bon.


PANTHERS DEFEATED BY HICO 30-0; **TRAVEL TO RISING STAR FRIDAY**

Agriculture Viewpoint

Some early planted peanuts are being harvested with some good and poor grades being reported. Basically, the Spanish grade reports are in the 68-69 range which is considered good. However, the runner peanuts as mentioned at the recent peanut tour need some maturing time. Grades have been reported in the

upper sixty's, but need to be in the mid to high seventies to be considered good.

Heat units are a major emphasis for the remainder of this year's peanut crop. We need daytime temperatures in the mid-eighties and night-time above sixty and hope for a late freeze.

All in all we still have the prospect of a good peanut crop around the county. Mother nature will decide the final tally.

There still is time to enter in the Central Texas Peanut Quality Show. Quality is an important facet of peanut production. Call the Extension Office for more details and/or to enter (629-1093).

COASTAL

It has been an excellent growing year for coastal with some fields being cut as many as five times and still growing. One way to top off an excellent crop is tp apply 20 to 40 pounds of P 05 (phosphorus) per acre. This application will help set a good root system (especially on newly established coastal) and give an early season boost next spring. Reports of grazing as much as 3 weeks earlier than without this application and reports of hay cutting 2 weeks earlier makes this practice even more attractive.

WHEAT

It is not too late to consider a wheat crop on some of your acreage. As a matter of fact, tests have shown that some of the top yield wheat in the area has been planted as late as Thanksgiving. However, to get the grazing potential, you sure need to have it in by October 1st.





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
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Texas Fruit Growers Conference Set


