Amendment Early Voting Begins Oct. 18

Early voting on the November 2nd Amendments Election will begin on October 18 and continue through Friday, October 29th, according to County Clerk, Cathy Jencho.

The voting will be conducted at the County Clerk's Office, First Floor of the Eastland County Courthouse during regular business hours.

County Tax Assessor/Collector, Sandra Cagle reports that 10,693 voters are currently registered in Eastland County.

This is slightly under the 10,732 registered to vote in the General Election of November 1998.

Seventeen Amendments will be voted on in the Election set for November 2nd.

Hunt Continues For Indicted Man

Eastland County Sheriff Wayne Bradford said Thursday that Eastland County Lawmen are continuing the search for James Marvin Wooten, who is wanted on charges of Sexual Offense with a Child.

Reportedly he is also wanted in Erath County.

Sheriff Bradford said there were six warrants out on Wooten, 33, who was charged in December of 1998.

At that time he was set free on a \$20,000 bond, and his bond was increased to \$35,000 when he failed to appear at a hearing.

In May an Eastland County Grand Jury indicted Wooten on charges which included Indecency with a Child, Indecency with Sexual Contact, two counts of Sexual Assault of a Child, and Tampering with a Witness. His bond was increased to \$50,000.

Wooten's parents live in Gorman. He has worked as a newspaper carrier and a truck driver.

"We are asking that anyone who has information on him to call the Sheriff's Office or the Eastland County Crimestoppers."

Wooten is reported to be 5 Foot 8 Inches tall, weighing at 190 pounds, and have brown hair and eyes.

Panthers Claw Wildcats 41-12; Travel to Evant on Friday

The Gorman Panthers remained undefeated in District 14A play on Friday night when they traveled to Santo and came away with a 41 to 12 victory on a wet field. Santo led 6-0 at the end of the first period, but the Panthers came back in the second period to score 21 points, then added 13 in the third and 7 in the fourth for a 41-12 victory.

Santo hit the scoreboard first on their third possession when Chris Hernandez ran in from 13 yards with 11 seconds left in the first. The kick for point failed and the score was 6-0.

Then after recovering a Santo fumble on the Wildcat 19, Gorman scored in four plays with Dathan Wright carrying the ball on four straight runs and scored on a eleven yard run with 9:08 left in the second. Wright booted the PAT and Gorman led 7-6.

On their next possession the Panthers took the ball on their own 27 and went the distance in 14 plays with Micheal Lynch catching a Josh Longoria pass for the TD from 20 yards out with 1:29 left in the half. Wright booted the point after and Gorman was up 14-6.

Then after getting an interception on the Santo 7 yard line Dathan Wright ran the distance with 28 seconds left in the half. Wright added the point after and the Panthers led 21-6 at the half-time intermission.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band performed the routine they had been working on for the Band competition and did a great job. The Santo Band also performed their routine and got a great applause.

Following the half the Panthers got the ball on their own 45 after a Wildcat fumble and went the distance in 8 plays with Dathan Wright getting the final 15 yards on a run with 6:38 left in the third. Wright added the point after and the score rose to 28-6.

The Panthers added another score with 2:17 left in the third when they took the ball on the Wildcat 39 and scored in four plays with A. J. Torres catching a 38 yard pass from Longoria. The pass try for 2 points failed on a muffed kick and the score was 34-6.

The score stood at 34-6 until the 7:43 mark of the game when the Panthers took over at the Wildcat 27 and scored in just 2 plays with Torres racing in from 24 yards out for the score. Wright added the point after to make the score 41-6.

Then the Wildcats came back with a touchdown with just 1:19 left in the game when they took the ball on their own 33 after a Panther bobble and scored in 6 plays with Josh Hendricks racing in from 31 yards out. The pass try for 2 points failed and the final score was 41-12.

The Big Red Defense did a great job of holding the Wildcats even though they had a very large front wall. They held the Wildcats to four first downs

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Amendment to Ordinance #302

An Amendment to Ordinance #302 to include the removal of Junk, Abandoned, Non-Inspected, Non-Running, Non-Registered, Cars or Vehicles. An amendment to prohibit the accumulation of cars or vehicles in such condition. This inclusion will enforce the removal of such property. The removal or correction must be responded to by the owner or such action will be taken by the City of Gorman Official(s) at the Owner's expense.

An amendment to Ordinance #302 to prohibit Non-maintained Property. This will include property that poses a threat to citizens. Properties, structures, buildings, houses, or establishments that may be deemed unsafe to the public will include, but not limited to: a potential fire hazard, the possibility of the property collapsing or the inability to maintain stability or that could pose a hazardous material threat.

These judgements will be made according to the City of Gorman Officials: These officials being appointed or elected, or if a formal complaint is filed in the City of Gorman City Office.

Owners will be given a "RED TAG" Notice, or will be contacted by the City Official(s) by personal contact, or by the U.S. Certified Mail. If contact is not obtained, the proof of such effort will be deemed sufficient. The owner of such property will be given ten (10) working days to comply or make all necessary corrections deemed by the City of Gorman. If reasonable effort is not made by the owner of such property within thirty (30) working days such property will be corrected by the City of Gorman City Officials at the expense of the owner.

Prizes Abound At 4-H Food Show

Gorman 4-H hosted the annual 4-H Food Show held Saturday, October 2nd at the First United Methodist Church in Gorman. Approximately 45 attended the show where some 22 4-Hers exhibited their food dishes as well as their knowledge of nutrition. The 4-H Food Show is divided into age divisions according to the 4-Hers age and categories such as Bread & Cereal, Fruits & Vegetables, Main Dish, Desserts, Nutritious Snacks, etc. In order to enter the show, youth completed six learning experiences making up their Foods and Nutrition Project and submitted their receipt to the County Extension Office prior to the show.

September 16, 1999
