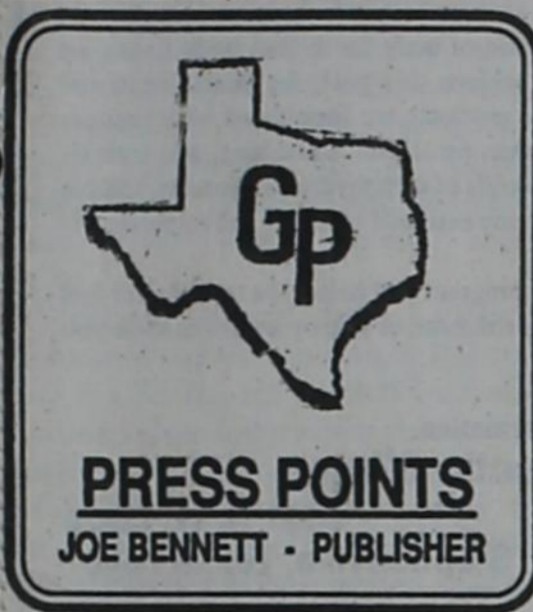

**SCHOOL LUNCH LINEUP**  
The Gorman ISD lunch prices will remain the same as last year. Kindergarten thru 4th grade - \$1.15 for lunch and 90c for breakfast; 5th thru 12th - \$1.20 for lunch and 95c for breakfast; Milk is 20c a carton. Kindergarten thru 2nd grade have milk breaks during the day. All students, whether on the lunch program or not, will be required to pay for milk during the break.

All students who were on the lunch program at the end of the school last year will still receive the same benefits at the beginning of school until new lunch forms have been filled out and returned to the office for approval.

## Actions of The City Commission On July 16

The Gorman City Commission met in a regular meeting July 16th with the following present: Mayor Jack Simpson and Commissioners Howard Hagood, Ann Maxfield, John Rice and Johnny Smith.

The meeting opened at 6:05 p. m. Ann Maxfield made the motion, seconded by John Rice to approve the minutes as read. Motion carried 4-0.

Howard Hagood made the motion, seconded by Johnny Smith, to pay the bills on the report as well as paying Kevin Frizzell for the cost of the mini-blinds which will be left up at the police renthouse. Motion carried 4-0.

Ken Parker was present with his auditor's report for 1991-92. Animal control and ordinance No. 319 were put into abeyance.

Johnny Smith made the motion, seconded by John Rice, to take out the water spout. No action was taken. Ann Maxfield made the motion, seconded by John Rice, that in order to be in compliance with the Texas Water Commission, that the hose at the water spout be removed and the City will no longer give water sales thru the spout, and the spout will be plugged. Motion carried 4-0.

Howard Hagood made the motion,

seconded by Ann Maxfield, to authorize F&F Drilling to plug the four City wells with permanent cement plugs at an estimated cost of \$1500 per well. Motion carried 4-0. This project was also mandated by the Texas Water Commission.

Joe W. Simpson was sworn in as Chief of Police. Upon David Smother's withdrawn application, Chief Simpson recommended Kirk Beauchamp as the new patrolman. After an interview, the Commission will consider the recommendation.

Howard hagood made the motion, seconded by John Rice, to authorize the purchase of materials needed to complete a 6-inch sewer line extension for Ed Cox. Motion carried 4-0.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:25 p. m.

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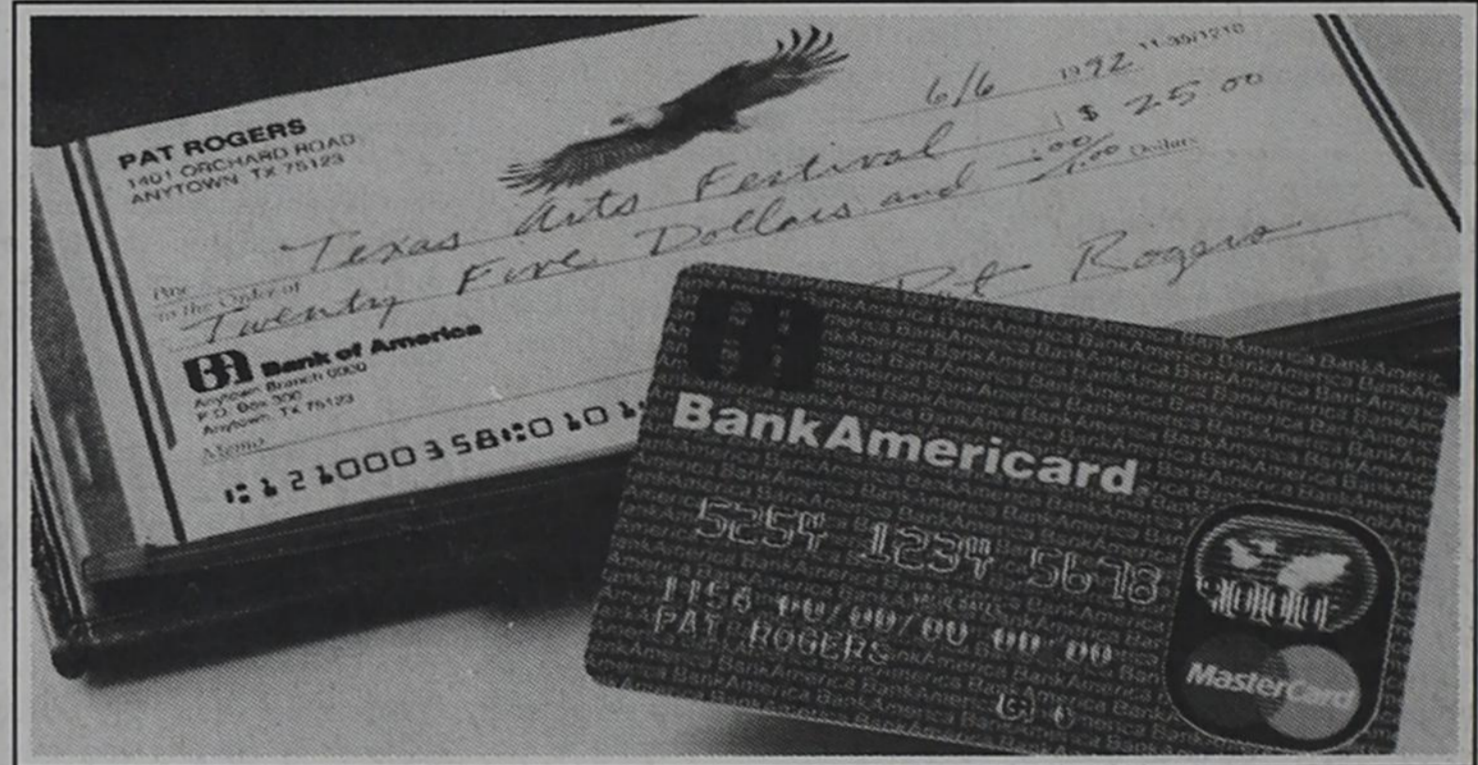

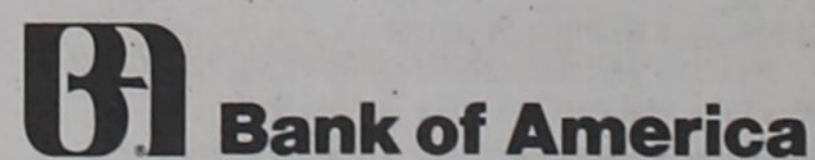

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# 1992 Duster School Reunion Held August 8th

Timing Duster School Reunions on the weekend of the De Leon Peach and Melon Festival couldn't have been better! Those Ol' Timers were downtown on the main drag to enjoy sharing the seedspitting contest and watermelon slicin'. And believe me...it was elbow to elbow on the shady side of the street. It reminded me of the Twenties when going to town on Saturday afternoon was the weekly social event. Ice cream cones were a nickel...admission to the movie was a dime and a dollar was as big as a wagon wheel...money-wise.

As I was strolling down the sidewalk, through the happy crowd... looking right and left for a familiar face, someone greeted me...by name and it was Joy Elliott! Memories of visiting in the Elliott home surfaced. Three generations of the Elliott family were together and toddler, Sam Elliott, wasn't missing anything.

Another "Howdy" and I looked around. It was Cousin Harold Nabors and his family. He chatted with me and wanted to know when our family history book would be published.

The seed-spitting contest came to an end and trucks loaded with ice-cold watermelons parked in the middle of the street and volunteers began slicing the summer fruit and handing it out. Everybody ganged up around the vehicles and I joined them.

My middle son, Corky, from Navasota, shared the red-meated half and we noted the wee-tiny black seeds. A new variety, I'm sure.

Corky glanced at his watch and said "You wanted to be early at the Duster Reunion...so let's go".

We used wet towels to wipe away the sweet melon juice and headed for the car which was parked on the block adjacent to City Hall.

De Leon United Methodist Church was nice and cool when we strolled into Heritage Hall where the reunion was booked to be held. Bernice Skaggs Farley and Mary Jo Pounds Boswell had the registration book and name tags on a table at the entrance. Donuts and Cokes were available for those who needed a quick pick-up...and the crowd began to gather.

Ferrill Anglin asked where my brothers were...Herman wasn't early this year and Denman was double-booked at his lake home near Tyler...so he missed out.

It was a delightful surprise to see Mary Jane Shelton Merchant from San Antonio at this year's reunion. The Sheltons lived on the west side of the street in downtown Duster...back in the good ol' days.

Frankie Rhodes Head said "Howdy" and told me her sister didn't make it. Everyone remembers Rhodes Blacksmith Shop on Main Street, Duster...back in the Twenties.

Mozelle Blair Pyburn said sister Pauline couldn't make the reunion this year either. Blair's General Store at Duster stocked just about anything you might need...canned goods, staples, dry goods, kerosene for our coal oil lamps...before electricity came into the rural picture.

Across the street from Blair's

Store was Duster post office...Aunt Belle Dukes was post mistress. She also stocked school supplies, candy and across-the-counter medicines. In one of my flower beds are purple iris from yer yard in Duster.

Duster consolidated with Rock Bluff and Indian Mountain some 68 years ago. The Skaggs and Joiner children enrolled at Duster. Decendants of the Anglin clan from Indian Mountain were at the reunion as was Bill Haynes. His grandfather, Harry Hamlin, was one of the pioneer land owners in the north part of the county and the original homestead is still at the original site.

About this time Professor E. L. Curb arrived...oldest surviving teacher from Duster.

Corky was astonished at the gathering and said he never dreamed that Duster had an enrollment of this size back in its salad days. He recalled going to Duster with Pa Will Huddleston and Grandpa Pete Dukes and being treated to candy at Blair's Store.

At 6:45 p. m. it took some shouting to calm the visiting down for the business meeting. Outgoing officers, Bernice Farley and Mary Jo Boswell, were in charge. Syble brewer Golden was elected president and Ruth Ell Price was named secretary-treasurer both by acclamation. Donations were made to take care of the rental fee and postage for next year's mailing list. It was also voted to reserve Heritage Hall for 1993 reunion...6 p. m. Saturday, August 7 weekend of the Peach and Melon

Festival.

Early day Duster school teachers were asked to stand and be recognized. They were E. L. Curb, Minnie Myrtle Vaughn White, Fay Hattox, Dora Fay McPhail Brewer, Arra Whatley Nelson, Mary Frances Caruth Morgan, Joy Elliott and Hope Dukes Joiner.

Oldest person present was E. L. Curb, age 88 years; youngest person, Sam Elliott, coming up 2 years old. Betty and Ken Heathington from Knoxville, Tenn. came the farthest.

Memories back in the Twenties... Jack Graham was there and Doc Carter. Grahams and Dukes children walked across the plowed fields together...later joined by the Wilsons. The Fraziers didn't have to walk so far...and the Alldredges lived across the railroad track.

Driving down the sandy lane that was once alongside the railroad track brought back memories of the old cotton gin and depot that were a part of Duster in its hey-day. And the telephone exchange was next door to the post office...operated by the Jones family...memories!

Back then Duster had a country doctor, W. D. Alldredge, that made house calls and delivered babies... driving by horse and buggy to the rural farm houses.

The Tom Haile residence still stands and has been refurbished. It was across the road from the school grounds.

Wolf-over-the-river was a popular game that boys and girls could share. Our basketball court was not paved, either. Baseball was popular and you carried your lunch in a dinner bucket...sausage in a biscuit and fried pies.

I am over the hill age-wise and probably memory-wise, too, but Duster School Reunions bring back a re-run of hesterday and I hope they continue.

Duster has had three settings: old Duster, new Duster and Duster today. Old Duster was located near the highway sign of today at the crossroads. Farmers watered their teams at Polecat Pond when they brought cotton to the gin and bought staples at the general store. Then Texas Central Railroad came thru some two miles to the northwest and the town was moved near the depot. The rural village peaked during this era.

When Duster consolidated with De Leon it folded the stores, too. To newcomers, Duster is back at the original turn-of-the-century location. It doesn't take long for the sands of time to cover our tracks. If I'm around next year I'll up-date you on Duster happenings and photographs

of the later years at Duster School.





