Be All You Can..Read!

National Library Week is being observed in Muleshoe from Sunday, April 21 through Sunday, April 27.

The theme, nation-wide is "Be All You Can -- Read!" Emphasis this year, for the entire year will focus on the new Texas State Plan for inter-library cooperation and informing the public of the library's resources. . . It's goals and needs.

The week-long observance here is under the sponsorship of Friends of the Library and Muleshoe Study Club.

Goal and slogan on the local level is "Better Library Service For All Our Four-County Area."

One of the features of the week will be "No Fine Week." This means that anyone who has a library book, no matter how long they have had it, will not be charged a fine if they will return it to the Muleshoe Area Public Library this week.

Librarian Anne Camp points out that if books are returned in good condition, their return will clear the records with the library.

"Only once each year, is the library book user given this opportunity," she added.

Also during the week, displays of new books will be out for viewing as will Memorial Gift Books. A special display will be made from 1940 Life Magazines. Scrapbooks will

also be one of the unique displays and something which should be of interest to everyone will be a book collection of photographs made at the New York World's Fair. . . what year? Come view it and guess, librarians say.

A bonus story hour will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday with a film to be shown.

Story hour is held for preschool children twice each month.

Each Summer, a special Summer Reading Club is held for boys and girls. This past summer, more than 500 participated with 118 completing requirements by reading 12 books and receiving certificates and awards.

During 1967, a total of 18,295 books were checked out and numerous new books have been added.

The library is supported by the City of Muleshoe, Bailey

County and the Friends of the Library organization. Public funds were added to boost the financial side of the library books.

Muleshoe Area Public Library is governed by a Library Board of Trustees who are approved by the City Council and the operational budget is submitted by the Library Board, approved and administered through the City Council.

McGuire to Deliver Keynote Address at Athletic Banquet

The annual Muleshoe Athletic banquet will be held Saturday, April 27 at 8 p.m. in the Muleshoe School Cafeteria. The keynote address will be by John McGuire of Tascosa High School, Amarillo.

McGuire is from Fayetteville, Ark. and is a graduate of Arkansas State University. He was a letterman in football and track for four years and served as Captain of the team in 1950. He was also named as "Most Valuable" player that year.

His first coaching assignment was in Hayti, Mo., coaching all sports from 1951 - 54. He moved to Caruthersville, Mo. in 1954 and from that time until February, 1958, was coach and athletic director, McGuire

was a member of the original staff at Tascosa High School as backfield coach and head track coach. Track teams won two district championships, and set national records in two-mile relay.

He became head football coach when Caprock High School opened in 1963. He then returned to Tascosa in December, 1967 and in District 3-AAAAA lost to Abilene Cooper in the quarter - finals.

McGuire and his wife are parents of two daughters, Vicki and Cindy.

Mrs. McGuire and members of his staff and their wives plan to accompany the coach to Muleshoe.

New and Old Directors Hold Special Session

An all - new board of directors was elected when voters went to the polls Saturday, April 6, to serve in the Earth-Sprinkle Hospital District.

A joint meeting of the five outgoing directors and the five incoming directors was held in Earth at the Citizen's State Bank recently.

Purpose of the meeting was for the boards of the district along with current bills to be presented to the incoming directors, and to answer any questions concerning business conducted by the board prior to the election.

However, the incoming directors refused to accept the boards

of the District until their attorney could attend to represent them.

They were sworn into office Thursday, April 18 and will accept the responsibility of the trust invested in them by public vote.

Speculation in the district is that the district will be abolished if possible. The new directors were elected by the largest turn - out of voters recorded in the history of the Earth-Sprinkle area in several years. Approximately 80 percent of the qualified voters in the Hospital District cast ballots, electing the all-new board.

Fire Reduces Golden West Seed Company to Rubble

Fire ravaged the Golden West Seed Co. in the small New Mexico town of Texico, located 21 miles northwest of Muleshoe. The fire, which is believed to have started from a hot bearing in some machinery, was discovered at 10:15 a.m.

The actual blaze was brought under control by 1 p.m., however firemen remained on duty long hours afterward as the contents of the seed cleaning plant and two warehouses continued to smolder. Smoke from the rubble still filled the air over the city Friday.

Damage has been estimated at \$250,000.00 to the buildings and contents, which were reduced to rubble.

Fire fighting units from both Texico and Farwell, the Clovis Fire Department and units from Cannon Air Force Base combated the blazing inferno. Ray Pritchett, president of the company, said the loss included a 50,000-bushel elevator and two 40 by 100 foot warehouses and about 2 1/2 million pounds of seed and hybrid sorghum, valued at \$7, per hundred pounds.

Pritchett said the metal seed cleaning plant and seed houses contained about 5 million pounds of field seed when the fire broke out.


homa last week. Kelley also saw his doctor in Ada, Oklahoma.

Vietnam News

As reported by Marine Corps Combat Correspondents and edited by GYSGT. Bob Montgomery.

There have been many reports of late about the failure of our pacification efforts. Contrary to the apparent beliefs of many people, civic action and pacification did not end with the TET offensive. The Marine Corps civic action and pacification efforts were without a doubt affected by the increased hostilities; some areas experienced serious setbacks. But to say that the program has

been terminated is a gross misrepresentation of the facts. The Marine Corps approached the pacification problem in two primary ways - the first was with a vigorous civic action program and the second was with the formation of Combined Action Platoons.

Shortly after their arrival in Vietnam the Marines initiated their civic action program in an effort to earn the support of the local populace. At the end of our first year in Vietnam, the relationship of civic action to pacification was reviewed. It was found that civic action was a prerequisite to general pacification.

The considerable exposure of the Vietnamese people to Marine Corps projects, distribution of commodities, and social contacts made the people more susceptible to general pacification efforts.

Thus, the objective of civic action - instilling confidence into the people for their duty constituted government while strengthening the confidence of the people in Marines - were achieved.

Civic action is in full swing. In fact, an increased demand has been levied on the program due to the increased number of refugees in both I Corps and the whole of the country.

There have been many distorted reports of numbers of refugees created by the offensive. Before the offensive there were 329,000 in I Corps; as of March 15, 1968, there were 619,000. While the number of these displaced persons is large, it by no means represents an unsolvable problem. Many of these people are returning to their homes daily.

A joint South Vietnamese-American undertaking named Operation Recovery has been launched to help meet the immediate needs of the people.

It is country - wide and funded by the South Vietnamese Treasury; it is reported that the civilians are responding well and working to their common betterment.

The second important step taken by the Marines after being in Vietnam for a year was the creation of Combined Action Platoons.

By mutual agreement be-

tween the Marine Corps command and the Vietnamese Military command in I Corps, combined action platoons were formed composed of 14 Marines and a Navy corpsman integrated with a popular force platoon of 35 men.

These units were organized to provide military security to selected villages and hamlets in the I Corps Tactical Zone in the north.

By virtue of living in the immediate area of operation, Popular Forces are inherently familiar with the terrain, governments, indigenous personnel and VC activities in their area.

Combining PF and USMC forces into units with the mission of village security, releases Marine combat units for offensive operations with reasonable assurance that rear areas are under control. Additionally, the CAP provides a credible security for the local populace and permits local government to function.

The combined action platoons in I Corps are all in operation today; none were "wiped off the map" by the NVA. Many were hit hard, but all were defended.

The attacks proved to many of the hamlets that the CAPs were not just "fair weather friends" - they are there to stay. The Revolutionary Development Teams and other Vietnamese constituted civil affairs units are at about 60 per cent of their pre - TET number and that percentage is increasing daily.

While the program did suffer, the structure and organization has been established and functional, thereby eliminating the necessity of "starting over from scratch" even in hard-hit areas.

Now, after more than two and a half years in Vietnam and the TET offensive, another review has revealed that no major change has taken place in the relationship between civic action and pacification.

It is in the rural areas, where government is often weak, that assistance is most needed. It is in the rural areas where the loyalty of the people is not needed by both the Marines and the enemy. It is in these same areas that

the VC seeks his recruits, his food, and information. It is in these areas that civic action can still be one of the most effective rounds fired in the fight to pacify the countryside.

Contrary to the apparent beliefs of many people, civic action is very much alive in Vietnam today.
