
The Gorman Panthers ended their season on a sad note on Friday night as they lost their final regular season game to the Baird Bears by the score of 15 to 7 on a cold night. The game was to decide the runner-up spot in District 14A sine both team shad been defeated by Tolar, District winner.

It was a heart-breaker for the Panthers as they outdistanced the Bears in total yardage and first downs, but were bitten by the fumble bug which actually cost them the ball game. It just seemed that the Panthers were simply not meant to win this game.

On the first possession the Panthers took the ball on their own 36 and had a good drive going before giving up the ball on a fumble at the Baird 31. The Big Red defense did their job in holding the Bears, forcing a punt. On the punt try the ball sailed over the punter's head. He went back to get the ball, got by the first Panther defended and raced down the sidelines for a touchdown. However, the Bears were called for an illegal block to set them up at the Panther 35. Again the Big Red defense held forcing the Bears to punt.



The Panthers came back a little later and had a drive going to the Baird 13 before being stopped.

Then on their next possession the Panthers got the ball on their 47 and scored in 6 plays with Jade Warren getting the touchdown on a 14 yard pass with 4?:06 left in the second period. The drive featured a 17 yard run by Kris Scitern and another 8 yarder for another first down by Scitern. Don Mauney kicked the point after and Gorman led 7-0.

Then with 2:00 left in the half the Bears got on the scoreboard on a 39 yard run by Eric Watson. A pass try for two points failed after a bad snap and the score stood at 7-6 at halftime.

Following the intermission the Bears could not move the ball and punted to the Gorman 1 yard line. After making a first down on an 11 yard run by Kris Scitern, the Panthers were forced to punt after fsailing to move the ball and when the ball sailed over the punter's head in the end zone, the Bears tackled the Gorman punter in the end zone for a safety with 6:46 left. This made the score 8-7 Baird.

The Panthers got another great drive going late in the game, moving the ball inside the Baird 5 before again giving up the ball on a fumble.

The Bears got the insurance score with 2:32 left in the game. Following a Baird punt the Panthers again fumbled the ball giving the Bears possession on their own 5. Then the Baird runner broke free over the middle and raced 54 yards to the Gorman 1. From there Brad Johnson dove into the end zone with 2:32 left. Matthew Meadows added the point after and Biard was up 15 to 7.

But the Panthers could not get another drive going and the game ended with the Bears getting the playoff spot.

Gorman was hurt real bad by four turnovers, along with the injury to Jason Ditmore, the leading Panther ball carrier, who received two broken ribs early in the second period. 
39th Annual Co. Pecan Show Slated For Dec. 12 - 13
