PANTHERS STOP LORAIN 12-2; PLAY BAIRD FRIDAY-EASTLAND

The Gorman Panthers took advantage of two five-run innings to win over Loraine 12-2 in a regional Class A playoff on Tuesday at Scott Field on the ACU campus in Abilene. The game was called after five innings on the 10-run rule.

This win by the Panthers advances them to the Quarterfinal game against the Baird Bears, winners over Petrolia by a 6-5 score on Tuesday. The Quarterfinal battle will be played on Friday at 5 p. m. at Eastland, and the winner will advance to the State tournament in Austin next week. The two teams met earlier in the season with the Bears defeating the Panthers by a 7-4 score in a non-district game.

Four hits and two walks were parlayed into five runs in the third inning and that was all Gorman pitcher Jason Dittmore (10-2) needed, but the Panthers added five more in the top of the fifth to cut the game short.

"They hit the baseball like it had eyes and it seemed ours went right at them," said Loraine coach Bob Loy.

To a degree he was right, a lot of fly balls fell in front of the Loraine outfielders who were playing deep.

"We played deep because we knew they had a lot of power," Loy said.

The Panthers took the lead in the first inning and never gave it up. Cory Pack singled, stole second, and scored on Steve Taylor's single.

Two singles and a walk loaded the bases for Gorman in the third and the first run scored when Dittmore walked. Don Mauney had a two-run single, Noah Landa had a sacrifice

fly and Jade Warren singled in a run to make the score read 6-0.

Daniel Sanchez walked in the fourth and later scored when Neely Carter hit a high pop up between home and third. Loraine catcher Steve Gutierrez caught the ball, but no one covered home plate and Sanchez scored.

Loraine got their two runs in the bottom of the fourth on an infield hit, a force play and three Gorman errors. But the Panthers got those runs back and more in the top of the fifth. Landa doubled in a run and Taylor singled in two more to highlight the fifth inning outburst.

"We had several opportunities to score early, but we didn't and you can't do that against a seasoned team like Gorman," Loy added. His Bulldogs closed out with a 13-3 season in their first year of baseball. "We lose only one starter, so this was good experience for us."

Taylor had three singles and drove in as many runs while Pack, Warren and Mauney each had two hits to lead the Panthers. Meanwhile two of Loraine's four singles never got out of the infield.

"We made contact and missed some early opportunities, but I was afraid we might have a letdown after we played so well against Bryson last week," said Gorman coach Doug Shanafelt. "Jason started slowly today, but he finished strong (striking out three batters in the fifth)."

Chris Phillips (7-1) took the loss.

Warren's homer leads Gorman past Bryson

EASTLAND — Jade Warren slammed a three-run homer over the center-field wall in the sixth inning to break a tie and give Gorman a 6-3 Class A area round playoff win over Bryson Thursday.

The contest got off to a rocky start for Gorman starting pitcher Jason Dittmore as he surrendered a leadoff home run to the Bryson catcher on his fifth pitch of the game. But the Panthers escaped further damage when they turned an unusual double play by throwing out Cowboy runners at home and third base.

Pack kept the momentum on Gorman's side in the bottom of the frame by hitting a leadoff homer of his own off Bryson starter Whitfield to knot the score at one.

However for the next four innings, the Panthers could not scrape any rallies together and trailed 3-1 as they came to bat in the bottom of the sixth inning.

Steve Taylor led off the inning with a single and Dittmore followed with his ninth homer of the year to deadlock the score, 3-3. Unfortunately for Bryson, the Panthers were just getting started. Noah Landa walked after Dittmore's round-tripper and moved to third on a double by Don Mauney. That set the stage for Warren who followed with just his second home run of the season.

"We hit the ball on (Whitfield) all night, but we just kept hitting it right at someone," Gorman coach Doug Shanafelt said. "He's a good pitcher, but when Jason hit his homer I think it shook him a little bit and rattled him."

Dittmore allowed just six hits and struck out 10 Bryson batters as he improved his record to 9-2.

Angie Cobb and Randy Anderson July Wedding



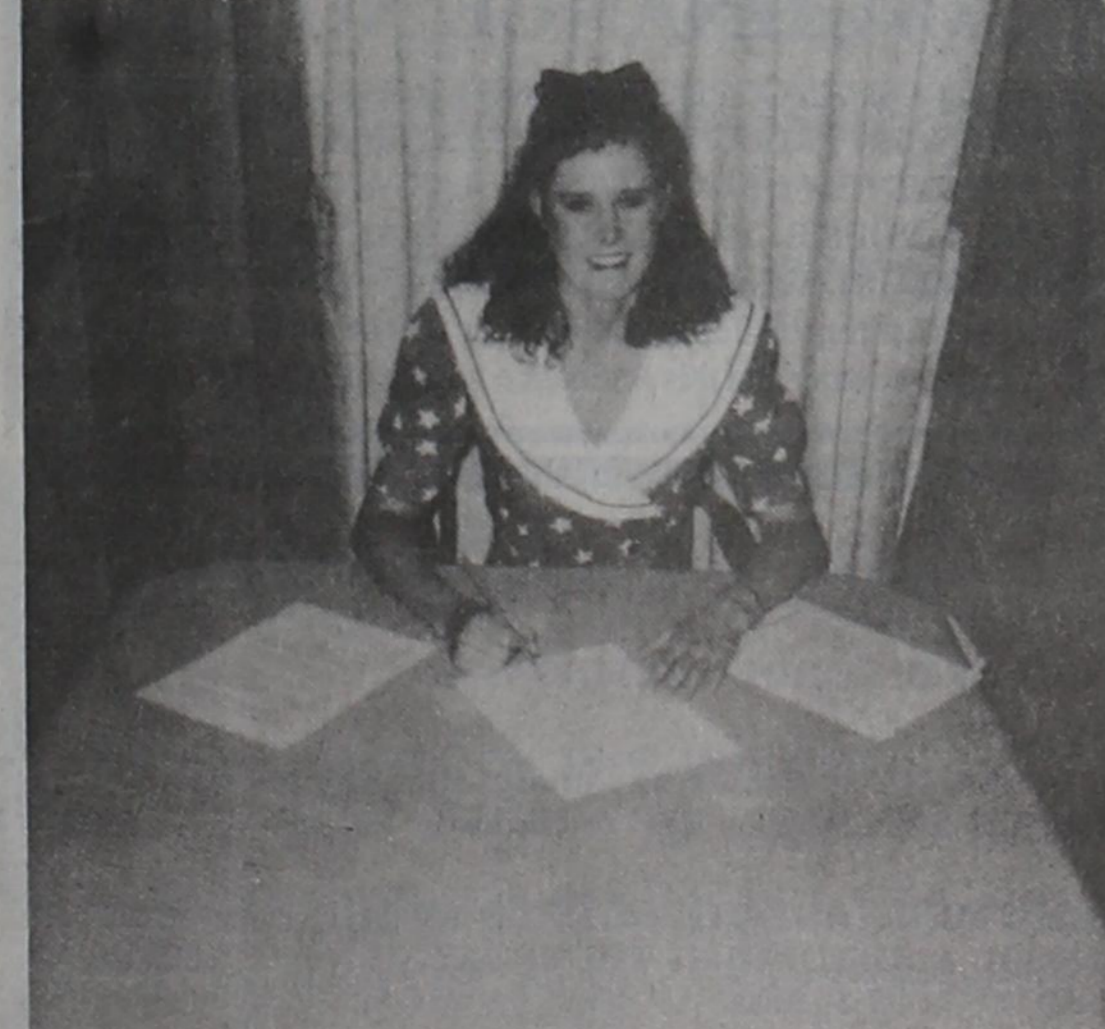
