PEANUT FESTIVAL SLATED SATURDAY

Everything is all set for "Go\$" for the big day on Saturday - the Gorman Peanut Festival.

Downtown has been decorated with flags, streamers and window decorations. Vendors booths will open at 8 a. m. downtown. Parade judging will be at 9 a. m. at the school where the parade entries will gather prior to the parade beginning at 10 a. m. Bill Chaney, weather and newsman at KTAB-TV in Abilene, will be the parade marshal.

Peanut cooking contest will be at the library building from 9:30 a. m. to 12 noon. Baked goods will be auctioned.

An outstanding Art Show will be held in the building formerly occupied by the Rountree Insurance. It will be open from 1 to 5 p. m. Cash prizes will be awarded to the winners.

The Lions Club will be selling hamburgers, sausage-on-a-stick and cold drinks all day and during the big street dance Saturday night. Stew, cornbread, homemade cobbler and drinks will be served in the Senior Citizens building from 11 a. m. to

1:30 p. m.

There will be other food booths open selling a variety of foods.

Panthers Shock Pirates 41-7; Play At Hamilton Friday Night

The Gorman Panthers opened their 1992 season on a high note Friday night when they hosted the Perrin-Whitt Pirates and handed them a 41 to 7 defeat. The Big Red defense held the Pirates scoreless for three quarters before the Pirates finally scored in the fourth.

The first score for the Panthers came on their second possession, when the Panthers took the ball on their own 47 yard line and scored in just three plays, with Tony Forbus getting the score from 9 yards out with 1:20 left in the initial period. The drive featured a beautiful scamper of 34 yards by Kris Scitem to set the Big Red up at the Pirate 9. The try for point failed and Gorman led 6-0.

The third possession by the Panthers also ended in a touchdown. Gorman took the ball on the Perrin 33 and scored in just four plays with Tony Forbus again getting the honors from 15 yards out with 10:05 left in the second. The drive featured a fine 11 yard run by Forbus. A pass from Rajee Patel to Shane Caraway added the two pointer and Gorman extended the lead to 14-0.

On the next possession by the Pirates, the Big Red defense recovered a fumble when Brent Skaggs jumped on the ball at the Gorman 48. The Panthers then covered the distance in 8 plays with Tony Forbus scampering for 21 yards on a fantastic run for the score with 5:32 left in the first half. Don Mauney booted the point after and the Panthers led 21-0.

With just 3:09 left in the half the Panthers scored again after recovering a Pirate bobble on the Perrin 32. Noah Landa recovered the ball for the Panthers. From there Gorman scored in four plays with Shane Caraway catching a beautiful pass from Rajee Patel and racing 15 yards for the score. The drive also featured a 17 yard pass from Patel to Flavio Herrera and a 10 yard run by Kris Scitem. Mauney kicked the point after and the Panthers went to the dressing room with a 28-0 halftime lead.

In the second half the Panthers

took the kick on the 50 yard line and moved the distance in six plays in a series that saw six penalties called by the officials. Kris Scitem got the honors with a great run from 17 yards out with 7:15 left in the quarter. The drive also featured a 13 yard scamper by Kris. Mauney kicked the point after and the Big Red were out front 35 to 0.

Then the Pirates started their only scoring drive of the night when they took the ball on their own 26 and scored in 14 plays with Mitch Ables scoring from 12 yards out with 11:02 remaining in the game. Ables also kicked the extra point and the score was 35-7.

The Panthers then came back with another score in the final period after they recovered a Pirate fumble at the Perrin 10. Following a one yard loss and a two yard run, Jeremy Sanders hit Shane Caraway with a fine pass from 9 yards out with 6:19 left in the game. The kick for point after failed and the final score read 41 to 7.

Tony Forbus led the Panthers on the ground with 138 yards on 20 carries. Kris Scitem had 91 yards on 12 tries. Scotty Walton had 16 yards on 4 carries. Rajee Patel had 13 yards on 4 keepers. Jeremy Sanders got 4 yards on one carry.

Shane Caraway had a good night catching the ball with two catches for scores and another for a two-point play.

The Big Red defense had a good night against the Pirates and looked good stopping the Pirate offense with only five first downs in the first half and five in the last half. The Panther pass defense held the Pirates 0 for 5 and did a great job of rushing the passer.

During the introduction of players and parents at the Parent's Night event, the coaches and players presented Memorial Plaques in dedicating this season to the memory of Terry Clark, Rex Jobe and Marilyn Warren. Each of these people have seniors playing this season.

And the Panthers will really have to be ready for a repeat of their performance against Perrin when they travel to Hamilton on Friday night to take on the Class 2A Bulldogs. The Bulldogs lost a close ball game on Friday night against a very strong Evant team by a single point. So the Panthers will need all the support we can give them, and Panthers fans are urged to follow them to Hamilton Friday night and back them all the way.

Don O'Neal To Be Homecoming Speaker On September 19th



B. D. (Don) O'Neal of Houston will be the speaker at the evening program for the 36th annual School Homecoming for Gorman.

Don attended Gorman Schools from 1942 to 1944, graduating in May, 1944. He spent two years as a World War II defense plant worker. He spent from 1946-49 in the U. S. Navy as an enlisted man. He graduated from Tarleton State College in 1951, where he was a distinguished student, member of scholarship society and served on the student council. Following graduation from Tarleton, he attended Texas A&M, graduating in 1953 with a BS degree in

petroleum engineering. He was a distinguished military graduate and spent 10 years in the U. S. Army Reserves.

Don retired in 1986 after spending 33 years with Exxon Company, USA in numerous engineering supervisory and professional roles. At the time of his retirement he was senior engineering advisor in Exxon USA's headquarters in Houston. He has spent the past six years as a self-employed consulting engineer. He is a twenty-five year member of the Society of Petroleum Engineers and is a registered petroleum engineer in the State of Texas.

Don's special interest is funding scholarships at Texas A&M University, Baylor University and the University of Tennessee.

His hobby is flying. He holds a private pilot and instrument ratings. Born in 1928 in Hamlin, he and his wife, Loni, reside in Houston.

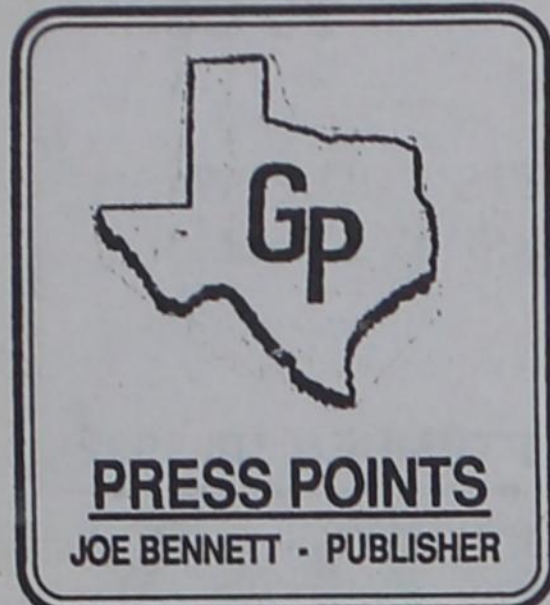

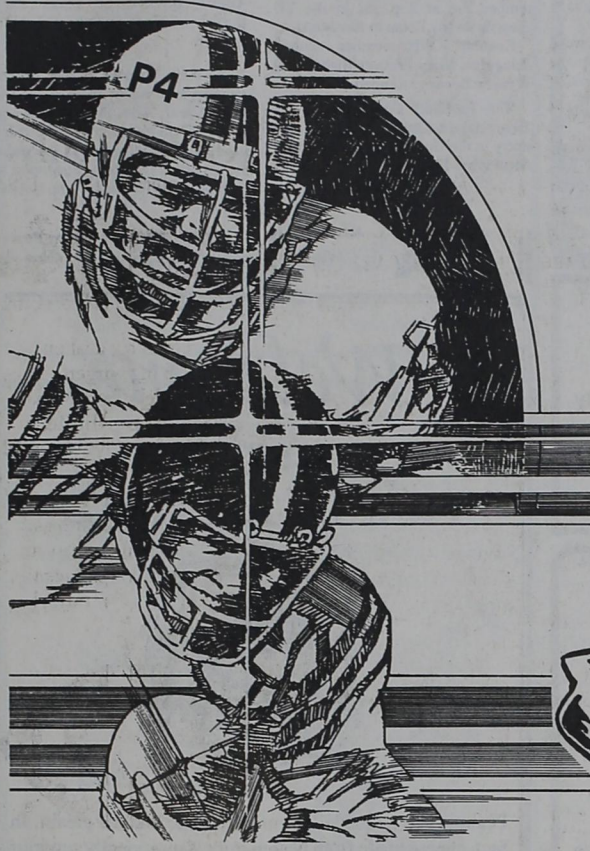

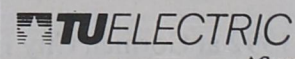

PARKS SHOULD BE KEPT OPEN INSTEAD OF BUYING MORE LAND

Waco ▽ Instead of locking the gates to 7 state parks, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TP&WD) should use the millions of dollars the agency has set-aside for new land acquisition to keep their existing parks open, according to the president of the Texas Farm Bureau, the state's largest farm organization.

"If Texas Parks & Wildlife can't maintain the parks that they have now, why should they spend more money on acquiring more land that they're not going to be able to maintain in the future," said S. M. True, a Plainview cotton, grain and cattle producer.

TP&WD officials have voted to close 7 state parks across the state, citing a lack of operating funds. True said the money is there, it only needs to be re-directed within the agency, without any additional cost to Texas taxpayers.

According to figures released by TP&WD, the agency's estimated

capital needs for fiscal years 1993-1998 total \$358 million. Of that total, \$265 million is dedicated to "acquisition, roughly 74 percent of the agency's funding needs.

"I think there is enough interest in the Texas Legislature to change the situation so that the money earmarked for land purchases can be transferred to cover the operating costs of the parks," he said. "Ninety eight percent of Texas land is privately owned, and unfortunately, TP&WD is determined to change that.

"They've said they want to 'buy back Texas'. Did they own it before?" True added.

Urban groups have also challenged the agency announcement, asking

state officials to spend more money on the development of metropolitan-area park facilities, instead of acquiring large tracts of land in remote regions of West Texas, where few citizens can utilize the resource.

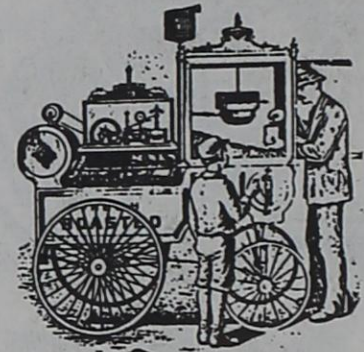

Notice of Comparable Tax Rates and Revenues

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 4,505 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 4,960 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.93444 for country education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require as school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Gorman School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .28 that will provide \$5,085 per student in state and local revenues.

Q: We have fire ants in our back yard. I didn't worry much about them but now we have a baby. What should I do? I've heard that boiling water works.

A: Boiling water is one way to rid your yard of fire ants if you have only a few mounds. Be sure to use the water when the mounds are active. It usually takes several gallons of water to reach and kill the queen, the key to fire ant control. Be aware that the boiling water will kill or at least scorch the grass that it touches. If you have more than a few mounds, you should try a bait formula such as Amdro or a bait product containing the insect growth regulator fenoxycarb. Follow the label directions carefully and be patient. It may take up to a few weeks to completely rid your yard of fire ants. These products — while relatively low in toxicity — are non-toxic. You shouldn't let your baby play in the treated area for several days. Some people have had success placing the bait in a plastic milk jug with holes near the bottom. The ants can reach the product and you can move the bait from mound to mound without leaving a residue.

Q: What should I do with old books and magazines?

A: You should be able to find many willing takers. Small town and school libraries often welcome used books in good condition, along with some recent issue magazines. Hospitals, nursing homes and other institutions are also logical places to try. Many day-care centers would be happy to get magazines for their libraries or art projects. You can also exchange or sell many books through local book shops.

GENERAL NEWS

The recent rains were much welcomed for a thirsty forage and peanut crop. Now if we can get some

nice warm weather, including nights then we will have an excellent fall production season for peanuts and grass for grazing.

This should put our pecan crop at the max for this year. Bit, remember, some of your varieties may be producing "too much". This can be detrimental to a pecan tree the following years. Check your trees, evaluate for crop set and determine if some measures should be taken to reduce this potentially devastating problem. Varieties such as Wichita and Tajas are very susceptible.

LAWN TIPS

Fall is an excellent time to establish a beautiful turf with grass such as fescue. Prepare a well groomed and soft seedbed. Apply 8-10 lbs. of Tall Turf Fescue per 1000 square feet of yard, keep watered with a light mist of spray for most uniform establishment. 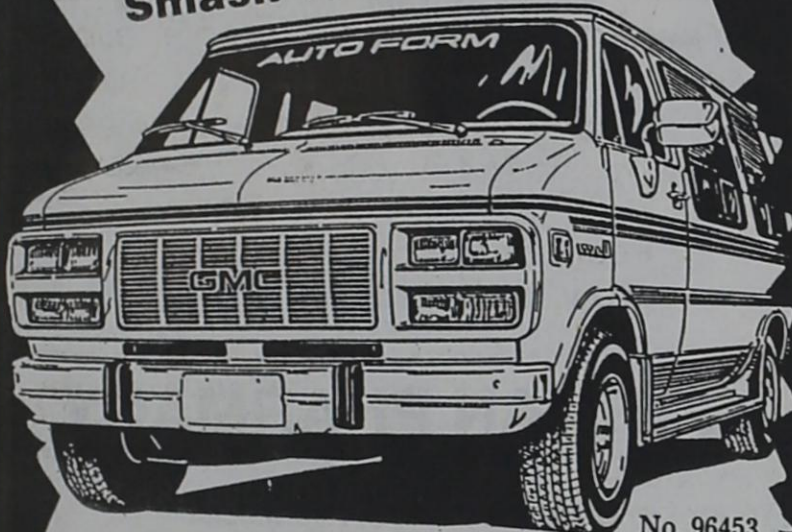

Q. Recently, I received a phone call from someone telling me I could apply for a low-interest credit card. Along with other vital information, the caller asked for my bank account number. I was reluctant to give it out and questioned him. He hung up. Could this have been a scam?

A. Since most consumers are now wary of telemarketers who ask for credit card numbers, fraudulent telemarketers are now targeting checking accounts. As bait, these con artists use a contest, a low-interest credit card or a free trip - anything that could

quire a signature. To protect your bank account, the Federal Trade Commission and the Direct Marketing Association offer several tips. They suggest you never give out your account number or even a portion of it over the phone or in writing unless you are familiar with the company. Check your monthly statement for any unauthorized withdrawals. Demand drafts will appear as unnumbered checks. If anything unusual appears on the statement, notify your bank or financial institution immediately.

Pioneer Roots of an Early Day Family

This story evolved from a covered dish luncheon at the Fellowship Hall of First Baptist Church in Comanche. When Adult Four Members of the church met for their regular monthly *What Next* fellowship at the church each member was asked to bring some early-day family keepsake to display, and share a bit of its history. Cecil Brashear's Remington cap and ball pistols got instant attention. He promised to share the story.

If you are a history buff this will take you back to the era in Central Texas when roving Indian tribes—Kiowas, Comanche, Tonkawas—kept early settlers on the alert. The setting for this story is near Ellison Springs in Eastland County where the Brashear family made their second Texas home after they moved West from Kentucky.

Take Highway 8 East out of Gorman toward Desdemona. Two and one half miles out of town, on the left hand side of the road are two historical markers. One marker refers to early day history of near by El-

grandfather) was pastor at Ellison Springs twice. He pastored at Providence and Staff and probably other rural churches, also. He did not enter the ministry until he was 30 years old and devoted the remaining years of his life to the calling, and farmed, too, for those early day rural churches could not support a pastor's family.

A portion of the history written on the Ellison Springs historical marker lists: "After cessation of Indian activities Ellison Springs became the center of social and cultural functions for the scattered settlers in the area. Picnics, community gatherings, and brush arbor camp meetings were held at the site, in the early 1870's.

A Baptist church was constructed with Reverend C. Brashear (Cecil's grandfather) as minister. A cemetery was begun in the mid-1870's. The present frame house at the Springs was built by Ellison in 1886.

An oft-retold family story relates to Grandfather Brashear wearing the Remington cap and ball pistols as he rode horseback to round up the cows at milking time. A twig from a nearby tree pulled back the hammer on one of the pistols and it fired. Reverend Brashear thought it was an Indian attack. He wheeled his horse around and headed for home, losing his hat. When he discovered what caused the incident it was a "No, No"! for it to be mentioned later.

Having been a member of the frontier militia in the area, Reverend Brashear was in the last Indian fight in Eastland County. On November 25, 1874, the last Indian raid occurred. The Indians came by the eastern route. On Barton's Creek J. M. Ellison was shot off his horse and a Mr. Leslie was killed on Indian Creek. Messrs. Sam Allen, Silas C. Burk, Tom Gibson and Mack Singleton were four of the eighteen men who chased the Indians

one hundred and fifty miles. During this period, 1873-1881, the old line of settlements was wiped out - hence - a good reason for Reverend Brashear to go armed when he rounded up his milk cows.

Cecil Brashear's great-uncle, William Colonel Brashear, organized the first Baptist church in Eastland County area (circa 1873-74) under a fresh arbor. There were seven charter members, C. Brashear, J. R. Higgins, Enoch Dawson, Amanda Dawson, W. C. McGough, and wife and Reverend W. C. Brashear. A few years later this church, named Providence Baptist Church, joined with three other churches to form the Red Gap Association.

In 1915 the Mast Brashear family moved farther West to Crosby County and in 1921 to Lubbock County. Cotton and grain were the principle crops. Cecil founded his own corporation, Brashear's Fine Grass Seeds, after graduation from Texas Tech in 1938. His business address was Route 1, Idalou, Texas.

The Brashears moved back to Central Texas in 1969, on retirement. Cecil has many early day memories - one - of

his first automobile ride with Uncle Fayette at the wheel. Another twice-told story is the tornado at Cisco when his Uncle John insisted he could hear women and children screaming as far away as Eastland.

Children do strange things! Grandpa Brashear always invited everyone home with him after church - and they accepted the invitation! One Sunday there were many guests and twelve year old John got under the folding table and lifted it with his knees. To everyone's astonishment the table tilted and all the dishes of food slid to the floor in a pile. Cecil doesn't recall whether John got a paddling or not, when the story was re-told many times.

When oil was discovered near Desdemona none of the Brashear clan had oil on their property. However, a profit was made by selling water to

a nearby pump station. Some 80 acres of the original homestead is under Lake Leon.

In 1954 John Brashear made a deal with Ray Hoff to drill on the Brashear estate. They struck gas at 1400-1500 feet but there was no market for gas at that time so the well was plugged. And so goes history - being in the right place at the right time to market a popular commodity.

Do take a Sunday afternoon drive on Highway 8 East out of Gorman - and read the two historical markers. If you are wearing rattlesnake top boots you can walk over to Ellison Graveyard and read the headstones. The first grave: Nancy Baird Ellison - 1818-1876, native of Georgia.

Ellison Springs. It was erected in 1974. The other marker gives the history of Ellison Graveyard, which is located about half a mile to the north in a wooded area. This marker was erected by the Texas Historical Commission, also. It is dated 1977. The Brashear's family listed on the first marker is Cecil Brashear's grandfather, a turn of the century Baptist minister in the Ellison Springs Community and original owner of the cap and ball pistol.

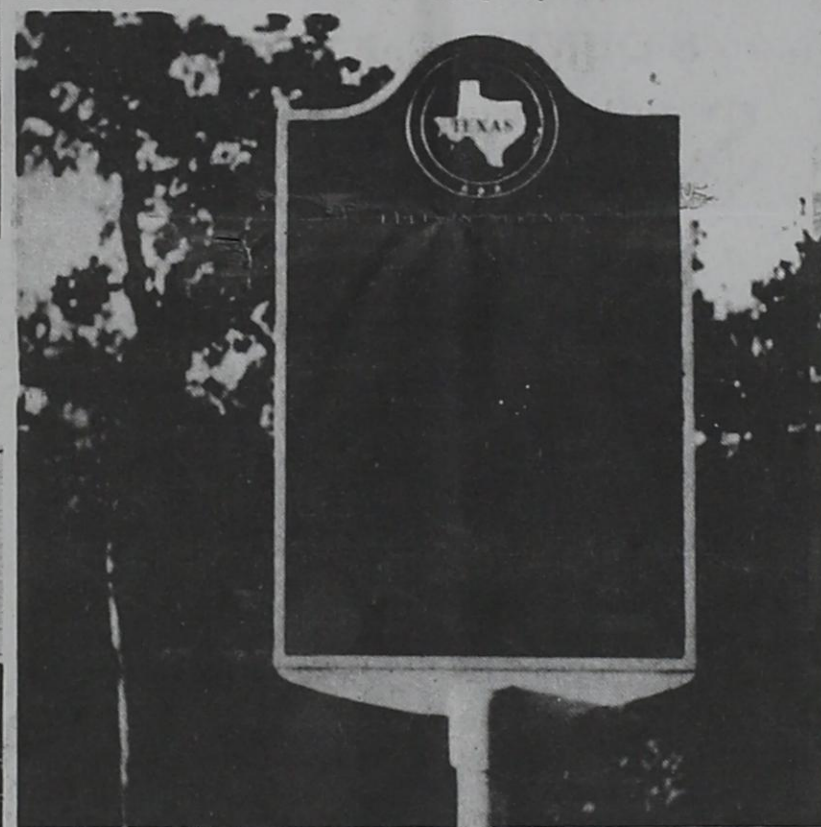
From a history of Eastland County, by Mrs. George Langston, date 1904: The Reverend C. Brashear, who came to the county in the autumn of 1872, writer of the conditions existing at that time...History: "Six families at or near McGaugh Springs, one settlement at Flannagan's, consisting of a cow ranch and one family; another on South Palo Pinto Creek of two or more families: there, with two families on the Sabanna, there at Ellison's

Spring, and three or four at Desdemona, made up the entire population when I came here."

"This was fine stock country. Game was plentiful—such as bear, wolf, deer, turkey, buffalo, a few panther, wildcat, catamount, fox, opossum, skunk and Indian. There were wild horses here at that time and any number of cattle. This was a fine hog country, and there was always a heavy mast. Hogs were plentiful."

Colwell Brashear settled on the Leon River about 7 miles Southeast of Eastland (Staff). He was born in Kentucky July 8, 1846. He came to Texas with his parents in 1851. They settled in Parker County. He married Martha Elizabeth Crenshaw, December 22, 1863. They raised six children, moved to Eastland in the Fall of 1872.

Martin (Mart) Leslie Brashear (Cecil Brashear's father) taught school at Rucker in Comanche County circa 1902-03. Calwell Brashear (Cecil's
