

Then Gorman cam right back on their next possession, talking the ball on their own 42 and scoring in 13 plays with Dathna Wright passing to Bubba Hagood for the final 18 with 1:27 left in the second. Wright booted the point after and

Gorman led 13-7.

Gorman scored again with 47 seconds left in the first half when they intercepted an Elk pass by David Seaton and set upon the Elk 12 yard line. In one big play the Panthers scored on a 12 yard pass to A. J. Torres. Seaton hit Torrez on a pass for the 2 extra points for a 21-7 lead at halftime.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band showed off their brand new uniforms in their outstanding routine that they were to perform in the Band Contest on Saturday. Also the Elketts performed a routine.

The Elks hit the scoreboard with 3:51 left in the third when Michael Orlando intercepted a Panther pass on the Elk 45 and raced in for the score. Orlando added the 2 pointer on a run to make the score. 21-15.

The Panthers got the ball on the Elk 30 with 11:22 left in the last quarter and scored in one big shot as Torres caught a 30 yard pass for the score with 11:31 left. Wright kicked the PAT and Gorman led 28-15.

The Elks came back with 4:52 left in the game when Matthew Clark caught a 27 yard pass for the score. Caldwell kicked the point after and the score was 28-

Then on the next Gorman possession the Elks recovered a Panther bobble on the Gorman 44 and scored in 10 plays with Caldwell getting the score from 1 yard out with 1 minute left. The kick try sailed left and the score was knotted at 28. The Elks moved to Gorman 14 after another bad snap to the punter. The Big Red Defense held the Elks on three pass tries and the Elks tried a field goal which failed and the game went into overtime.

Gorman got the ball first in overtime at the 25 yard line and Wright hit Bubba Hagood for 25 and the score. Wright added the point after and Gorman led 35-28

Then on the Elk try from the 25, the quarterback faded back for a pass which was intercepted by Josh Longoria to preserve the OT win.

The Big Red Defense did a good job, especially after the offense turned the ball over 3 times on an interception and 2 times on bad punt snaps.

Torres led the Panthers with 80 yards on 12 carries and also caught three passes for 64 yards. Wright got 31 yards on 13 tries. Longoria had 27 on 5

If you live within the following school districts you are in the East End Sp. Ed. Coop: Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Moran, Ranger. It is a shared services arrangement funded by all 6 districts. It has large budget. It is totally funded by tax money. It is run by a management board which consists of the superintendents of the districts mentioned. It also has a head administrator, Director of Special Education, who is hired by the management board. The Director, in turn, hires the rest of the central staff which consists of about 15 persons. Some positions require college degrees; some do not. I have been employed at East End Coop for over 15 years as an educational diagnostician. I have a master's degree.

Open Letter to the Residents and Taxpayers of the East End Special Education Coop

I have recently filed some complaints against the Director and his assistant with the Texas Education Agency. The complaints all center on ethics. I intend to ask area news medial to publish the complaints and related documents in order that you may be adequately informed. My goal is that these complaints be fairly investigated and that corrective action be taken as needed. My understanding is that a new Director will be chosen in February, and I am hoping that a State-wide search will be conducted to find the best available person for the post. I hope an experienced educator who has actually taught school will be selected. The Coop is responsible to support and facilitate the education of students with disabilities in all 6 districts. Many of these students have severe learning problems and it does not make sense to select a Director who has no teaching credentials or experience. It seems almost certain that that is what is in the works.

Please let your superintendent know by mail, phone or fax your opinion in this matter. The management board of superintendents normally meet in regular session on the second Wed. of each month at 10 AM in the Eastland School District Board Room.

EASTLAND - A state inspection Monday uncovered no deficiencies at the recently expanded Eastland County Jail.

The Texas Commission on Jail Standard's approval will allow the county to begin housing inmates in the 72-bed expansion immediately, Sheriff Wayne Bradford said Tuesday. The addition will supplement the original 24-bed facility, which was built in 1980 after an inmate sued the county over jail conditions.

In recent years, the jail has been overcrowded at times, drawing the concern of the jail standard commission. However, the 72-bed expansion should provide ample space to house inmates from Eastland and other counties. The construction was funded with certificates of obligation.

Bradford said 26 inmates were incarcerated in the jail Tuesday. At least two of the prisoners will be transferred to the expansion.



CAPITOL COMMENT U.S. SENATOR KAY BAILEY HUTCHISON

BORDER HEALTH PROBLEMS RESPECT NO BOUNDARIES

ne of the first bills I co-sponsored after being elected to the Senate in 1993 authorized the creation of a U.S.-Mexico Border Health Commission. That bill became law in 1994. But to date, the commission remains a plan on paper, the victim of benign neglect and a severe case of bureaucratic inertia.

The border region suffers from Third World health problems, and its residents suffer from a higher rate of deadly, infectious diseases than anywhere else in the country. Disease knows no boundaries.

A binational effort to address this public health situation is long overdue.

To end the foot dragging, I, along with Senator Jeff Bingaman of New Mexico, have introduced an amendment directing the President to appoint the U.S. commission members within 30 days of its passage.

Public health officials have long been telling us that the diseases that prevail along the border - in a setting that straddles two sovereign nations - must be addressed through a binational effort. Establishing the commission will allow health officials of both countries to cooperate in tracking, preventing and working to cure numerous communicable diseases, as well as to cope with a number of other health issues unique to the border setting.

Tuberculosis is endemic on both sides. The average number of TB cases in the United States is 8 per 100,000 population. In Texas, the average is 10.3 cases per 100,000 people. In Laredo and Webb County, and A.V. Seay were Stephen Joiner of the rate is 18.8 cases per 100,000. Last year Reynosa, Mexico reported 400 cases of multiple drug-resistant tuberculosis.

Lack of access to medical care and preventive health services has meant the border region is subject to numerous other diseases as well. The incidence of Hepatitis A and various forms of dysentery and intestinal parasites linked to poor sanitation along the border is two to three times the national average. Upper respiratory infections and preventable diseases such as measles flourish. There is a higher-thanaverage incidence of cervical cancer among Hispanic women living along the border. Diabetes, anemia and high blood pressure are much more common than in other areas. The U.S.-Mexico Border Health Commission would serve as an

early warning system for the rest of the country, detecting and perhaps averting major outbreaks of infectious disease, such as cholera and salmonella, which already have shown signs of spreading beyond the border region.

There is a familiar saying in Spanish (and English as well) that sums up what's happening with the U.S. Mexico Border Health Commission: Mas vale tarde que nunca - better late than never.



Child Safety Choosing The Right Child-Safety Seat

According to the National Safe Kids Campaign, child safety seats are

extremely effective when correctly cars, reducing the need for hospitalization by 69 percent for children ages 4 and under.

Cars.com, an automotive Web site, is providing answers to parents' questions such as what type of car seat they should use to secure their child, where to find out information on recalled safety seats, and how to properly secure a child into the seat.

Always refer to the instructions that accompany a child seat. But here are a few suggestions from cars.com to assist parents who are shopping for and installing a car seat:

Check guidelines before purchasing: Does your child meet the appropriate manufacturer's guidelines for age, weight and height? There are car seats that accommodate children of all sizes including rear-facing infant seats, convertible seats, and toddler/booster seats. And many retailers have a policy that allows you to test the seat to ensure com-

pliance with your vehicle. Be cautious when re-using a safety seat: It's best to avoid relving on a used safety seat. Strict federal standards went into effect after January 1, 1981 so older seats must use one, be sure that the seat was never involved in a crash—as child safety seats are built to withstand only one crash. Also know the make, model number and manufacturing date of the used seat. The information is needed for parents to be aware of any future recalls. Finally, make sure that the seat shows no signs of wear and tear. Some manufacturers offer replacement parts for particular models.



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Be aware of recalls: Has a installed and used in passenger manufacturer recently recalled the safety seat you purchased? In some cases the manufacturer can correct the problem, other times the seats should be returned to the manufacturer and destroyed. For information on recalls, you can contact the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Auto Safety Hotline, at 800/424-9393 or visit NHTSA's Web site www.NHSTA.dot.gov.

Follow proper installation procedures: Be sure to follow the basic guidelines for installing your child safety seat as outlined in the instruction manual. To ensure the tightest possible fit, experts suggest that two individuals install the seat with one person sitting or kneeling in it while the other person secures the seat tightly in the car.

Carefully secure your child in the seat: There are a few important steps you should follow to ensure that your child is properly fastened in a safety seat. First, make sure that the harness retainer clip is present to ensure a tight fit and to prevent the straps from twisting. Next, place your child in the safety seat and fasten the harness. You should be able to fit just one finger between the harness and your child's collarbone. might not be as reliable. If you The retainer clip that keeps the harness over the child's shoulders should be at armpit level. Wrapping your child in a blanket or quilt before fastening the safety harness can hinder the straps from properly securing. Instead, place blankets on top of the child after he/she is properly fastened in the safety seat.


