Sheriff's Office To Enforce County Dumping Laws

The cumping of trash and other materials on county roads has long since been a problem in Eastland County and others. And now with the closing of many local landfill sites, the problem will most likely increase. The Eastland County Sheriff's Department has begun enforcing the laws concerning the dumping of trash, garbage and other refuse on county roads. Cases have already been reported and one subject is currently in jail and will assist in the cleanup of other roads in the area. A second incident, in Central Eastland County, has since been cleaned up by parties involved.

According to the 1990 edition of the Texas Traffic Laws, under the health and safety code, "An individual, firm, private corporation, or municipality commits an offense if that entity dumps, deposits or leaves refuse, garbage, rubbish, or junk on a public highway. Public highway means the entire width between property lines of a road, street, way, thoroughfare, bridge, public beach, or park in this state, not privately owned or controlled, if any part of the road, street, way, thoroughfare, bridge, public beach or park is opened to the public for vehicular traffic, is used as a public recreational area, or is under the state's legislative jurisdiction through its police power."

"A person can be charged with a Class C misdemeanor unless it is proven that the person has been convicted of the same charge previously, and in that case the charge will be enhanced to a Class A."

Also, "a person commits an offense if the person uses a motor vehicle to dispose of trash, refuse, waste, litter, or any other material in violation of a law (see above), or ordinance of the state or a political subdivision of this state. An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of not more than \$2,000.00."

So remember, before you dump that trash, make sure you have enough cash (to pay a \$2,000.00 fine) and time to spend in jail.

Please, let's all work together and report persons and vehicles seen dumping trash on our county roadsides. Help keep our county clean.

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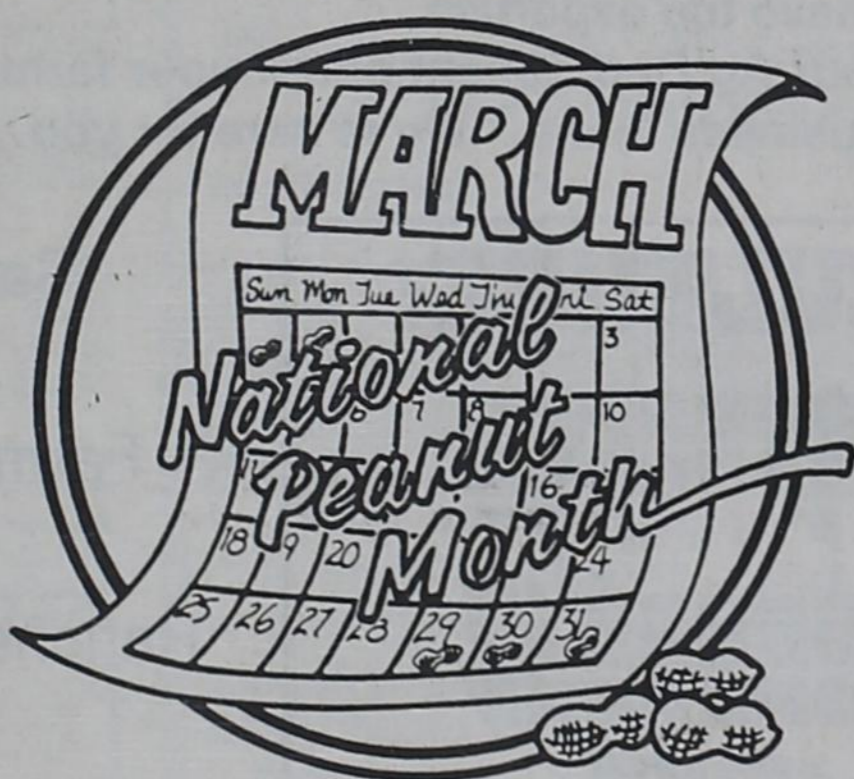
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Kathleen Richburg Held On Monday

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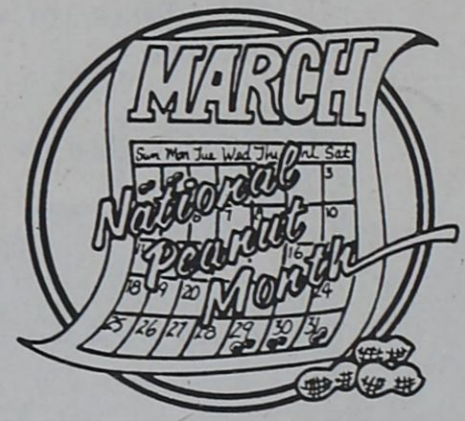

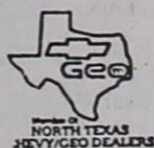

GETTING A HEAD START WITH SPRING TOMATOES

As I listen to the radio or read the paper, it seems like everyone has young tomato plants for sale. The weather we've been experiencing makes it hard to resist the urge to go ahead and buy some tomato plants and put them out. This year it may not be a bad idea, but remember what has happened in past years.

If you're going to plant tomato plants early it is a good idea to protect those young plants. Remember, in Eastland County the average date which the last frost occurs is March 27th. There has been some pretty hard freezes in April, which could kill tomato plants even with

protection. Here are two simple methods to protect young tomato plants.

If you are using wire tomato cages, you can turn each cage into a little greenhouse with a white or light colored plastic trash bag. Make sure that the plastic bag is large enough to go over the tomato cage. Anchor the bag to the bottom of the cage with dirt. Cut the bottom of the bag open so it may be pulled down over the cage to allow full sunlight to reach the tomato plant. At night or if the weather gets bad the plastic cover can be pulled up over the top of the cage and tied to make a nice protective greenhouse.

tomato plants is by using one gallon plastic milk containers. By cutting the bottom of the container off it can then be placed over the tomato plant. The cap of the container should be removed during the day to prevent over heating. When the cap is in place you will have a small greenhouse. Once the plant starts crowding the inside of the container it should be removed to give the plant room to grow. This method will not allow you to protect your tomato plants as long as the other method, but it should be long enough.

Both of these methods will help protect your young tomato plants from a late freeze and wind which can damage the plants. By planting your tomato plants now and providing some protection from the elements you can get a head start

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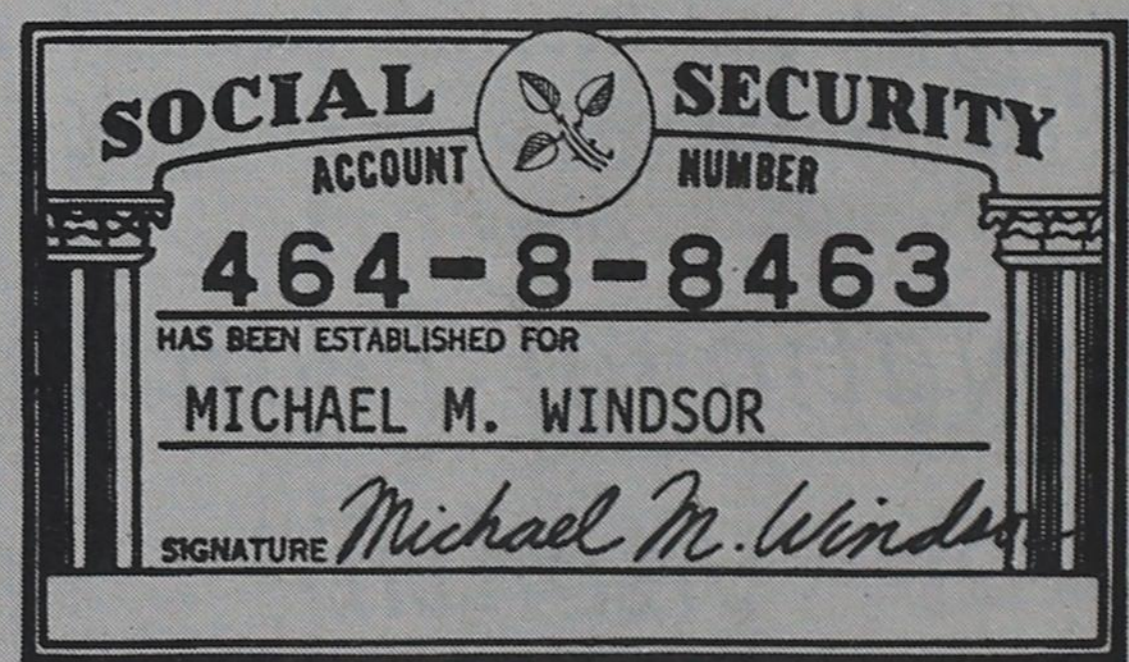
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**Rep. Bob Turner

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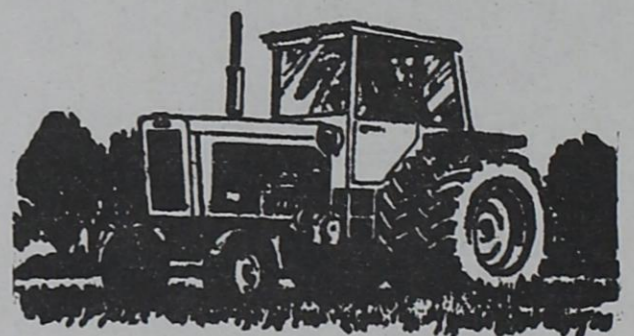
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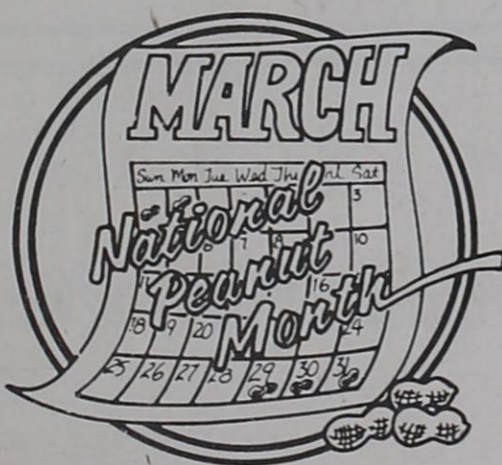

Peanuts quality crop

GORMAN — Texas peanut growers just recently harvested a record 1990 crop — and the quality was excellent to boot.

What's more, the price continued to rise steadily throughout harvest. Yield, quality and price — all three in one season.

That doesn't happen often.

In fact, Ross Wilson can't recall a year exactly like 1990 in his long and highly distinguished career in the peanut industry. Wilson is longtime manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association with headquarters in this busy little town that's famous for its peanuts, as are nearby towns like De Leon and Comanche. This is the very heart of Texas peanut country.

Wilson went to work here for Southwestern Peanut Growers in August, 1956 — or almost 35 years ago.

The veteran peanut leader points out that not only were yields excellent and the price strong, but the quality of the 1990 peanut crop in Texas was absolutely superb.

"Besides the record yield and price, the overall quality of the peanuts was just excellent in the Southwestern area," Wilson reports. "Only 2 percent of the peanuts failed to meet the stringent edible requirements."

That means that 98 percent of the peanuts could be marketed as edible nuts.

"That's the best (quality) I can remember, and I've been here almost 35 years," Wilson notes.

The Southwestern region also is coming off a record peanut crop. The average yield of the 1990 crop for Texas surpassed a ton of peanuts per acre. The previous record was just under 1,800 pounds in 1979.

"Not every farmer did that well — but most did," Wilson reports.

The prices for peanuts became stronger as the harvest season progressed. That's the opposite of what you might expect. But the soaring prices were brought on by big problems with the peanut crop in the Southeastern states — especially Georgia.

The 1990 Southeastern peanut crop, including Georgia, was about 35 percent of normal production. To further compound that shortfall, the Southeast had a dilemma with many peanuts that were inedible because of aflatoxin (a type of mold) problems at harvest. Some could be salvaged for seed. But most had to be sent to the crushing mill.

Meanwhile, the price for quality peanuts just kept rising during harvest.

"Farmers who came in last with their peanuts (harvest) benefited the most," Wilson notes.

The price started at \$675 per ton as the harvest season began for runner peanuts. That was about a \$40 premium over the government quota price of \$631.47 per ton. But the price just kept going up in \$25 to \$50 increments until the price peaked at \$1,250 per ton by the end of the season for runner peanuts. Meanwhile, the price for Spanish peanuts eventually increased to more than \$1,000 per ton during the same period.

In Texas, about 60 percent of the crop is runner peanuts. The other 40 percent is Spanish peanuts.

Wilson says that peanut farmers in the Big Country are optimistic looking toward the 1991 season.



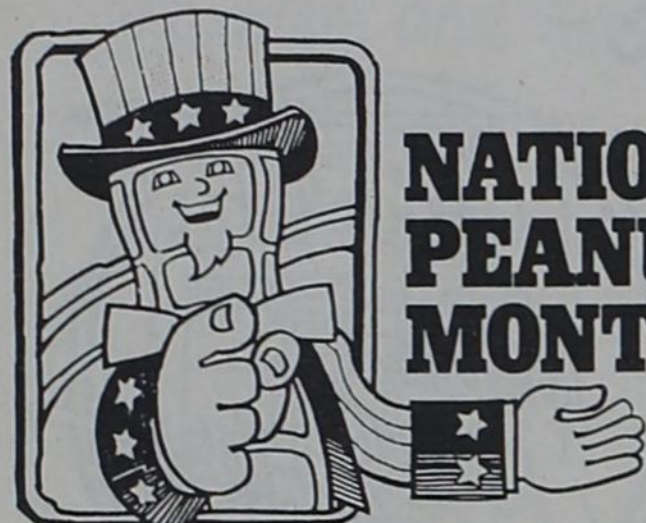
