is Rovral. Chemicals labeled for control of Southern Blight are Vitavax or Terraclor (PCNB). Read and follow label instructions for rates and applications. Additional information on these diseases and their control with these fungicides is available at the County Extension Office, 629-1093.

certain types of transit authorities could adopt an additional local sales and use tax, with the provision that the tax increase be linked to provide property tax reductions. The sales tax increase would be a local option measure, and subject to voter approval.

Current law allows municipalities that are not included within the boundaries of a rapid transit or regional transit system, and do not have a population of more than 67,000 to add an additional sales and use tax to provide tax property reductions. Denton's population is 66,270. The amendment made by Senator Glasgow will allow municipalities of any size to adopt the additional sales tax, subject to voter approval, as long as the municipality is not within the boundaries of certain transit systems.

Senator Glasgow added the new language as a floor amendment to Senate Bill 41. "This amendment was brought to me by the City of Denton, but will prove beneficial for municipalities throughout Texas," said Glasgow. "It will allow the voters to adopt a sales tax in order to provide property owners some relief from their ad valorem tax burden."

1991 Property Tax Rates in GORMAN ISD

This notice concerns 1991 property tax rates for GORMAN ISD. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law.
