



Homebuyer Rate Lowest in 14 Years

Washington - The Veterans Administration has slashed interest rates on VA loans to 8 percent, the lowest in 14 years, in an attempt to give veterans a better chance to buy

"This puts VA-guaranteed interest rates at a full two points below where they were in 1990 and clears the way for even more U. S. military veterans to buy and own their first homes," said U. S. Sen. Phil

The senator also expressed hope that the interest rate cut would stimulate the economy.

"Veterans who already own homes under VA loans should consider refinancing at this new, low rate," Gramm said.

He noted that the rate cut means the typicall mortgage payment under a VA loan will drop by \$121 a month.


