### Panthers Defeated By Reisel In Area Playoff Game

The Panthers met the Reisel Indians in the Area Playoffs on Friday night at Glen Rose and came out on the short end of a one-sided game as they were outclassed by a big Reisel team by the score of 38 to 7. The Indians scored 13 in the first quarter; 12 in the second and 13 in the third to completely dominate the Panthers, who just couldn't get anything going against the Indian defense.

With 52 seconds left in the first half the Indians scored on a 6 yard run by Roosevelt Roddy. The drive covered 58 yards and followed an interception. The Indians scored in 6 plays, with the big play being a 29 yard pass to Holloway. Again the pass try for two points failed and the score was 25-0 at the half way mark.

The Indians came right back in the third and went 64 yards in 7 plays, with Urbantke getting the final 4 yards on a run with 9:31 left. The kick for point failed and the score stood at 31-0.

After holding the Panthers again, the Indians took the ball on their own 21 and went the distance in 5 plays with David Jahdonowski getting the final 30 yards on a run with 3:21 left in the third. Urbantke booted the point after and the Indians were up 38 to 0.

The Indians scored on their first possession, after intercepting a Panther pass at their own 38 and going the distance in just four plays with Roosevelt Roddy racing for 45 yards with 7:47 left in the period. Russel Urbantke kicked the point after and Reisel led 7-0.

Then with the Indian reserves on the field, the Panthers got a drive going from the Indian 40 and scored in 11 plays with Don Mauney going the final yard with 9:21 left in the game. The drive featured a 12 yard pass to Henrik Bodlund. Bodlund added the point after and the final score read 38-7.

Then after holding the Panthers on the next possession, the Indians took the ball on their own 44 and scored in six plays with Atron Taylor getting the final 2 yards with 4:31 left in the first. The kick failed and the score was 13-0.

Then the Indian reserves on the field, the Panthers got a drive going from the Indian 40 and scored in 11 plays with Don Mauney going the final yard with 9:21 left in the game. The drive featured a 12 yard pass to Henrik Bodlund. Bodlund added the point after and the final score read 38-7.

Then in the second quarter the Indians got the ball on their own 37 and scored in just two plays with Atron Taylor again racing 45 yards for the TD with 11:05 left in the half and a pass for the two points failed leaving the score 19-0.

Don Mauney led the Panthers with 90 yards on 16 carries. Kris Scitern had 65 yards on 14 tries. Tony Forbus got 40 on 10 totes, and Rajee Patel had 35 yards on 6 keepers.

The Panthers had a very good season, coming out as the District runner-up after they were not really expected to be in the playoffs. The Big Red finished the season 8 and 3. Congratulations! Panthers! Great job.

In a discussion of the former Senior Citizens Center, a multi-age committee (advisory board) was appointed for recommendations of fees, scheduling, and ideas on keeping our community center open.

Ordinance No. 320 - Gorman/Oak-lawn Association Agreement was read for the second time and was passed.

Howard Hagood made the motion, seconded by Johnny Smith, to accept the bid from Bruner Motors, Inc. for \$17993.89 for a fire truck. Motion carried 4-0. The delivery date will be within 6-8 weeks.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 7:30 p. m.

Those who wish to be Certified should bring proof of residence and income.

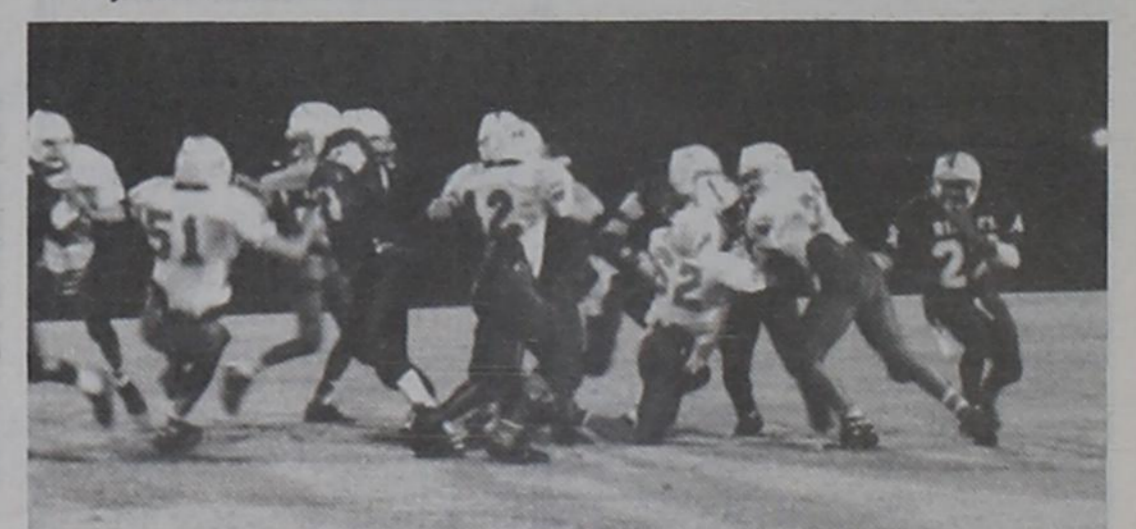

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Contel of Texas, Inc. has filed an amendment to its application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of its Universal Emergency Number Service 9-1-1 tariff. The proposed tariff establishes rules, regulations and rates including the provisioning of the B9-1-1, C9-1-1, and E9-1-1 services; optional services, such as Selective Routing and Data Base Administration; additional services, such as Forced Disconnect, Called Party Hold, Emergency Ringback; Switched Access System; and Public Safety Answering Point Equipment.

Customers affected are either 9-1-1 districts or councils of government with 9-1-1 responsibilities. The application does not propose changes to emergency fees charged to end-user customers.

Twenty-three customers would be affected by the Universal Emergency Number 9-1-1 tariff, which would increase annual revenues by \$10,107.12, a 2.92% increase in the revenues generated by the contract rates of the current customers. Customers will have the option, however, of continuing the rates under their contract for up to one 12-month renewal term.

The deadline to intervene in this proceeding is December 24, 1992. Correspondence or any other communication regarding this matter should reference Docket No. 10929.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in this proceeding should notify the Commission. ## Firearm Safety Must Be Practiced

Accidents with firearms during hunting season don't just happen. They often are caused by ignorance, carelessness or disregard for safety rules, said Dr. Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Mayes received the accelerated promotion in recognition of outstanding performance of duty, proficiency and professional abilities.

"Don't let a needless hunting tragedy mar your hunting pleasure," he said.

He suggested 10 rules to follow whenever handling weapons anytime not just during hunting season.

\* Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.

\* Watch that muzzle! Be able to control the direction of the muzzle even if you should stumble.

\* Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying.

\* Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know identifying features of the game you hunt.

\* Unload guns when not in use. Keep actions open; guns should be

carried in cases to the shooting area.

\* Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay with a firearm.

\* Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

\* Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water; at target practice be sure your backstop is angled.

\* Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children and careless adults.

\* Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting.

Even though "blaze orange" is not required to be worn except when hunting on public land, hunters should at least wear a bright orange cap for their own safety, Rollins stressed.

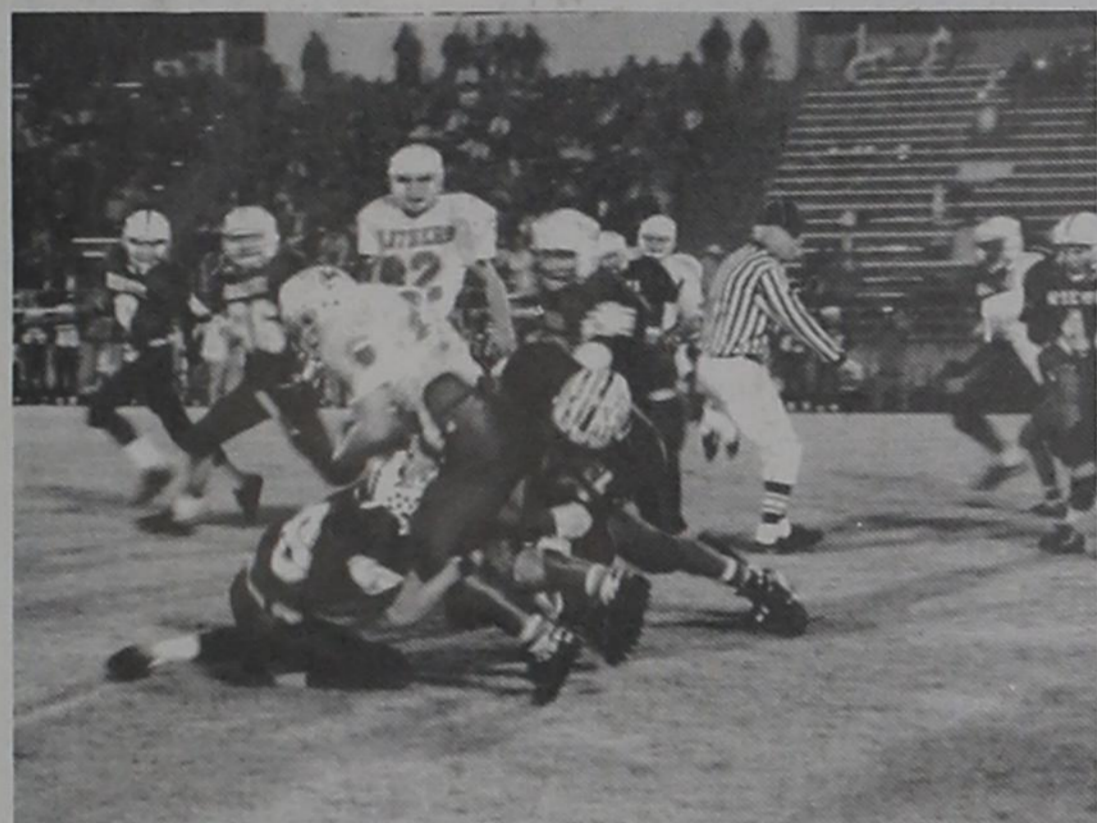
