

Kristi Barnett and Bill King To Exchange Vows May 23



Billy Bob Brown has been chosen t represent Hendricks' Children's Miracle Network for 1992. He will appear on Hendricks' Children's Miracle Network Telethon May 30-31 airing on Abilene's KTAB-TV. Billy Bob was born September 2, 1991 (5 lbs., 13½ ozs.), he was immediately placed in the experi-

enced care of Dr. Tuegel, pediatrician of Abilene. Several hours after birth he developed respiratory distress due to his body not releasing the protein surfactant, a protein necessary to keep the tiny airsacks in his lungs expanded. He also had an intermittent heart murmur. He was given metabolic and respiratory support and antibiotic therapy began. By Sept. 3, his oxygen had been increased to 80 percent. Sept. 4 he seemed somewhat more stable and still on 80 percent oxygen, but anemia seemed to be progressive. Later that morning the oxygen requirement increased, at that time he was developing increasing respiratory problems. Chest x-ray revealed his right lung had collapsed, breathing so hard and fast he blew a hole in his lung, rendering Billy Bob unable to breathe on his own. Other serious complications followed, when his lung collapsed, it moved his heart over and the patent duct, a duct that closes at birth, had opened back up. His anemia had worsened even more. Dr. Tuegel inserted a tube between Billy Bob's right ribs and placed him on the life support machine. The tube allowed the trapped air to escape as the machine






Improvements In The Air

In 1892, the only flying objects were a few American, British and French hot-air and hydrogen balloons used for military observations. Traffic "control" was handled by the wind. 





AGRICULTURE VIEWPOINT

By M. Davy Vestal

PECAN NOTES

Weed competition is a leading cause of failure in young pecan orchards. A large portion of the tree's roots are in the top two feet of soil, and weeds growing in the root area of the tree are in direct competition for water and nutrients. Young pecan trees are poor competi-

The good orchadists must remove weed competition arounf young trees but at the same time must insure that valuable and irreplaceable top soil is not lost. The producers also must maintain an orchard floor that is compatable with spraying, irrigation and other management needs and is efficient for harvest operations. This requires careful orchard floor planning and management.

floor is not a practical solution to weeds except in Far West Texas where rainfall is very low and mud and erosion normally do not impede harvest and management operations. In the rest of Texas, a sod orchard floor, either native or planted, is highly beneficial to orchard operations. In river flood plains, where much of the Texas orchard acreage exists, a sod cover is a must to guard against severe erosion during flooding.

Tillage, if used, should be only near young trees in a narrow strip

under and about the width of the tree canopy. Many orchards are now irrigated with drip systems that have above-ground tubes or "risers" that make close tillage difficult and impractical. Close tillage also often results in serious accidental mechanical damage to tree trunks as well as destruction of shallow "feeder"

Chemical weed removal allows easier weed control near the trees, especially where drip irrigation is used. The chief problems with chemical weed control generally involve incorrect sprayer calibration or careless application that can result in poor weed control or in damage to the pecan trees. No chemical that is labeled for use in pecan orchards will kill all species of weeds that may be Mechanical tillage of the entire present. Moisture stress and the weed's growth stage can cause varying results with most labeled chemicals. Further, wind can often be a serious problem to safe application, especially when contact chemicals are to be used near small pecan

dry, disease specialists remind them to keep track of where Southern blight problems occurred last year.

According to Dr. Chip Lee, Texas A&M University Extension Plant Pathologist, Southern blight may reduce Texas peanut yields by as much as six percent in years when hot, humid weather persists during the summer. Based on the stage average annual production of about 550 million pounds of peanuts, that represents a loss to growers of about \$10 million per year, notes Lee.

"The disease hit some peanut growers very hard in the state's Central and Southern growing areas," says Lee. "And if our wet weather keeps up into spring and summer we can expect more losses in many areas."

Lee says it's important for growers to keep good field records to track where the disease showed up last year because it's likely to hit again this summer if hot, humid conditions

Texas A&M Research Associate Ken Woodard says rains in most Texas peanut growing areas last year averaged 30 to 70 percent above normal amounts. "Wherever you were, you got more rain than usual," he notes. "Our soils are the most saturated they've been in 30 years."

"We're hoping the abnormally heavy rains generated by ElNino in late winter will peak out as we move into soring," adds Woodard. "But the rainfall during planting may be above average as well. We don't know when the rains will begin to cut back."

Lee says many peanut growers

Delegates will also meet prominent people in state wait too long before applying Southern blight vontrol treatments. Chemicals approved on Texas peanuts include a preventive application of

Terraclor 10G fungicide or the option

of a rescue spray, such as Vitavax. "If you wait until the disease is really evident, you're probably too late to prevent some yield loss," notes Lee. "So in fields with a proven history of Southern blight problems, we recommend a treatment of Terraclor granules at 50 lbs. per acre over the row about 55 days after planting, with a repeat after 30

"There's no question that some growers should be applying their Terraclor before they do," adds Lee. "I saw fields last year where the grower lost as much as 20 or 30 percent of his yield when Southern blight took over."

If Southern blight is well established in a field, Lee says a grower's best chance of bringing the disease under control is a spray treatment of Vitavax. "Vitavax is very effective for a few days, but it gives fairly short residual control," he says.




