

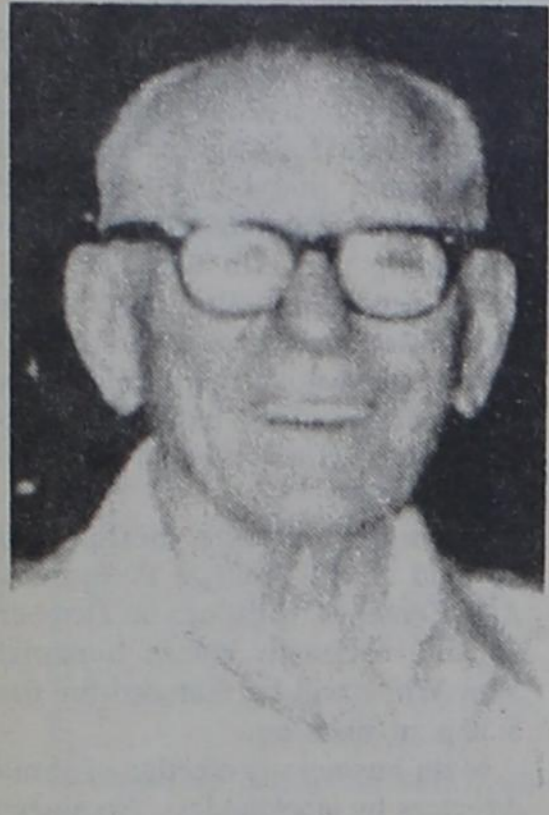

PEANUT MARKETING ASSESSMENT

Beginning with the 1991 crop year, a marketing assessment is due on each pound of farmer stock peanuts marketed or considered marketed. The rate of assessment is 1 percent of the quota national loan rate for peanuts marketed or considered marketed as quota peanuts and 1 percent of the national loan rate for peanuts marketed as additional peanuts.

Any person who is registered as a handler and buys peanuts from a producer must pay the assessment. The handler may collect 1/2 of the

assessment from the producer at the time of sale. The producer must pay the entire assessment for peanuts retained on the farm, marketed as private marketings or marketed outside the U. S.

DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

Several bills have been introduced in Congress which authorize disaster payments for participating and non-participating crops. Because of disaster conditions, producers are finding it necessary to destroy crops or to salvage as much feed as possible from disaster-affected crops. Producers may request appraisals on disaster-affected acreage and bin measurements for production from disaster-affected acreage of corn, grain sorghum, cotton, and peanuts. A measurement service fee will be charged for this service.

NEW WOOL & MOHAIR FILING PROCEDURE

Effective with the 1991 marketing year, wool and mohair producers are subject to the eligibility rules. Producers will have 15 days after filing the first sales receipt for a marketing year to file a person determination form. Wool and mohair producers must also certify that they are in compliance with highly erodible land and wetland provisions.

Under the new procedures, sales documents for 1989, 1990 and 1991 will be accepted if filed by March 2, 1992.

FALL PEANUT QUOTA TRANSFERS

A fall peanut quota transfer can be approved only if the transferring farm planted an acreage equal to 90 percent of the farm's effective quota, minus the farms effective undermarketings. Transfers must be approved prior to marketing the peanuts as quota peanuts.

We are maintaining a list for producers to indicate their need to transfer or receive quota. Final fall transfer date is January 31, 1992, stated David W. Martin, County Executive Director for the Eastland County ASCS.

Record Peanut Crop Expected

U. S. peanut production for 1991 is forecast at a record high 5.02 billion pounds, 39 percent more than last year. The previous record was 4.41 billion pounds set in 1984, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's latest crop production report.

The harvested area, estimated at 1.96 million acres, is 9 percent above last year. Yields are expected to average 2,558 pounds per harvested acre, up 567 pounds from 1990.

Texas farmers expect to harvest 310,000.0 acres of peanuts and produce a 604,500,000 pound peanut crop this year. Crop yields are expected to average 1950 pounds per acre. The 1991 production compares with 534,650,000 pounds of peanuts produced in 1990 and 484,700,000 pounds in 1989. "All eligible producers may obtain loans on their

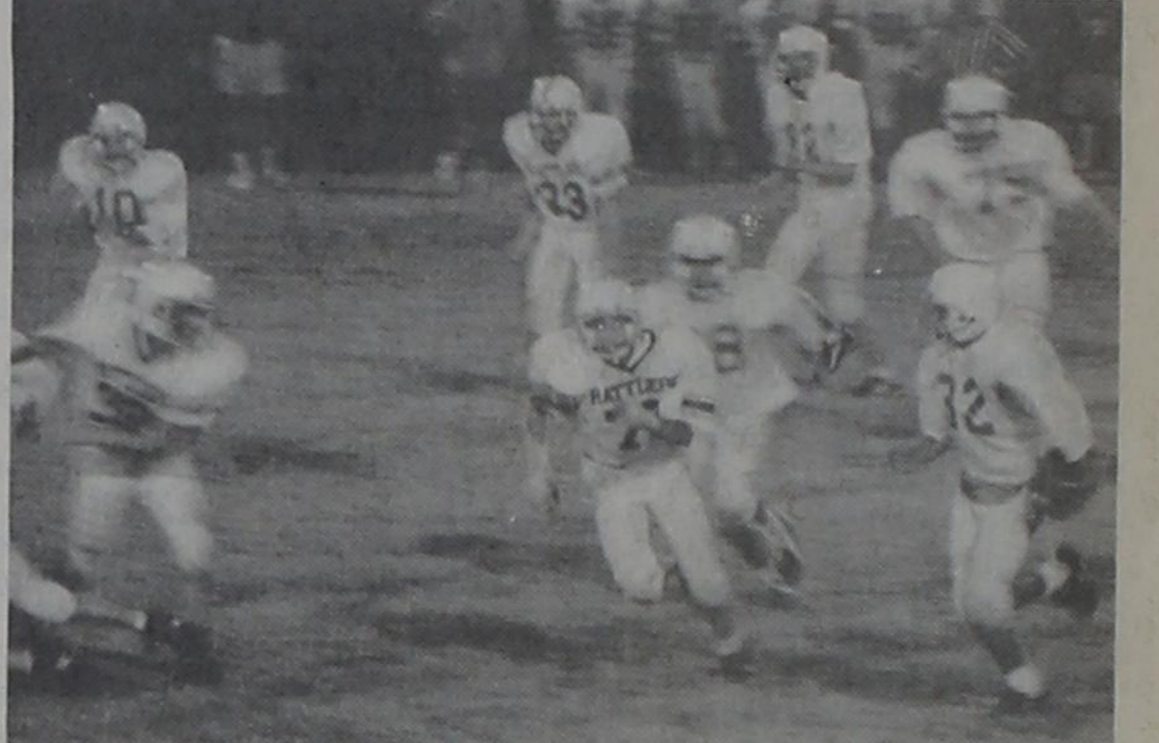
1991-crop peanuts," Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, said.

Price support loans will be available for warehouse-stored peanuts, and farm-stored additional peanuts, from harvest time through January 31, 1992. Loans on farm-stored quota peanuts will be available through March 31, 1992, he said.

Quota peanuts are those peanuts within the farm's poundage quota that are mandated for domestic edible use, or retained for use on the farm. Additional peanuts are peanuts that are placed under loan at the price support rate for additional peanuts, or are marketed through an approved contract for exporting or crushing. "Generally, additional peanuts are peanuts that are produced in excess of a farm's poundage quota," the ASCS official explained.

FARM AND GARDENS

FALL-TIME TO CONTROL PEACH LEAF CURL

Fall is the time when peach tree care is often forgotten or neglected. Fall is an important time for the control of peach leaf curl. Mid October till December 1st is the time to control this disease to insure a good crop next year. Applying a fungicide now can stop or reduce this disease that can attack peach trees.

Puckered and distorted peach leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide. A commonly used fungicide is Kodice 101.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and can cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly. Apply the copper-containing fungicide once the tree has gone dormant.

Other fungicides containing chlorothalonil can also be used to control peach leaf curl. A fungicide in this category is Bravo 720.

Which ever fungicide you select make sure you read and follow the

label instructions.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of peach trees. This also is the only time when peach leaf curl can be controlled.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AND MESQUITE CONTROL TOUR

A Wildlife Management and Mesquite Control Tour is scheduled for 9 a. m. Thursday, October 17th. Participants in the tour will receive 2 hours of continued education credits for private pesticide license holders.

The classroom session will cover wildlife lease management and an introduction to wildlife food plots. Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension Wildlife Specialist, will be presenting these subjects. The tour will then move to Bill Wright's wildlife food plots south of Eastland.

The last stop will also be on Wright's Ranch. This stop will examine a streamline basal mesquite control result demonstration and half cutting mesquite for quail cover. Dr. Tommy Welch, Associate Department Head and Extension Program Leader for Rangeland Ecology and
