Panthers Defeat Covington; Travel To Perrin-Whitt

The Panthers traveled to Covington on Friday and came away with their first win of the season with a 42-21 victory. Gorman opened up a 14/0 advantage at the end of the first quarter and held a 22-7 halftime lead. They added 13 in third and 7 in fourth for the 42-21 win.

Gorman took the opening kickoff on their own 41 and scored in nine plays with Jacob McCullough getting the final yard with 7:43 left in the period. The drive featured runs of 7 and 5 yards by David Seaton and 30 yard scamper by Josh Longoria that set Gorman up with a first down at the Owl 12. The kick for point failed and Gorman led 6-0.

The Big Red scored again on their second possession, going 66 yards in just 5 plays with Josh Longoria catching a beautiful pass from Ben Longoria for 54 yards with 2:56 left in the first. David Seaton added the 2 pointer on a run and the score was 14-0.

Then the Panther scored again on their third possession, going 72 yards in a long 13 play drive with Seaton getting the final yard with 6:45 left in the half. The drive featured runs of 10, 5, and 7 yards by Seaton, and runs of 2, 9, and 13 by Ben Longoria, and a 10 yard pass to Josh Longoria. The 2 pointer was added when Chris Dodd caught a pass off a bobbled extra point try to make the score 22-0.

Then after getting the ball on the Gorman 2 after an interception the Owls got on the scoreboard when McClain ran in for the score with 4:19 left in the half. The Owls got the point after to make the score 22-7. This score held up until intermission.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band put on a very good halftime show to thrill the Gorman and Covington fans and the Cheerleaders from both schools entertained those present.

The game stayed fairly even until the midway mark of the third when the Owls held the Big Red at the Owl 1 and one big blast the Owls

scored on a 99 yard pass and run with 6:46 left in the third. They added the point after and the score stood at 22-14.

Then the Panthers came right back, going 62 yards in 7 plays with Josh Longoria getting the final 35 yards on a beautiful pass from brother Ben with 3:40 left in the third. The kick for point failed and Gorman led 28-14.

After holding the Owls the Big Red got the ball on the Owl 44 and scored in just 4 plays with Josh Longoria getting the final 10 yards with 58 seconds left in the third. The drive featured runs of 12 and 20 by Seaton. Adrian Sichau added the point after and Gorman was up 35-14.

The owls came right back and got the ball on their own 31 and scored in 5 plays with McClain scoring from 49 yards out on a run with 11:09 left. After the point after the score was 35-21.

Gorman cam right back to answer the Owl score, going 59 yards in 12 plays with McCullough catching a 24 yard pass from Longoria for the TD with 3:57 left. The drive featured several good runs. Sichau added the point after and the final score was 42-21.

Seaton led the Panthers with 113 yards on 22 carries. Ben Longoria got 80 on 18 keepers. McCullough had 76 on 18 and Josh Longoria had 49 on 3 tries.

The Big Red goes on the road again this week to take on the strong Perrin-Whitt Pirates in a 7:30 game. The Panthers will need another fine effort to take this one, so let's all follow the boys to Perrin-Whitt and back them all the way.

Gorman ISD District Committee Forming

The District-Level Planning Committee is being formed for the 2000-2001 school year. The committee will be composed of 13 members who shall represent campus-based professional staff, District-level professional staff, parents, businesses, and the community. At least two-thirds of the District and campus professional staff shall be classroom teachers. The remaining one-third shall be professional nonteaching District- and campus-level staff. Representatives shall be elected or selected annually and shall be limited to two consecutive terms on the committee. Community representatives must reside in the district while business representatives may reside outside the district. Two parents, two community members, and two business representatives are needed to serve.

The committee shall advise in establishing and reviewing the District's educational goals, objectivities, and major Districtwide classroom instructional program. The committee shall serve exclusively in an advisory role except that the committee shall approve staff development of a Districtwide nature.

The committee shall meet outside the regular school day and will meet at least two times during the school year; additional meetings may be held at the call of the chairperson.

Maxfield Elementary Title I School

Maxfield Elementary qualifies as a Schoolwide Title I Program based upon the percentages of students on the free and reduced breakfast/lunch program. The U.S. Department of Education allocates, through the state education agency, title I, Part A funds using the Census Bureau's school district estimates of poor school-age children. The funds are to provide opportunities for children served to acquire the knowledge and skills contained in Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills and to meet the state performance standards, Texas Assessment of Academic Skills, developed for children. These funds are not only for students in the Gorman ISD but students in private schools within the district are eligible for services.

Allocated Title I funds at Maxfield Elementary are used for some teacher and aide salaries. At this time there are 235 students enrolled in Maxfield Elementary. Our grades include Pre-K through 6th grades. This is the first year of full day prekindergarten. Seventy-two percent of our students qualify for the lunch program. Our student population is made up of 33 percent Hispanic, 67 percent Anglo and 0 percent of other. There are 18 certified teachers in the elementary and 8 aides. The exemplary Rating given to Maxfield Elementary for the 1999-2000 school was the fourth time the elementary has received that rating. This was the first year the District received the rating of Exemplary.

and married my wife Jean. We have been together for 46 years and have two children.

I believe that L.T. Owens had done an outstanding job in Precinct 3 and compliment him for his work and accomplishments. I believe that I can build on that by using some ideas of my own in regards to improving the roads and by being involved in running the county business.

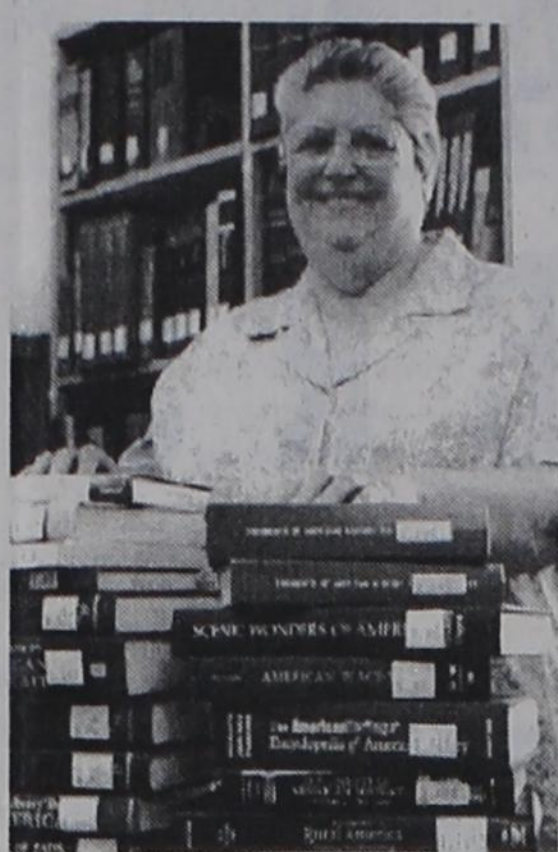
Some of the things that I would like to do or will try to do is to set up a continuous paving program for county roads. This may be more difficult now than when I first registered to run for commissioner because of the cuts of this years budget and next years budget, for Precinct 3 of \$88,222.00. In years past if the commissioners could cut cost and have money left over it was put in a savings account for later use, such as buying motor graders, trucks, or whatever. That savings (somewhere around \$458,500.00) (over \$150,000.00 from Pct. 3 alone) was taken from the commissioners savings and put into the general fund to help create the \$1.3 million surplus we are supposed to have at the end of next year. I have made some cost studies and even with these cuts I sill plan on paving some roads. I have a lot of questions concerning this budget. I may come back to this in a later article.

I believe that ad valorem tax is an unfair tax on property owners. They not only pay county tax, but school tax, hospital district tax, city tax on their property and then sales tax and other tax the same as non-property owners. I am going to make a bold statement here, not without a lot of deep thought and apprehension but because of the way some of you may receive the idea. I have a plan that will eliminate ad valorem tax as we know it today. This plan can eventually eliminate ad valorem tax altogether and at the same time create more funding for the county than it now gets from taxes. The plan itself is simple but there are lots and lots of detail, a lot of scenarios and what-ifs to be worked out. It will be a great task to undertake and will require a lot of work from all commissioners to even get it out of court and to the citizens for their input. It will be a serious undertaking that will affect a lot of people and there is no room for errors and must be formulated for the future as well as for the present.

Another item I am definitely interested in is economic development. Our county has a serious problem in that

Promise Kept for 45 Years

La Von Snider Leaves HPU Library after more than four decades of service

When LaVon Snider walked away from the Walker Memorial Library at Howard Payne University for the final time in May, she made good on a promise she kept for more than four decades.

In 1955, Snider applied for a job in the president's office at Howard Payne, Dr. Thomas Taylor, who was completing a 26-year tenure as the college's president, had just hired a typist in his office. She quit after one day on the job, leaving Dr. Taylor searching for a replacement. Snider clearly remembers one question from her interview with Dr. Taylor.

"He looked at her and asked, 'LaVon, can you work longer than one day?'" she recalled.

She promised him she could, and she did.

After 45 years of service in the library, Snider retired at the end of the spring semester. She's returning home to Eastland County to spend more time with family. And she's looking forward to life without mention of such library terms as the Dewey decimal system and the Library of Congress classification system.

Soon after she was hired at Howard Payne, Snider's attention to detail was quickly evident. She joined the library staff where she was put in charge of cataloging books, which included typing and proofing cards, labels, and pockets for every book, as well as ensuring accuracy in the library's card catalog.

Throughout her career, Snider estimated that she handled most, if not all, of the books on the library shelves. Today, HPU's library holdings include 75,000 books.

To help put that number into perspective, an average book on the library shelf is an estimated 10 inches in length. If those books were laid end-to-end, the line would extend more than 20,800 yards, or the equivalent of 208 football fields.

The number of books that passed across her desk, though, never phased Snider, who said she approached her job "one book at a time."

"I found my niche at Howard Payne," she said. "I'm not comfortable dealing with the public. I'd rather go to my office and work behind-the-

younger generations move to a place where they can find work. Next years budget has \$25,000.00 for economic development. It is the responsibility of all commissioners to work with all towns in helping to achieve development. scenes. I always liked what I was doing."

Snider also appreciated those with whom she worked.

She valued the confidence placed in her by her first librarian, Frances Burrage, who told Snider "to just do your best" at a time when Snider admits she was a "greenhorn."

She remembered the support of Dr. Roger Brooks, who served HPU as president from 1973-79. He purchased Snider's first electric typewriter, replacing the previous model she used that dated back to 1913.

"That new typewriter had correction tape and I thought I was in high cotton," she said.

Snider enjoyed coffee breaks with Dr. Z.T. Huff, academic vice president, who would "make it a point never to talk about business while drinking coffee."

And she enjoyed sharing jokes with Miss Lena Vinson, HPU's cashier, and Groner Pitts, longtime member of the board of trustees.

"I've seen Groner Pitts at his best," she said.

It was Snider's sense of humor that helped her survive occasional broken water pipes, faulty air conditioning in a building that opened in 1952, and lost library books.

"I've heard plenty of excuses from students who said their dogs ate their library books," she said. "We have a lot of books with dog bites."

Snider's sense of humor and strong work ethic endeared her to her colleagues.

Nancy Anderson, current library director at HPU, was impressed with Snider's willingness and enthusiasm to delve into the world of technology. In the mid-1980's, HPU's library began making the transition to electronic cataloging. Snider helped lead the way.

"The majority of librarians I visited with at other universities warned me about the difficulties of getting their cataloging staff to stop using catalog cards and begin doing everything on the computer," she said.

Anderson was surprised because Snider "embraced change, invited it and initiated it."

Snider, who said she was "born 30 years too soon," will miss being a part of the technological advances in the library. Her friends in the library ensure that Snider will continue to utilize technology in the future, though, presenting her WebTV upon her retirement so they can communicate through e-mail.

"I know we are all going to miss her wonderful stories about the library and the people she came into contact with over the years," Anderson said. "She was a delightful coworker and I am going to miss her more than I can say."

Chocolate Cake w/ Peanut Butter Filling
Amy Wood
2nd place

2 C. sugar
2 C. flour
2 stk. butter
4 Tbs. cocoa
1 C. water
Sift together sugar and flour, set aside. Add remaining ingredients together and bring to a rapid boil. Add to sugar and flour mixture, mix well.
Add:
2 eggs beaten
1/2 C. buttermilk
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. soda
Pour batter in three 8 in. square pans. Bake at 400 degrees until pick comes out clean.

Chocolate Icing
4 Tbs. cocoa
6 Tbs. milk
1 stk. butter
Boil together, and 1 box powdered sugar, 1tsp. vanilla.

Simple Syrup
1 C. water
1 C. sugar
Boil till dissolved. Stir in 1/4 C. vanilla. Cool.
Saturate each layer of cake.
Peanut Butter Filling
2 C. peanut butter chips
1 C. creamy peanut butter
Melt together. While hot spread on each layer of cake.
Top this layer with chocolate icing. (recipe above)
Place layers together. Decorate with Meringue Buttercream icing.
Meringue Buttercream Icing
5 egg whites
1 1/4 C. sugar
Whisk together over low heat till warm. Beat this mixture until glossy and soft peak forms. Add 4 stk. unsalted butter, 1 Tbs. almond extract. Beat until creamy.
Candy Peanuts
6 C. Reese's Peanut Butter chips
Melt and pour into candy molds. Place in refrigerator till firm.
Use for decoration.

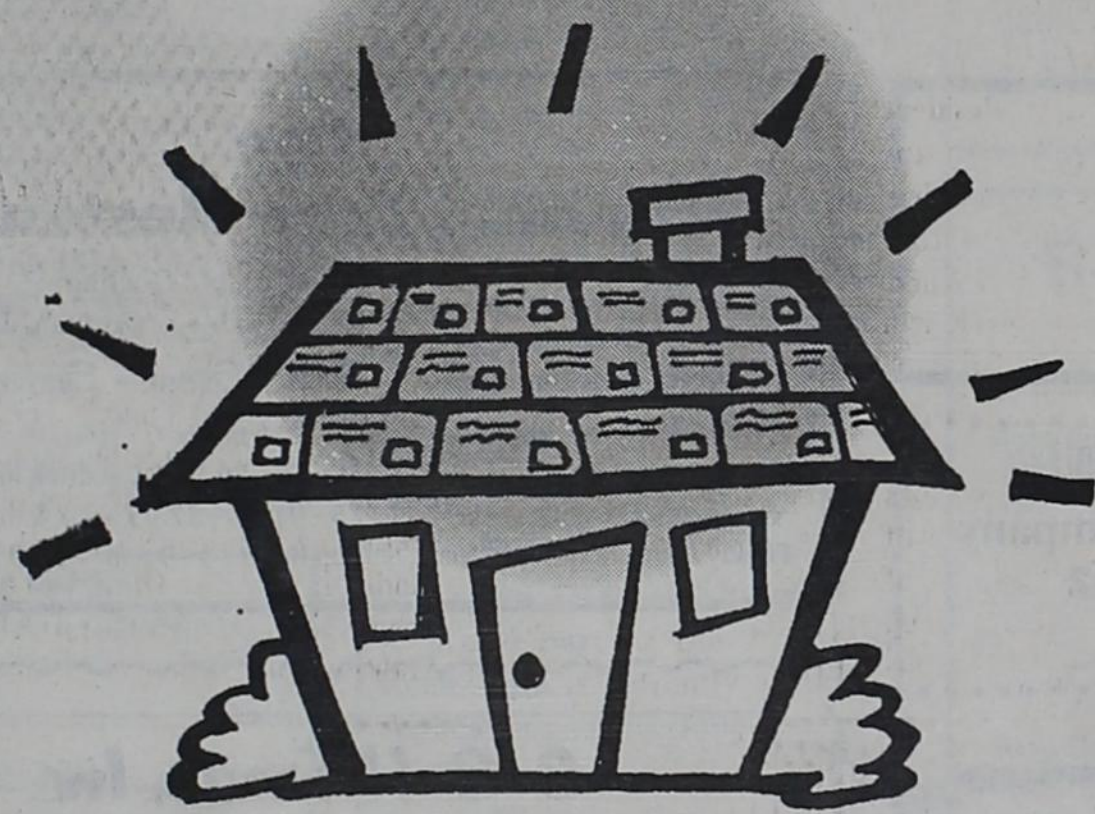

1 C. powdered sugar
