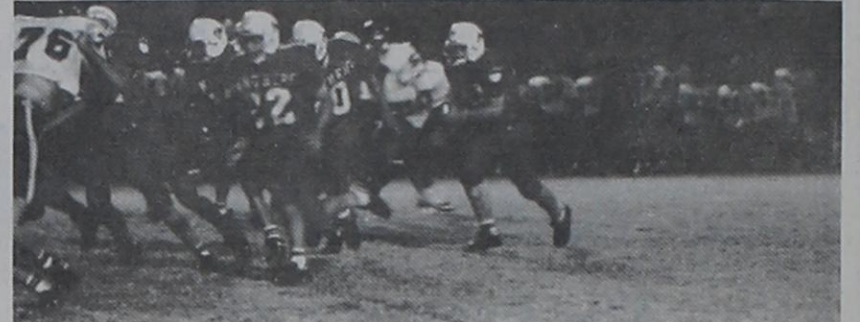

The General Election will be held Tuesday, November 3 in the Old Fire Hall in Gorman. Frances Simpson will serve as Election Judge with Clerks being Mrs. Phillip Osborne and This is a very important and unusual election for the President of the United States, as there are three candidates on the ballot.

Other important positions are United States Representative of District 17. Which is our District. Railroad Commissioner, many others, State contested positions. Polls will Open at 7:00 a.m. and Close at 7:00 p.m.

The November 3, 1992 General Election will be a first for Eastland County. The paper ballot is by far the most accepted means by which to vote. It is what our democracy grew up on, so the PROVEN method of voting is not being changed ---- we're only changing the way the votes are counted.

The ballots will be counted at a central counting station instead of at each precinct. The ballots will be counted by AUTOMATIC TABULATING EQUIPMENT. This equipment is certified for use by the Secretary of State of Texas, who is the Chief Election Officer for the State.

Voters will use a new type of ballot that is designed for the County's new vote tabulation system that optically scans, or "READS" your vote. To cast your ballot, you simply use the pencil provided at your polling and DARKEN THE OVAL IMMEDIATELY TO THE LEFT OF YOUR VOTING PREFERENCE.

REMEMBER TO VOTE IN THIS ELECTION. Each and every vote does count. We in American are so lucky to have the right to vote as we choose, when so many other countries do not have that right.

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Wiley H. Bridges, son of George H. and Jimmie M. Bridges of Gorman, Tx, recently participated in UNITAS aboard the dock landing ship USS Portland, homeported in Little Creek, VA, a multinational exercise that brings together ships, aircraft and ground forces of the U. S. Atlantic Fleet, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Paraguay, Uruguay and Venezuela, under the command of the Commanche, South Atlantic Force. Held since 1960, UNITAS involves a series of combined naval warfare exercises designed to improve the inter-operability of U. S. and South American forces at sea. The four U.S. Navy ships assigned to the Task Force, trained with each of the eight South American navies or air forces while traveling clockwise around the southern continent. The exercise involved more than 15,000 service members from the nine countries.

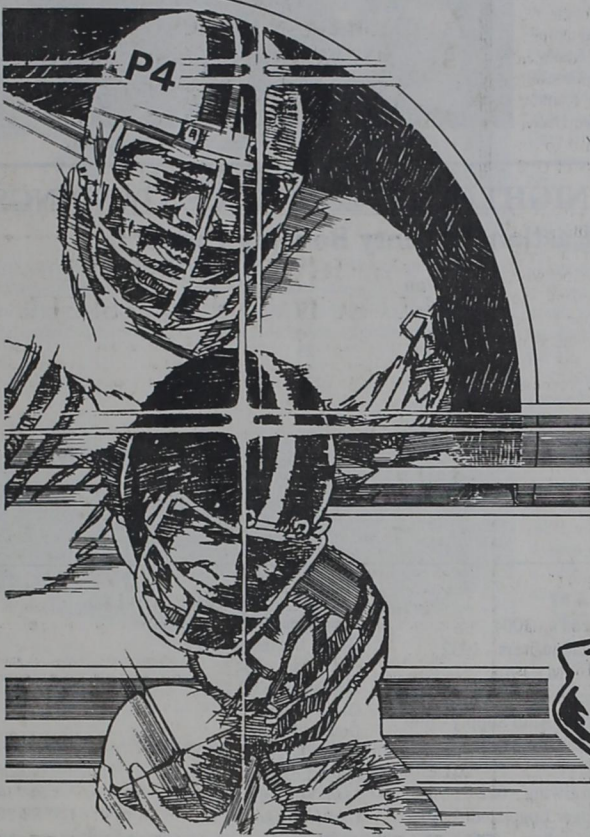

A clean-up work day at the club building has been tentatively slated for November 12th.

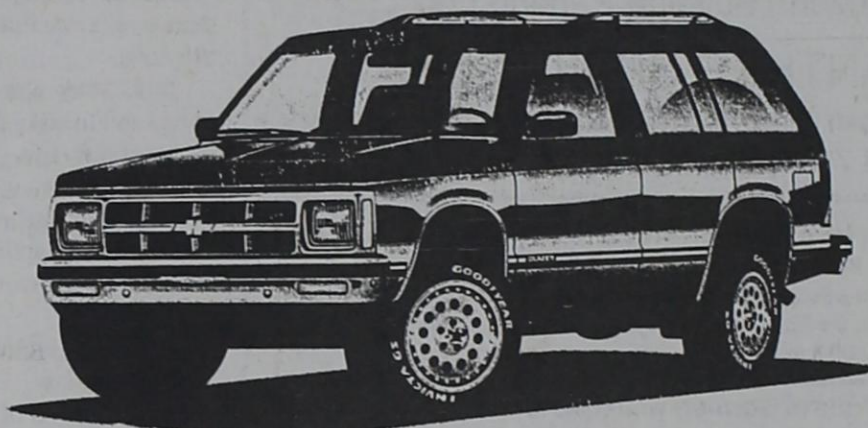
Open House Held At Carbon Masonic Lodge 786

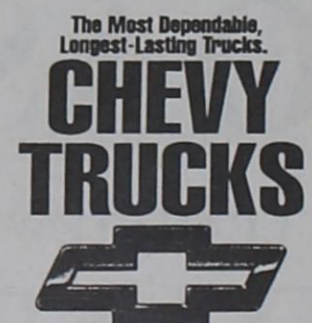
