Ross Wilson, guest speaker, who is so knowledgeable on peanut programs and the peanut industry, did an excellent job in his address. Those who missed the banquet missed a very special event.

Ross spoke on the importance of community involvement in the peanut program and he is quite concerned about the future of the program. He said "The peanut program and the peanut community face their biggest challenge in the next four months with the North American Free Trade Agreement and GATT that seriously adversely impact peanut communities if agreements are not properly drawn."

Ross emphasized the advantages of living in a small community and that Gorman is more economically fortunate than some declining small communities due to the many peanut facilities located here. He said "Gorman is a good place to live with an excellent school system, good churches and good city government."

He has served as superintendent in Gorman schools since 1972 and one year at Ponder. He coached football, basketball and track at Paunee, Paducah and Ropesville and also served as principal and superintendent. Gene Snider was recognized for his many years of successful farming in the Gorman area. In 1992 he farmed 300 acres of peanuts, 175 in irrigation, 125 in dryland, 45 acres of watermelons, 10 acres of corn, and 15 acres of wheat. He also has nursery stock of pecans, walnuts, pears and persimmons. He has a cow and calf operation and farms coastal bermuda for hay and grazing. During the winter months he is employed by Womack's Nursery. He graduated from Gorman High in 1962 and attended Tarleton State University one year.

His wife, Kay, daughter, Kathy and Dale Collum, son, Mike and his wife, Crystal, help with the farming enterprise. He is a member of the Kokomo Baptist Church where he is serving as church school superintendent. At the conclusion of his address, Ross was presented the Chamber of Commerce Award for his more than 30 years of diligent work and leadership for agriculture and peanut producers at both the national and local levels.

Ross was born and reared in Brownwood. He holds a BA degree from Daniel Baker College and a Masters degree from Southwest Texas State University. He served in Gorman schools as coach, principal and superintendent from 1949 to 1956. He has been manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association from 1956 to the present.

He served as mayor of Gorman from 1964-66. He has chaired the National Peanut Council Board of Directors, chairman of the Peanut Administrative Committee, is the secretary of the National Peanut Growers Group, and other positions too numerous to mention. Daryl Hirst, Chamber of Commerce President, served as master of ceremonies and presented the awards.
