

LIVESTOCK MANAGEMENT

Wet Winter Conditions - Many producers are concerned that their cattle look bad even though we have had a relatively mild winter up to this point. Research work on cold stress and its effect on cattle indicates that when considering cattle comfort and nutrient needs for maintenance, a wet hair coat on a 60 degree day is equivalent to a dry hair coat on a 32 degree day. If you cinsider this relationship, it becomes apparent that the wet weather is "taking its toll" on cattle this winter.

The wet conditions have also hurt the quality of dormant grass (standing dry forage) that many operations depend o to winter their cattle. Grass quality has been hurt in two ways: (1) by leaching nutrients and (2) by physical deterioration (rot and decay). As grass quality declines, intake is suppressed and cattle have a more difficult time maintaining

At this point in time it is probably not critical to understand what has happened, but how to best finish the winter. Additional (extra) supplemental feed may or may not help. If you are already feeding an adequate to slight surplus amount of protein, additional feed will probably not help. This is because when protein needs are satisfied, energy is probably the limiting factor if weight loss is a problem. We cannot increase energy intake by feeding supplemental energy when cattle are on forage based diets.

Energy intake is regulated by quality of the forage; therefore, we must increase forage quality to increase energy intake. This can be accomplished by either moving cattle to better grass or changing to hay or other harvested forage that is better in quality. We can also change the cattle to a concentrate based diet (majority of ration supplied from grain, protein sources, etc.); however, this is not an economically feasible alternative in most cases.

Remember that cow condition is important if you want a high breeding percentage. Study your situation and make adjustments that are dictated by your conditions.







REFERENDUM AND ELECTION OF T.P.P.B. APPROACHING

Mary Webb **Executive Director Texas Peanut Producers Board**

The Texas Peanut Producers Board will hold its biennial election on April 30, 1992. The current

terms of three board members will expire at that time. Any person living within the following counties who is engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, peanuts for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote in his district, including owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers, if such person is subject to paying the assessment that is collected on peanuts within the following counties:

DISTRICT II: Includes the northwestern counties of the State. The southernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Loving, Wheeler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wise, Denton, Grayson, Fanin and Lamar. Peanut producers north of this line are in District 2.

DISTRICT III: The westernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Red River, Delta, Hunt, Collin, Dallas, Tarrant, Hood, Erath, Bosque, McLennan, Bell, Milam, Lee, Bastrop, Fayette, Colorado, Wharton and Matagorda. Producers east of this line are in District No.

DISTRICT IV: The northernmost counties of this district include the following counties: Maverick, Zavala, Medina, Bexar, Guadalupe, Gonzales, Lavaca and Jackson. Producers south of this line are in District No. 4.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board for a six year term from that district by application to the above organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. Such application must be received by the Texas Peanut Producers Board at least 30 days prior to the election date, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P. O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454 by or before midnight on date of the election. (April 30, 1992)

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days prior to the election, may obtain one at County Agent offices in peanut producing counties within the State.

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


