

Contel of Texas, Inc. has filed an amendment to its application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of its Universal Emergency, Number Service 9-1-1 tariff. The proposed tariff establishes rules, regulations and rates including the provisioning the B9-1-1, C9-1-1, and E9-1-1 services; optional services, such as Selective Routing and Data Base Administration; additional services, such as Forced Disconnect, Called Party Hold, Emergency Ringback; Switched Access System; and Public Safety Answering Point Equipment.

Customers affected are either 9-1-1 districts or councils of government with 9-1-1 responsibilities. The application does not propose changes to emergency fees charged to end-user customers.

Twenty-three customers would be affected by the Universal Emergency Number 9-1-1 tariff, which would increase annual revenues by \$10,107.12, a 2.92% increase in the revenues generated by the contract rates of the current customers. Customers will have the option, however, of continuing the rates under their contract for up to one 12-month renewal term.

The entire program is geared to be a positive, ultimately enriching alternative adjudication process. Teens, through their active involvement, are afforded a way to learn how our

Peanut Quality Pice in Improving As Continues

After a very sluggish start in the peanut harvest both grades and yield are on the upswing. Early harvest indications showed from moderate to poor grades on both Spanish and Runner peanuts. However, things lok better as the middle of harvest rolls through. More recent grades in many areas of the county show from 72 to 78 on runner varieties which is considered to be a very good grade of peanuts. It's not just the grades that are coming in strong, but a very high yielding crop as well. Most producers are well over their quota (total poundage allocated for support price) and are searching for lease quota.

One of the nusual circumstances surrounding this year's peanut crop is the amount of rainfall and the effects on the peanuts. Many non-irrigated fields are exceeding irrigated crops due to disease influence created by the excessive moisture. Southern blight, pod rot and even slight amounts of sclerotinia blight have devastated some fields, especially where irrigation was used and in lower lying areas.

In evaluating the crop at the mid-harvest point, a concensus of producers agree that things look
