Panthers Run By Wildcats; To Host Cross Plains Friday

The Gorman Panthers upped their District 15A record to 2 and 0 and their season record to 2-5 on Friday night when they traveled to Rising Star to take on the Wildcats, and came away with a 46-21 victory.

The Panthers surely must be a wet weather team as they have played in driving rainstorms the past two weeks and came away with two victories.

Gorman got off to a good start on their first possession as they took the ball on their own 38 and scored in just 5 plays with Don Mauney breaking free and racing for 46 yards for the score with 10:21 left in the period. Mauney booted the point after and the Panthers were on their way.

But on the next possession by the Wildcats, Michael Perales returned the favor for the Wildcats as he raced 41 yards for the TD with 10:07 left. Gudmundur Bjornisson kicked the point after and the score was tied 7-7.

The Panthers came back with 3:05 left in the period with a touchdown after the Wildcat kicker was caught on the Rising Star 3. Marco Herrera got the honors on one play. The kick for point failed and Gorman was up 13-7.

The Big Red defense held the Wildcats on their next possession and took the punt on their own 21. From there the Panthers score in 8 plays with Don Mauney getting the honors on a 7 yard run with 7:13 left in the second. The drive featured a 10 yard run by Nick Guthery; a 36 yard scamper by Herrera; and a 19 yard run by Paul Petree. The run for two points failed and the score was 19-7.

Gorman added another score with just 13 seconds left in the half. The Panthers got the ball on their own 10 yard line. Then after a no gain running play and an incomplete pass, Mauney broke free, hit the seam and raced for 90 yards for the score. Mauney added the point after and Gorman led 26-7 at the halftime intermission.

The Panther Marching Band performed on Friday night despite the bad weather and did an outstanding job. They performed in their casual clothes so they wouldn't get their uniforms flooded. Great job ya'll!

Following the halftime intermission the Wildcats took the kickoff on their own 35 and went the distance in 5 plays with Perales racing for the final 43 yards up the middle with 9:25 left in the third. The run for two points failed and the score was 26-13.

However, Gorman was not to be denied as they got the ball on their own 24 and scored on a long drive that consumed almost 5 minutes. Mauney again got the honors from 10 yards out with 4:34 left. The drive featured a 6 yard run by Mauney; a 21 yard scamper by Marco Herrera; a 17 yard run by Mauney and another 3 yarder before the scoring play. Mauney booted the point after left. Mauney then ran for the two pointer, making the score 34-13.

But again the Wildcats fought back with another score as they got the ball on their own 46 and went the distance in just 4 plays with Mackey Doug Elliott getting the final yard with 2:54 left in the third. The drive featured a 26 yard pass and a 26 yard run.

Then with 4:43 left in the game Gorman added another score when Herrera ran in from 2 yards out for the TD. The run for two points failed

For his outstanding effort Don Mauney was named as the Offensive Player of the Week by the Abilene Reporter News. Great performance, Don!

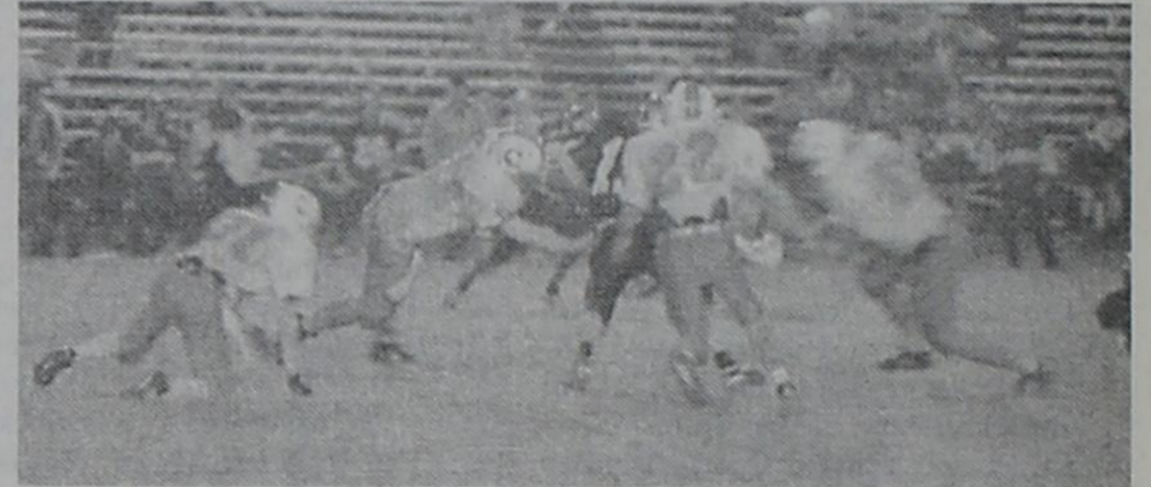
Mauney led the Panthers with 242

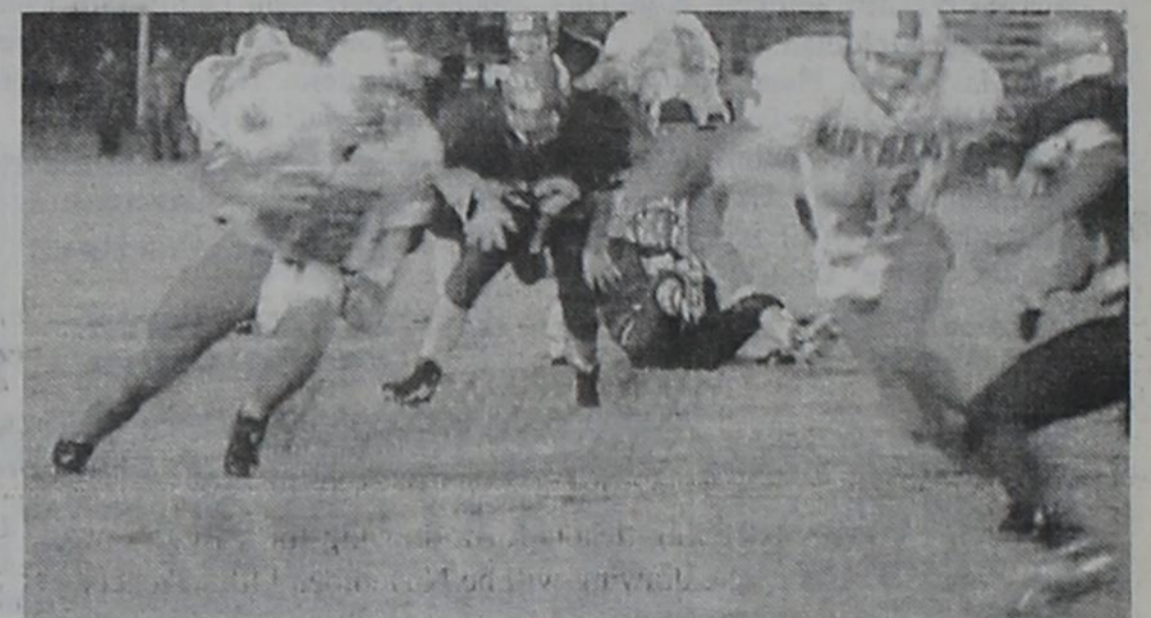
The Big Red defense allowed 239 yards on the ground, but stopped the Wildcats when it counted to win the District 15A contest.

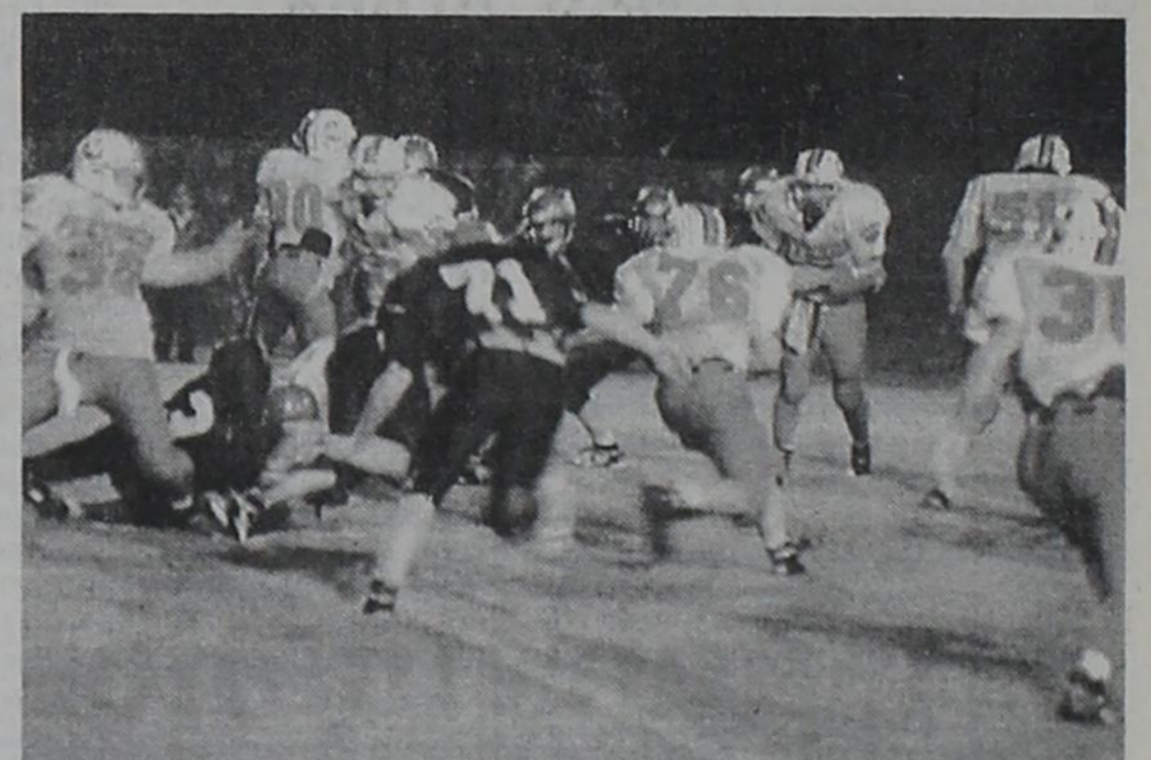
