FHA Members Conduct SADD Emphasis Week At GHS



On April 1 - 5, Gorman FHA members conducted Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD) emphasis week at Gorman High School. During the 3-day program, teachers at GHS showed films to their high school students, revealing the damage done to families who have been touched by a drunk driver. On Friday, April 3, FHA members had an all-day demonstration to illustrate the death of an American every 22 minutes, a result of a driver's carelessness. Every 20 minutes, a drum was heard, and a FHA member had her face painted and returned to class wearing a sign which read: "Don't talk to me, I'm just a memory — A victim of a drunk driver." She was not allowed to communicate with the other students for the rest of the day. On Friday afternoon, an assembly was held for Junior High and High School students. Denver Rainey was the speaker and he emphasized the importance of making right decisions.

Reports were given from Chief Smothers and Supervisor Joe Williams. Judge Huff was absent. Ann Maxfield made the motion, seconded by Howard Hagood to purchase three back braces, one for each crewman at the cheapest price. Motion carried 3-0.

The City Commission of Gorman met in a Called Meeting on April 15th with the following present: Mayor Jack Simpson; and Commissioners Johnny Smith, Ann Maxfield and Johnny Rice. Howard Hagood was absent. The meeting opened at 1:05 p. m. Mayor Jack Simpson gave an up-to-date on the land acquisition for the sewer plant project. John Rice made the motion, seconded by Ann Maxfield, to give Hershell Cordell the authorization to negotiate in behalf of the City (for easements with the adjoining property owners on the sewer plant projects) at a rate of \$10 per hour and mileage of 25 cents per mile. Motion carried 3-0. There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 1:30 p. m. —GP—

Jason Ditmore Named Player of the Week In Star-Telegram on April 28

Jason Ditmore of the Gorman Panthers was named as Player of the Week for April 13-17 in the Fort Worth Star Telegram. Jason led in the batting average for all schools with an average of .561 with 23 hits on 41 at bats and scored 21 runs. Also on the Batting Average List was Steve Taylor of the Panthers with a .457 batting average with 21 hits on 46 at bats and he scored 16 runs. In the pitching Earned-Run Average list Jason had an ERA of 1.96 with 54 strike outs while walking 26. In the Home Run List Jason was second with 7, followed by Cory Pack in 6th place with 3. Jason also led the list in Runs Batted In with a total of 32. In this category Steve Taylor had 19. In the Doubles List Jason was fourth with 7. The Gorman Panthers were third in the Team Batting Average with .336, and the Panthers were second in Earned Runs with 1.99. We congratulate these outstanding Panther players.

Voting Very Light In May Election

The turnout for the local school and city elections was very light on Saturday, May 2nd, with 74 ballots being cast in the city election and 106 in the school balloting. John Rice was re-elected to the Gorman City Commission in the only contested position on the ballot. He received 58 votes for Place 2 with Johnny Dorsett receiving 9 votes. Johnny Smith, who was unopposed for Place 4 received 61 votes. Jack Simpson was re-elected Mayor and received 69 votes. A total of 74 votes were cast. Six people filed for the three 3-year terms on the Gorman Independent School Board of Trustees. A total of 123 ballots were cast. Those elected were Danny Snider, who received 105 votes; Larry Keith

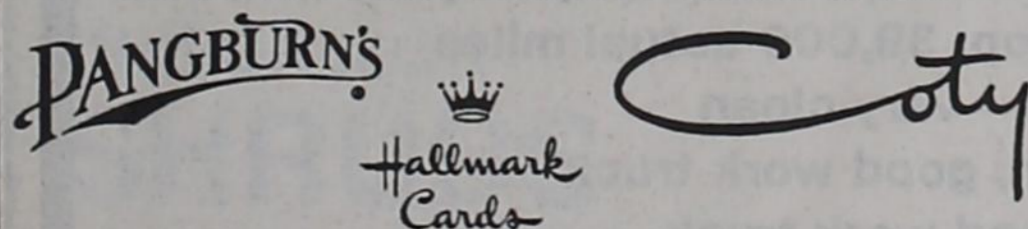
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Eastland denied detachment from district

EASTLAND — Eastland school officials denied a request Monday night to detach about 43,000 acres from the Eastland school district and add it to the Gorman school district.

More than 100 people crammed into the Eastland High School cafeteria to speak for and against the detachment, and then board trustees met briefly in executive session and announced their decision.

Board member Gene Kea read a prepared statement outlining the reasons behind denying the detachment request. They included:

- It would not be in the best interest of the children,
- It would increase taxes, and
- Several people spoke against the proposal.

The decision will be appealed to the state commissioner of education within 45 days, according to Edgar Coble, attorney for the group seeking the detachment.

The area formerly was part of the Carbon district, which dissolved about two years ago. After a series of meetings attended by a state monitor, the Carbon school board voted to become part of the Eastland school dis-

trict.

At that time, people living in the eastern part of the Carbon school district were not allowed to detach and join the Gorman district.

They claim, however, that Eastland school officials assured them that the detachment would be allowed at a later date.

"We feel representatives of the Eastland Independent School District promised us we could do this and (we) would be unopposed," said David Guthrie, who lives east of Carbon and has enrolled his children in Gorman school anyway.

Many students affected continue to transfer to Gorman, and Coble said children should be a part of the school district closest to their home.

"Many participate in Gorman activities such as church and social gatherings," he said. "These people are your neighbors; we ask you to bring to a conclusion what was begun two years ago."

After the board voted the proposal down, Superintendent Keith Watkins told the crowd he hopes everyone can remain friends.

"I understand there will be some hard feelings," he said. "As Gorman did as it felt best, we of the Eastland Independent School District did as it felt best."

National Factor For 1990-91 Disaster Program

David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County ASCS Office, has announced that a national factor of 50.04 percent will be used to calculate payments to producers who filed claims for crop production losses under provisions of the 1990-91 Disaster Program. Eastland County producers filed for \$1,135,292 of crop losses sustained during the 1990 and 1991 crop years.

Payments to Eastland County producers will total \$568,100 after application of the factor.

Martin said qualifying producers' payments were calculated by determining the eligible amount of production loss and multiplying it by the applicable rate.

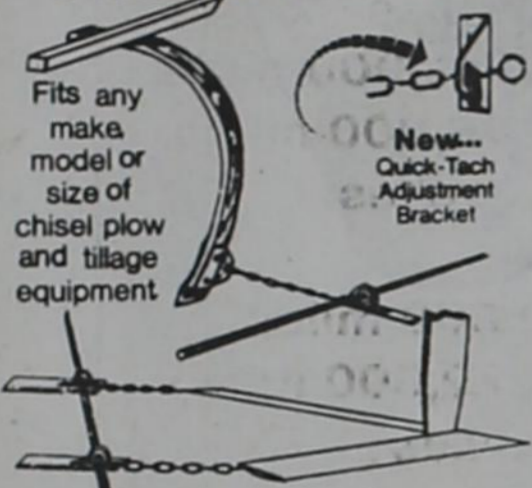
"Because total payments are limited by the \$995 million allocated by Congress, it was necessary to factor this further," Martin said. "Producers may calculate their payments at once by using this percentage."

All commercially grown crops that

suffered at least a 40 percent production loss due to an identifiable disaster were eligible for payment. The Disaster Program sign-up ended on March 13, 1992 and all supporting documentation was required to be filed by March 27, 1992. Eastland County producers filed for disaster losses totaling \$742,369 in 1990 and \$392,923 in 1991.

The Eastland County ASCS Office is in the process of preparing 506 checks totaling \$568,100. The mailing of payment checks will begin soon.

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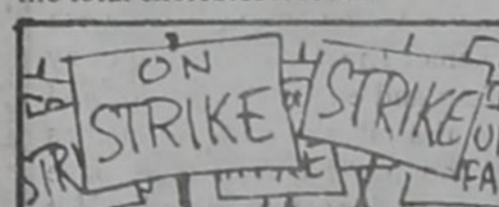

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PROPERTY TAX PROTEST AND APPEAL PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- *the value placed on your property
- *any exemptions that may apply to you
- *the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- *the taxable status of your property
- *the local governments which should be taxing your property
- *any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review
Contact the Eastland County Appraisal District Staff at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (call a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a

notice of appeal with chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas or visiting the office which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746-6565.

Deadline for filing Protests with the ARB* Usual Deadline
On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines
For changes of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, said, "We would like to take this time to let you know how proud we are of our county office employees and their dedicated service to the farmers and ranchers of Texas."

In addition, Harris stated, "As you know, the county offices just finished the signup period for the 1990 and 1991 Disaster Program. What you may not know is what commitment and hard work it took for the counties to meet the deadlines imposed by Congress. Texas county offices were required to make a report of participation and projected payments not later than Saturday, April 11, 1992. However, computer software sent to the counties to transmit the data was faulty. A fix to the problem was not received until

late Friday night, April 10, and had to be hand-delivered to many offices. Determined county office employees worked long hours Friday and into Saturday night traveling from county to county to ensure information was timely and accurately transmitted to Washington, D.C."

As a result of county office efforts, the disaster information was successfully transmitted to Secretary of Agriculture Ed Madigan, who announced a payment factor of 50.04% and authorized disaster payments of more than \$144,000,000 for Texas producers.

According to Harris, Texas ASCS employees continue to set the example for all government employees. Harris said, "The State ASC Committee are all active farmers and ranchers, who regularly observe these committed professionals do everything they can within the regulations to make farm programs work." 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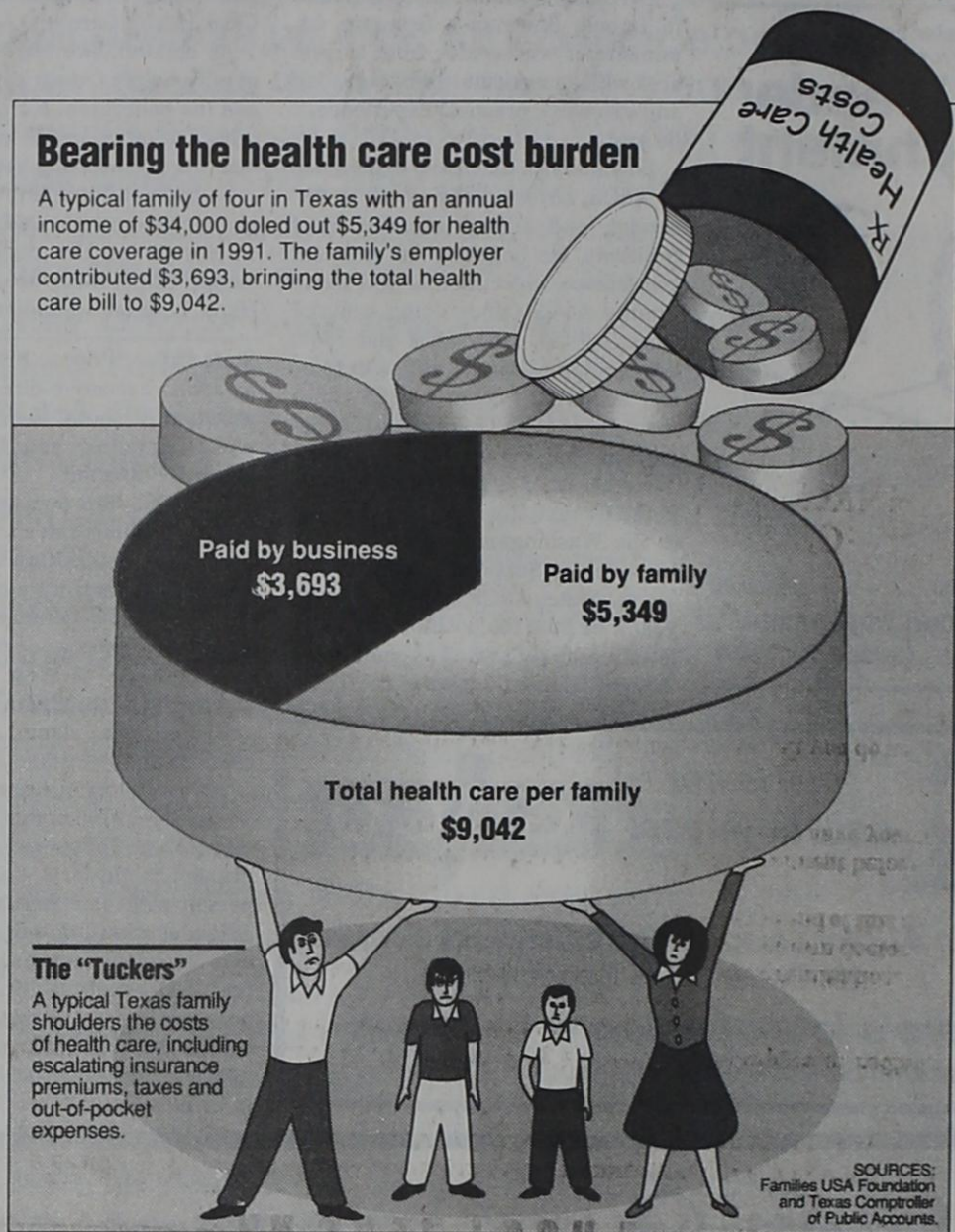
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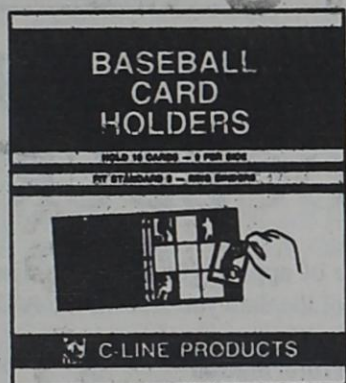
Bearing the health care cost burden

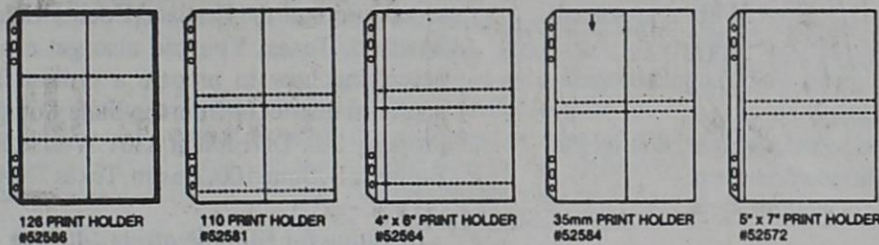
