Keller Man Killed In Hunting Accident Saturday

A 37-year-old man died at De Leon Hospital Sunday morning after his wife accidentally shot him while deer hunting.

Billy Ray Stacey of Keller, near Fort Worth, died at the hospital after the 6:20 a. m. shooting, according to a report from Kenneth Lunsford, game warden stationed in Comanche. The shooting was ruled accidental, said Comanche County Deputy Sheriff Vernon Gaines, who investigated the accident.

Lunsford said the Staceys had dropped off their 14-year-old son at one deer blind on a lease on the Doyle Poyner ranch about 10 miles southwest of Gorman, and they had gone to another. Mrs. Stacey was wearing coveralls and boots that were too big for her, and she stumbled, accidentally shooting her husband in the back, Lunsford said.

The son, who was about 50 to 70 yards away heard the shot and his mother's cries for help. When he reached the scene, the son fired his rifle into the ground three times to attract the attention of an uncle who was nearby, Lunsford said.

Stacey was taken in a pickup to the hospital where he was pronounced dead a short time later.

PANTHERS BEAT SANTO 38-19; PLAY RIESEL AT GLEN ROSE

The Gorman Panthers wound up their regular season on Friday night on a high note as they downed the Santo Wildcats 38 to 19 in a District 13A contest. The win put Gorman at 8-2 for the season and 5-1 in district.

The Panthers failed to move the ball on their first possession. However, after holding the Wildcats, the Panthers took the ball on their own 33 and moved the distance in 11 plays, with Henrik Bodlund booting a 25 yard field goal after being held on the Wildcat 15. The drive featured a ten yard keeper by Rajee Patel; a 24 yard pass and run play to Don Mauney; a 17 yard scamper by Tony Forbus; a 9 yard run by Mauney. The field goal put Gorman up 3-0.

Then after holding the Wildcats on their next possession, the Panthers got a break when the snap on a punt was too high for the punter, giving the Big Red a first and goal at the Santo 7. Following a two yard run, Tony Forbus went in from 5 yards out with 11:10 left in the second. Bodlund booted the point after and the score went to 10-0.

The Big Red defense again held the Wildcats, forcing a punt, which sailed out at the Santo 31. Following gains of 3 and 2 yards, Kris Scitern got loose on a 17 yard scamper to set the Panthers up at the Santo 5 with a first down. After a 4 yard gain, Mauney took the handoff and rammed into the end zone for the final yard with 7:42 left in the half. Bodlund again added the point after and the score was 17-0.

On the next possession the Wildcats took the kick on their own 27 and in just 4 plays they moved the distance with Tanner Thornburg running it in from 7 yards out with 6:05 left in the half. The drive featured runs of 24 and 44 by Thornburg, who was the top runner for the night with more than 100 yards. A pass try for two points failed and the score was 17-6.

The Panthers came right back following the Santo score and moved 65 yards in 10 plays with Patel tossing a perfect strike to Flavio Herrera for the final 11 yards with just 41 seconds left in the half. The drive featured an 11 yard run by Forbus; two runs of 4 yards each by Mauney for first downs; and a beautiful 15 yard pass from Patel to Henrik Bodlund. Bodlund caught three passes of 15, 29 and 40 for a total of 84 yards. Bodlund added the point after and the score was 24-6 at the halftime mark.

At intermission the Panther Band performed a routine of their own choosing, and it really brought applause from the fans as they put on their own show while Band Director Lisa Laminack looked on from the press box. It was a great halftime show.

New Officers Elected For County Dispatch Board

The Eastland County Dispatch Board received permission last week from the Texas Department of Health to use one of its generators as a backup power source.

The health department retains the right to reclaim the generator as needed for disasters in the state.

The dispatch's only expense will be setting it up and providing cover for it.

At its meeting Thursday, the dispatch board authorized purchasing up to \$400 worth of metal for a carport roof. Poles and other materials have been donated, said Chief Dispatcher Becky Holmes.

Officers for 1993 were elected. They are Ann Maxfield of Gorman, chairman; Mike Moore of Cisco, vice chairman; and Holmes, secretary. Law enforcement manager will be Elton McCoy of Ranger.

The drive featured 14 and 8 yard runs by Scitern and an 8 yard run for a first down by Mauney to set Gorman up at the Santo 12. Bodlund again booted the point after and the Panthers were up 31-12.

Gorman's defense again did the job and the Panthers took the ball on the Wildcat 40 and scored in just 4 plays with Bodlund catching a fantastic pass and racing the final 21 yards for the TD with 7:45 left. The score came after a 4 yard gain, an incomplete pass and a 4 yard toss by the Panthers when Bodlund caught the fourth down pass. Bodlund added the point after and the score went to 38-12.

The Wildcats came back with 2:18 left in the game with Codey Fowler running in for the score from 14 yards out after the Wildcats had took the ball at the Gorman 41. Following runs of 10 and 17, Fowler scored. Jeremy Fallin then added the point after and the final score was 38-19.

Tony Forbus led the Panthers with 60 yards on 7 carries. Kris Scitern got 59 on 13 trips, and Don Mauney ran for 58 on 14 tries. Nick Guthery carried three times for 23 yards. Charlie Torrez was 1 for 3. Patel had 12 on 3 keepers. Marco Herrera had a minus 10 on three tries.

Patel had a good night completing 5 of 12 passes for 119 yards.

PANTHERS MEET RIESEL IN PLAYOFF GAME AT GLEN ROSE

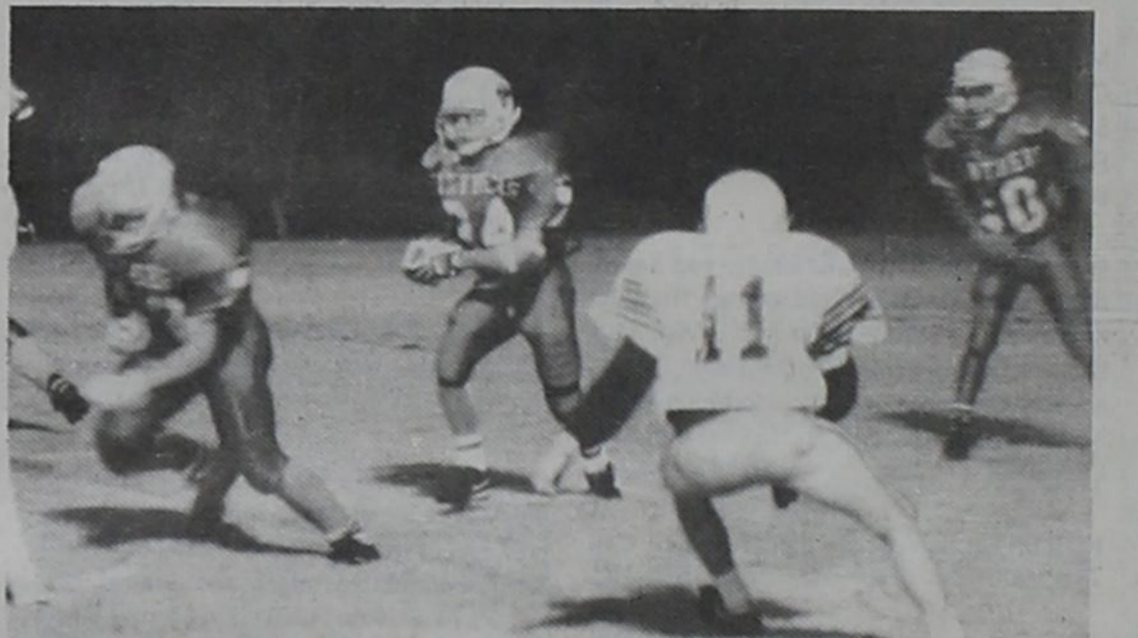

Son of Gorman Woman on South American Cruise

Aboard USS CUSHING (DD 985) — When Jeffery Tidwell joined the Navy five years ago, he was looking for a change. "I was trying to find myself," admits the son of Wanda Jo Stacy of Gorman. "After a year of college and working at a couple of jobs, I felt I wasn't going anywhere. I wanted a chance to better myself and to receive an education at the same time. The Navy appeared to offer exactly that."
Tidwell, an operations specialist second class, is assigned to the staff of Commander, South Atlantic Force U. S. Atlantic Fleet (USCOMSOLANT). Presently embarked aboard the destroyer USS Cushing, Tidwell

says he's getting what he's searching for.
"The Navy has given me a new direction and a ton of self esteem," says the former Andrew High School three-sport letterman. "I'm finding out that I can perform and perform well while under pressure. Before joining the Navy I never dreamed I could take so much pressure and still excel."
Tidwell's ship, the Cushing, is one of a four-ship U. S. contingent that is operating as part of a multi-national task force made up of the navies of eight South American countries. The annual cruise is called "Unitas," which is the Latin word for unity. During the cruise, the navies hold joint exercises and become familiar with each other's capabilities and operational styles.
During Unitas, Tidwell assists in planning and executing Navy underway exercises.

"Unitas is probably the most unique naval deployment that an officer or enlisted man can participate in," he says. "From what first started off as an ordinary show-the-flag goodwill cruise, it has blossomed into a full-fledged training cruise emphasizing all major areas of warfare. For many of us, Unitas is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to work close at hand with our South American counterparts."
Tidwell is no stranger to life at sea. With five years in the Navy, Tidwell has spent it all at sea.
Tidwell has visited more than twenty countries since he enlisted. "I've visited countries in Central and South America, Europe, Africa and

the Middle East," he says.
Tidwell says that although his current enlistment isn't over until 1996, he already has plans to make the Navy a 20-year-career.
As long as my wife agrees, I'll make this (the Navy) a career. I'm totally committed towards staying in the Navy until I reach eligibility for retirement."
Tidwell currently resides in Ceiba, Puerto Rico, with his wife, Margarita and their infant son, Jeffery.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Contel of Texas, Inc. has filed an amendment to its application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of its Universal Emergency Number Service 9-1-1 tariff. The proposed tariff establishes rules, regulations and rates including the provisioning the B9-1-1, C9-1-1, and E9-1-1 services; optional services, such as Selective Routing and Data Base Administration; additional services, such as Forced Disconnect, Called Party Hold, Emergency Ringback; Switched Access System; and Public Safety Answering Point Equipment.

Customers affected are either 9-1-1 districts or councils of government with 9-1-1 responsibilities. The application does not propose changes to emergency fees charged to end-user customers.

Twenty-three customers would be affected by the Universal Emergency Number 9-1-1 tariff, which would increase annual revenues by \$10,107.12, a 2.92% increase in the revenues generated by the contract rates of the current customers. Customers will have the option, however, of continuing the rates under their contract for up to one 12-month renewal term.

The deadline to intervene in this proceeding is December 24, 1992. Correspondence or any other communication regarding this matter should reference Docket No. 10929.

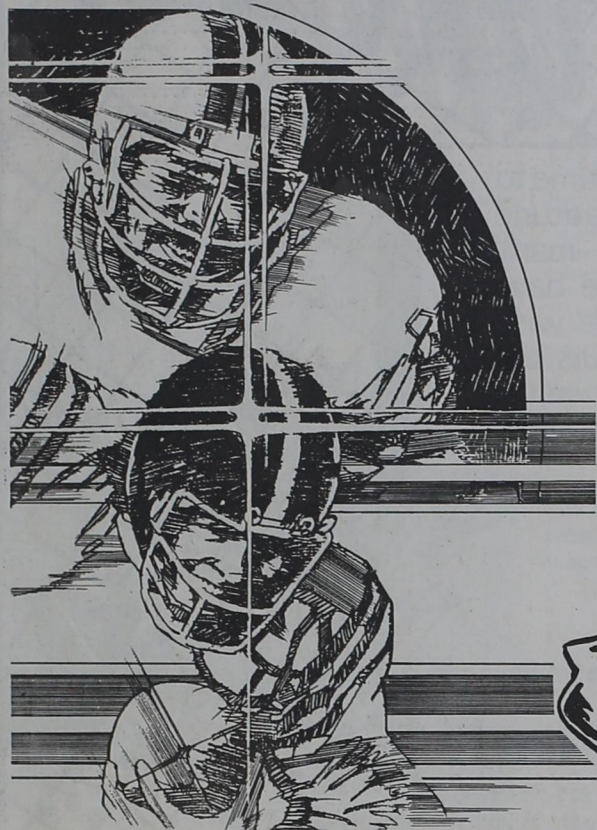

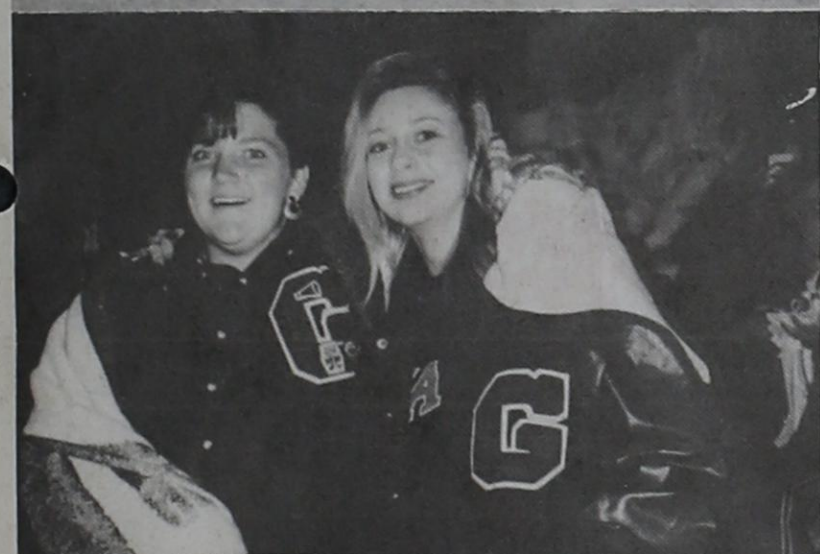

Agriculture Viewpoint

COWS NEED EXTRA CARE IN WINTER

As the cold sets in and the frost appears on the ground, it is again that time of the year for your cattle to become "Welfare Cows". Every time they hear the pickup engine, they come running down the road nearly turning the truck over to get to the cubes. Then comes the dangerous part. You pick up the sack and suddenly you are surrounded by thirty, four-legged monsters waiting for that first cube to hit the ground. Careful! don't let 'em step on your feet.

This sounds familiar to nearly every cattleman in the county I'm sure. However, these day's cattlemen are being surrounded by a different monster. Now, more than ever, a cattleman has many choices for protein supplements and according to who you talk with, everyone of them claim to be the most practical, economical product on the market. Gets very confusing to say the least.

Now, this is not to say that they're not all good products. They are good, however, their usages may vary depending on time of year, forage conditions, different categories of cattle (dry cows, pairs, etc.) and your own management ability.

For these reasons, area ranchers will have the opportunity to increase their knowledge of using protein supplements at a meeting on November 16th. The program is being coordinated by the Eastland and Callahan County Extension Livestock & Forage Committees and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The program will begin at 6 p. m. at the Cisco Junior College Agrocultural Building. Dr. Dennis Herd, TAM/TAEX Nutritionist will be the featured speaker.

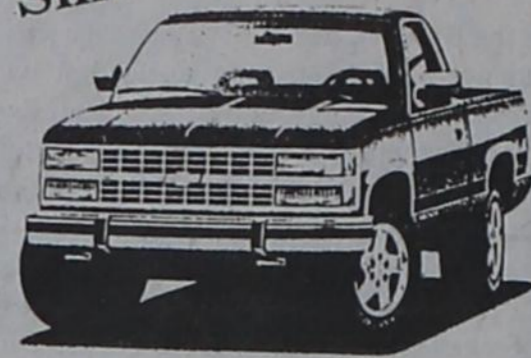

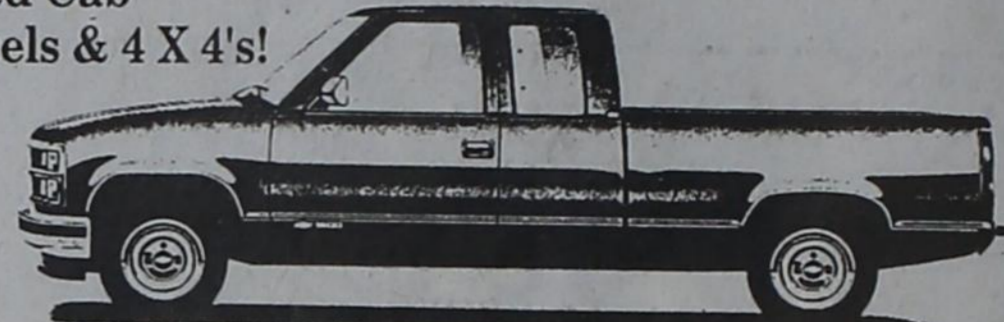
