# **Seven Panthers On All-District:** One All Area

There were seven Panther base- 10-3 record with 108 strikeouts and a ball players named to the 5A All-District Team fot eh 1992 season,

Panthers on the All-District list included Genaro Madera, senior, as a pitcher; Don Mauney, freshman, as catcher; Cory Pack, senior; Jason Ditmore, senior; and Steve Taylor, senior, as infielders; Noah Landa, sophomore, as an outfielder; and Jade Warren, junior, as the designated hitter.

GHS senior baseball player Jason Ditmore seldom suffered a slump in his hitting or pitching in his fouryear varsity career. Ditmore never batted worse than .300 and never had a losing record or an earned-run average higher than 3.00 while playing for the Panthers. He also earned All-State honors his past three seasons.

"He just got better as he got older," Panther coach Doug Shana-

Ditmore also is the Star-Telegram Area Baseball Player of the Year for the second consecutive season.

As a batter, Ditmore went from hitting just barely better than .300 as a freshman to .529 his senior season. As a freshman pitcher he was 4-0, with 25 strikeouts and a 0.85 ERA in 243 innings. This season he had a

1.71 ERA in 733/3 innings.

"He always had a lot of natural and one was named on the All-Area ability," Shanafelt said, "but he's been more of a leader as he matured."

This season Ditmore led the Panthers in every pitching category. He also led in every offensive category except steals and walks. In addition to his .529 batting average, Ditmore hit 10 home runs, batted in 45 runs, scored 36 and stole 12 bases. He hit his final homer and Making the All-Area list was earned his last RBI with a solo shot over the centerfield wall in the Class A Regional final loss against Baird on June 5th.

Ditmore's batting average rose as high as .615 this season. It dipped to .529 after the Baird game. It was the result of Ditmore having to pitch all but two innings, as well as bat, for Gorman in the playoffs. Ditmore, who suffered a 3 for 11 slump in the first three playoff games, finished his career with a 2 for 4 against

Although his hitting suffered in the playoffs this season, Ditmore's pitching seldom faltered. He walked only 41 batters for the season and the eight hits he allowed against Baird was a season high.

Girls In Action of the First Baptist Church of Gorman and New Hope Baptist Church returned home on Thursday from a four day camp at Lueders.



# **Eastland County to** borrow \$500,000 to repair county roads

County will borrow \$500,000 to pay for right-of-way expenses and to repair county roads and bridges, according to decisions made by county commissioners at their Monday meeting.

The money will be obtained from the sale of certificates of obligation that do not require an election. However, public hearings must be held and the county's intent must be published twice in the newspaper.

Ralph Fiskes, representative of Southwest Securities, said the money could be available in 60 days.

At an earlier meeting, commissioner Richard Robinson said he expects costs to reach \$200,000 to prepare Farm-to-Market Road 570 east of Eastland for improvements to be done by the state. Right of way must be obtained, utility lines moved and fences replaced along the two-mile stretch of

EASTLAND - Eastland road before the state can start paving it.

Rains and floods over the past several months have made some county roads impassable, according to County Judge Scott Bailey. The \$300,000 remaining from the sale of certificates will be divided among the four precincts to repay money used from the county road and bridge account for repairs.

Commissioners approved Fiskes' offer to obtain a bond rating for interest purposes and to broaden the market for the sale of certificates. Because the county owes no money, it has no credit rating, Fiskes said.

"This is not going to be hard for us to take care of," he said. "This county is ... in good shape."

A tax of .0299 cents per \$100 valuation would enable the county to repay the borrowed money within five years.

### Agriculture **Viewpoint** TIME TO TREAT FOR

**CATTLE GRUBS** Cattle grubs are internal parasites and their damage is largely unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle

industry than any other insect pest. While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage. Feed efficiency and animal vigor are reduced in infested animals.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May.

The tine to control gruns is from now through August when grubs are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency. Considerable hide damage will occur if infested animals are slaughtered. Hide value has increased rapidly during the past year.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no functional mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to manage.

Heel flies lay their eggs on an animals hairs in the lower leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's skin.

Then they begin a migratory course through the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few moonths, and after eight to nine months, appear in the mature grub state on the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle, it's best to treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide or injectable treatment during the May through August period.

Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulate throughout the body, and kill grubs while they are small. Injectable treatments are circulated in the animal's body fluids to kill the invading pests.

These insecticides come in various forms -- dips, sprays, pour-ons, injections and spot-on tyreatments. A listing of approved insecticidesand methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the County Extension Office. Ask for Extension publication B-1306, which contains information on livestock pests.

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

TAEX recommends applying fertilizer when young plants have developed sufficient root systems to use fertilized nutrients.

# **USDA** Secretary Madigan Speaks

College Station - USDA Secretary Edward Madigan told Texas farners and ranchers on June 5th that it is his goal to make his department as responsive to production agriculture as possible.

Responding to media criticism that USDA is a "bloated bureaucracy," Madigan told producers that "60 percent of the agricultural agency's budget pertains to nutrition and has nothing to do with production agricluture." The Secretary noted only 17 percent of the total USDA budget is directly related to production agriculture.

Madigan met with leaders from Texas A&M University, Texas Farm Bureau and farmers and ranchers from Brazos and Washington Counties. A&M officials briefed the Secretary on ongoing research and development in agricultural programs.

Dr. Charles Lee, the Interim Chancellor and Dean of Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, headed the discussion of A&M agricultural programs during the briefing at the Kleberg Center.

The YSDA Secretary said he would like to see all agricultural organizations develop the kind of "singlemindedness" that extremist groups demonstrate nationwide.

The Secretary toured the Blue Bell Creamery in Brenham to conclude his Texas tour. He came to Texas at the invitation of U. S. Rep. Jack Fields (R-Humble) along with the Texas Farm Bureau and Brazos and Washington County Farm Bureaus.

# Perry Says EPA **Grants Emergency Exemption Use**

Austin - The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency has granted a Texas Department of Agriculture request that will allow farmers emergency use of the insecticide Asana XL on grain sorghum, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

"We appreciate EPA's quick response on this matter," Perry said. "Without this method of control, our sorghum farmers were projected to lose as much as \$10 million this summer to the sorghum midge."

The sorghum midge is a type of fly that is primarily controlled by planting sorghum early and having it flower before midge opoulations can seriously threaten crops. But this season's heavy rains caused sorghum crops to be planted late, Perry

Along with midges, Asana XL also may be used to control headworms. -GP-

Rural Texas communities, challenged by the need to fill vacancies in all health care professionals, now have an opportunity to take advantage of a unique state supported program - the Texas Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition Program. The program, administered by the Texas Center for Rural Health Initiatives, helps rural Texas communities ensure a well-trained and committeed health care work force for the future and help students achieve the health care careers that might otherwise be out of their reach.
