

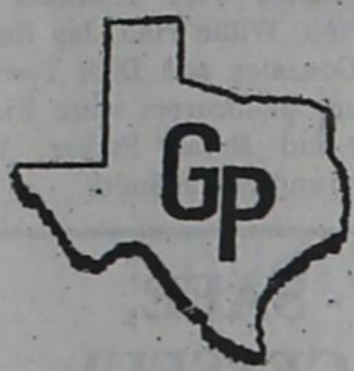

Applications For Pre-Kindergarten Now Being Accepted

The State Board of Education has adopted rules specifying how state funds will be distributed to school districts to pay for pre-kindergarten programs. The Gorman Independent School District is now accepting applications for four year old children who might qualify for a half-day pre-kindergarten program. This program is for children whose family income is at or below subsistence level and for children who are limited English proficient. Those children who have older brothers and sisters in the free lunch program will qualify.

The purpose of the program will be to assist students in learning English and to prepare them for Kindergarten. A pre-kindergarten class will not be taught unless at least 15 four year olds who qualify under state guidelines register.

El Departamento de Educacion de Texas ha adoptado reglas que estipulan como seran distribuidos a los distritos escolares los fondos para pagar por los programas "pre-kindergarten" - es decir, antes de kindergarten. 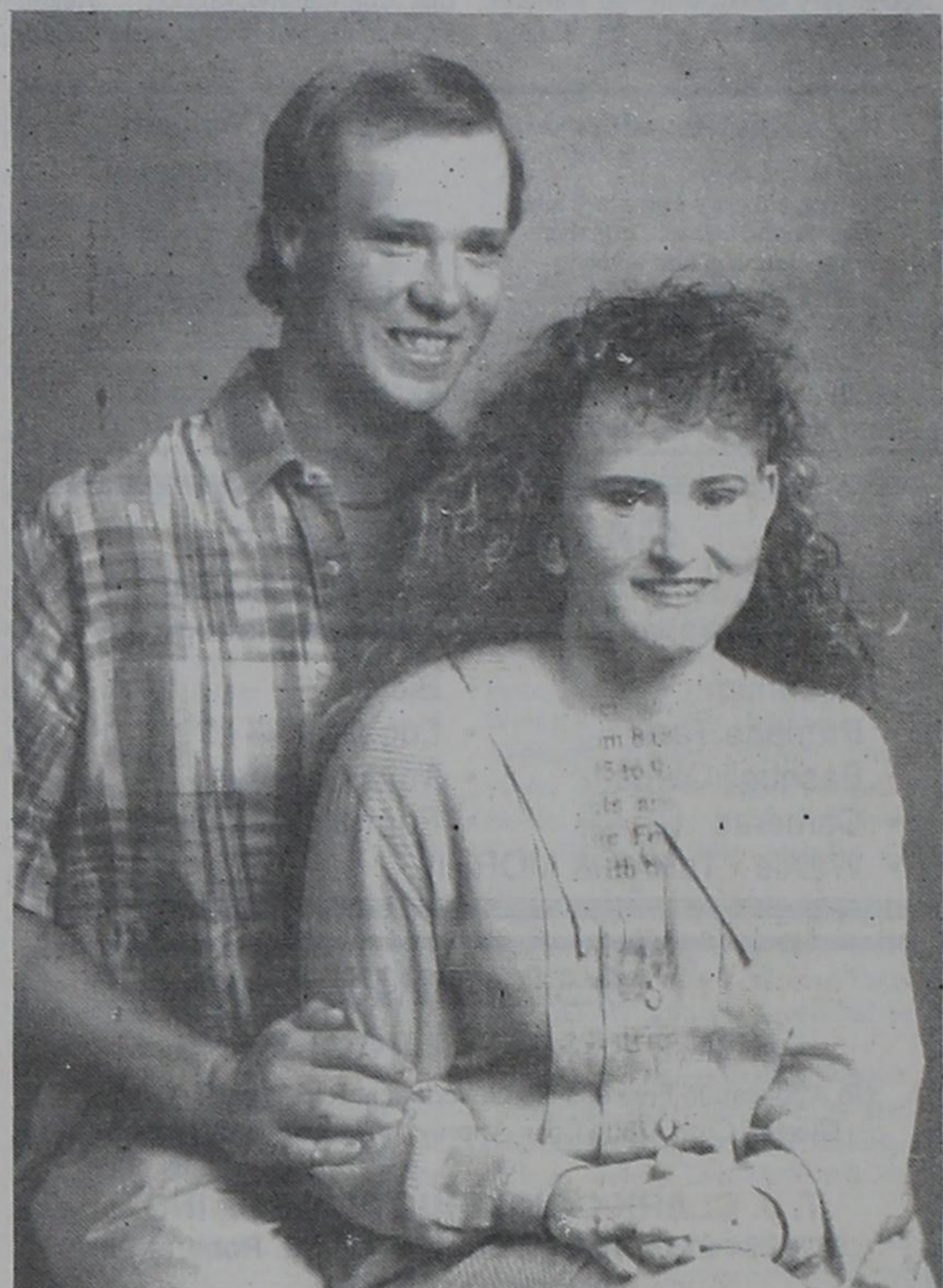

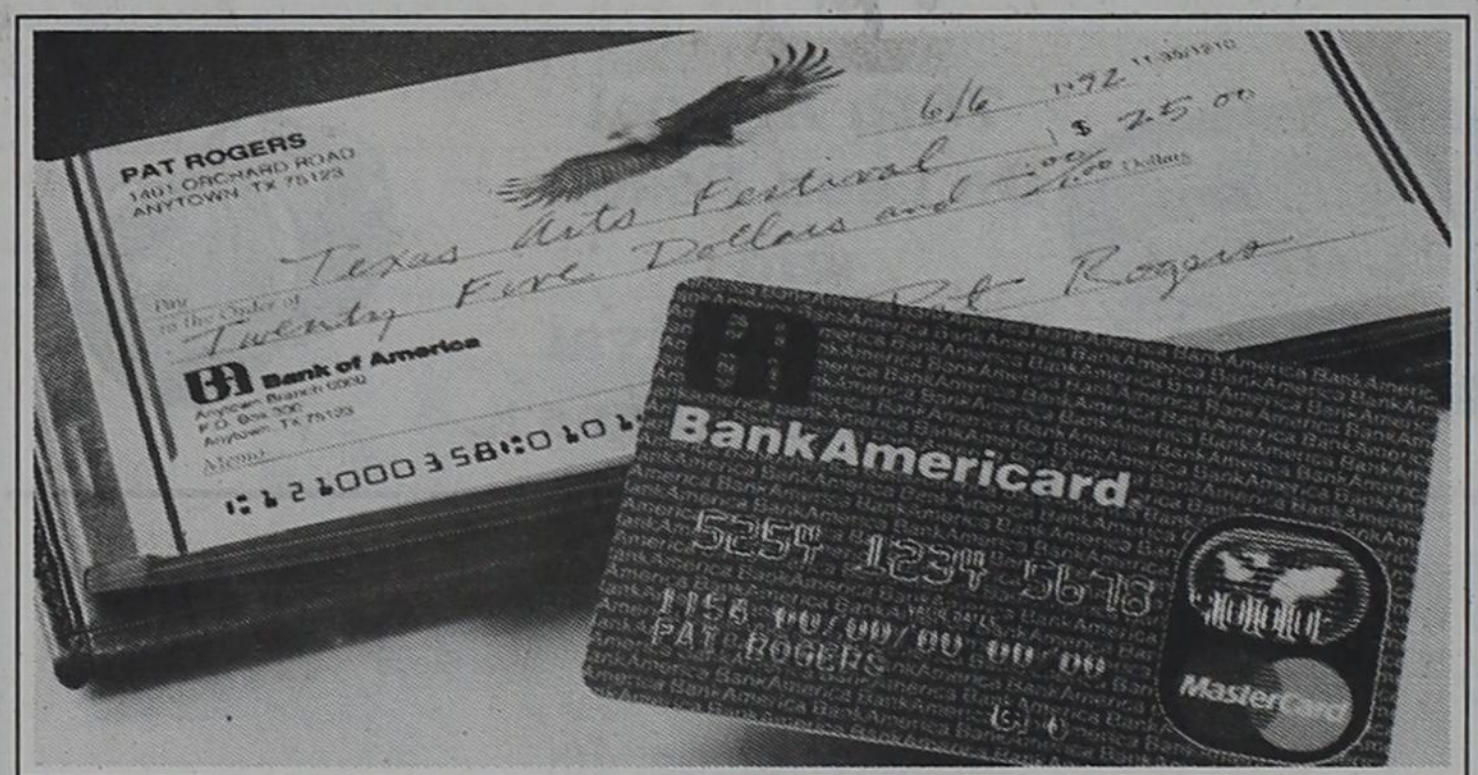

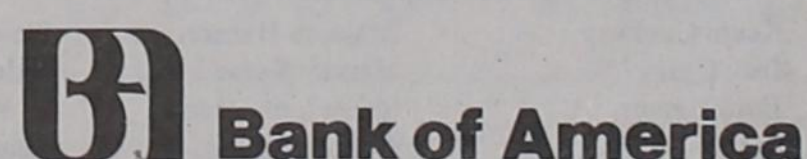

Eastland County to borrow money to fix roads, bridges

EASTLAND — County commissioners are again in a borrowing mood.

On July 13, two Eastland businessmen appeared to have successfully argued against commissioners' plans to borrow about \$500,000 for road improvements. But Monday that appeared to change.

Part of the money would go toward expenses connected with widening Farm-to-Market Road 570 to its intersection with FM 2214 east of Eastland. Part would go toward rural road and bridge repairs.

Businessmen Earl Bradley and Jim Moylan didn't object to the plans for the money, but to borrowing money when the county has a \$850,000 reserve fund.

At that meeting, commissioners refused to vote "yes" even though a date had been set to sell bonds to repay the loan.

On Monday, Precinct 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson said, "We are not going to do what

those people (Moylan and Bradley) want us to do. We will not spend every dime we have."

Robinson said the project might not be as expensive as first thought. Some land will be donated and some companies have agreed to move their own utility lines, he said.

Several years ago commissioners were presented petitions asking that the highway to Stephenville be widened. Commissioners said the current project is the first step and eventually all the road will be widened.

Also, commissioners passed a resolution allowing the Eastland County Food Pantry to remain at its present location two more years. Organizations planning on repairing the building asked for assurances the pantry will continue at its same spot near the old jail.

Commissioners called a meeting at 9 a.m. Monday to review budgets from department heads.

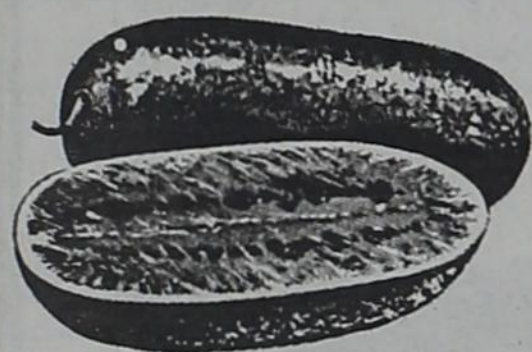

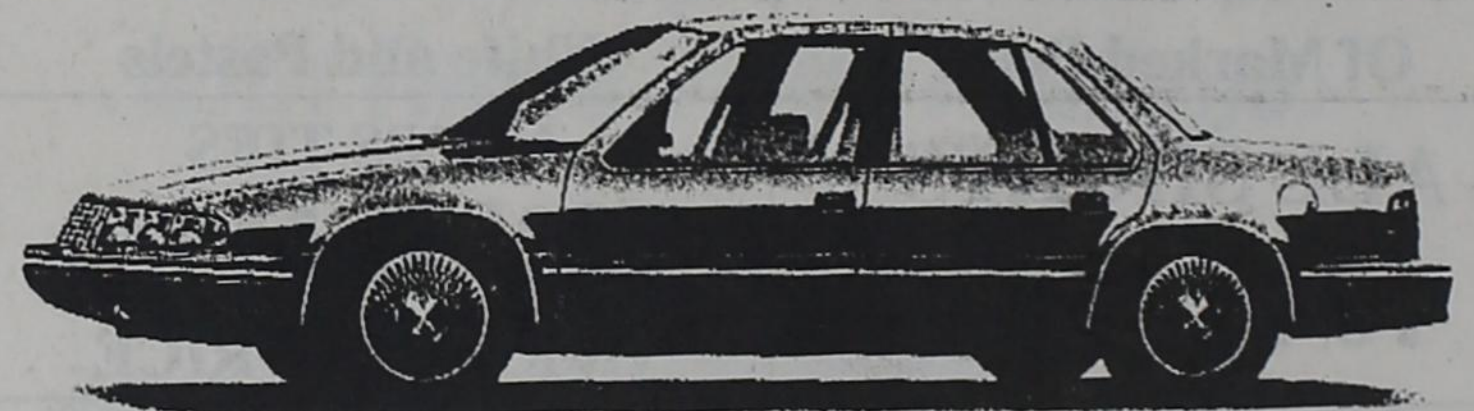

Stock Show Calf Scrambles are certainly not new to club youth, however, today more and more youth can take a successful bid in a scramble due to the added shows to the list. Houston, Fort Worth, San Antonio and West Texas Fair at Abilene each have a calf scramble for youth to participate in.

A short list of requirements include being a 4-H or FFA member, meet eligibility requirements as stated by Texas Education Agency (PASS), certain age requirements for different shows, usually 12 to 18, keep and submit monthly records upon a successful catch, and show the beef or dairy heifer at the following year's show.

FmHA NOW OFFERING GUARANTEED RURAL HOUSING LOANS

Temple — Sidney D. Woods, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) in Comanche County, announced July 20th that the agency in Texas is now accepting applications through approved local lenders for rural housing loan guarantees.

This new Guarantee Program offers loan opportunities to families who by themselves are unable to afford a commercial loan, thereby extending the possibilities available to rural residents to obtain decent housing. Guaranteed single-family housing loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of a property, for which Farmers Home Administration guarantees 90 percent of this amount for the lender. This program offers opportunities not only to low-income families with incomes of approximately \$18,000 to \$38,000, yet to moderate-income families with incomes of \$23,000 to \$47,000 who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere. FmHA Housing Guarantees furthermore have a loan fee of one (1) percent which is less than the similar fee for FHA or VA.

Areas eligible to receive FmHA funding include open country, communities with populations of 10,000 or less, and under certain conditions, towns and cities with populations between 10,000 and 20,000.

Applications for guaranteed rural housing loans should be submitted to local approved lenders of FmHA.

FmHA, as the lending arm of the U. S. Government, has long been a source of credit for farmers, ranchers and rural homeowners who have been unable to obtain credit through commercial lenders such as banks, savings and loans, PCA and Federal Land Banks. FmHA has attempted to aid those borrowers as a lender of last resort.

With direct deposit your money is available at the opening of business on the same day payments are scheduled to arrive in the mail. "In fact, you can write personal checks to pay bills or use your bank card to get money immediately."
