Joe Wortham, began the historical marker dedication service, and the Historical Committee of Vonnie Guthery, Evah Sparkman, Bernard Keith, and Dorothy Roberts unveiled the marker. Receiving the marker were deacons of the church, Moody Koonce - chairman, Pug Guthery, Bobby Baker, Glyn Thiebaud, Elwood Ragland, James Riggs, Jim Grimshaw, Bill Collum, and L. P. Hammond. The prayer of dedication was by Bro. L. C. Landers, a former pastor. A reception followed in the church annex.

A history of the church, submitted for the historical marker, is as follows:

The Desdemona First Baptist Church, organized in 1872, is a small rural church with a membership of 150 in the year of 1993, ministering to the needs of the Desdemona Community. The church is located in the southeastern corner of Eastland County, Texas, one block east of the intersection of State Highway 16 and one block north of Farm-to-Market Road 8.

Settlers came to this community in 1857. It was at this time Charles Culpepper Blair and wife, Meekie Reeves Blair, opened their home for the early pioneer settlers to come together for mutual protection from the Comanche Indians who were still on the warpath. Fort Blair was established for the protection of these eight families. The fortalso was a frequent stopping place for the Texas Rangers to gather more supplies of ammunition, bread and food. This road through Fort Blair was later opened to travel between Stephenville and Fort Griffin. The women would guard the fort while the men fought in Indian raids. Fort Blair was located at the now present townsite of Desdemona.

On the second Sunday in June 1872, the Rockdale Baptist Church was organized near the present townsite of Desdemona. The church's name was later changed to Desdemona Baptist Church and moved its place of worship about one mile. The church in later years has become known as the First Baptist Church of Desdemona. It is the oldest church organization in Eastland County, and it is still a very active

The shade of the oak trees was the sanctuary from June 1872 until September 1872. During those summer months, Johnny Carruth and Charlie Mitchell split logs and built a school house, and the school was used for the church to meet in at that time. The school was a one-room log structure, located about one mile south of the present site of Desdemona, near Hog Creek. One log was cut partly out of the west side of the building for a window, the only window in the building. The benches were hewn logs, and the heat for the building in winter was from a large fireplace. A hand-made table was in the front part of the building for the minister or teacher's use.

Services were held monthly, beginning Saturday evening and continuing through Sunday night. Folks came from miles around on horseback, in wagons, buggies or by foot. Guns worn or carried were placed on the table beside the Bible to have available for use because of the dangers of Indians. Only the minister had a songbook. He would read a verse of the hymn, and then the congregation would sing it in unison. The preacher would use a tuning fork to get the proper pitch for the tune of the songs. After the singing and the praying ended, he would begin his sermon.

Of course, there were some who only passed by the house of worship. It was one of those passers-by who one night unhitched a horse and rode away. With a two-hour sermon for a head start, a horse thief could make himself hard to catch--and he did. It was more than a week later, when in custody, that he was reminded of the scripture, "Be sure your sins will find

There was a need for a meeting house. The time had come, so a small frame building was built up-stream and in the village.

What could be more fun than a Box Supper? Proceeds amounted to \$54.15; it was clear profit, and that was a lot of money back then. It was a huge success!

> The church held their baptisms at Eppler Lake or Lewis Ellison's tank. The women would always have trouble keeping the small children out of the water. The church would have picnics at Round Hole and Bass Lake where they would have services with "dinner on the ground." But the best time of all was the big revival time with babies in arms, children on pallets on the floor, and young ladies with their beaus. "Sinners" would hang back in the darkness where the

light rays of the lamps or lanterns could scarcely reach, so afraid were they lest conviction come over them, and they should find themselves drawn down the saw-dust trail to the altar. "Shouting" and "Amen" were often heard as The Holy Spirit moved the people.

In 1917, Bro. J.D. Kennedy was called as pastor. This year brought with it World War I with its tragedies, but it also brought prosperity. The church grew, as a church always does when the people feel the need for the Lord. Scarcely had the war ended when "black gold" begin to flow. Rigs shot up all around the small church building. The town boomed with more than oil--gambling and drinking, mud and slush from wells.

There was a need to move out of the crowded area. As it was considered where to move, the Church of Christ offered to buy the building and move it to a new location. At this time, the Genoway family gave land for a new church site. First built was a tabernacle, then work began toward the goal of a new building, which was built by Tip Ross in the years 1921-1922 for \$2,500.00,

As "The Boom" faded away, some of the members moved away, but a growth in membership was renewed when Bro. R.C. Tennison came as pastor. He and Bro.H.T. Matthews of Mineral Wells held a two and one-

Baird hit the scoreboard first with 4:54 left in the first quarter when Brad Johnson raced for 94 yards for the score. The PAT was missed.

Then in the second period with 8:59 left Tye Barton ran for 22 yards for the TD to cap a 42 yard drive. Joy ran for the two pointer and the score was 14-0.

With 4:24 left in the second Odom Scott hit the scoring column with an 18 yard scamper following the recovery of a Panther fumble at the Gorman 18. Joy kicked the PAT and the score was 21-0.

The Bears ended the scoring in the second period with a 5 yard run by Rusty Crane with 35 second left to cap a 58 yard drive in just 3 plays. Joy kicked the PAT and the score

During the halftime activities the Gorman Panther Marching Band performed their routine and received a very large ovation from the fans.

The final Baird score came with just 1:52 left in the third period when Rusty Crane ran 20 yards for the score to cap a 49 yard drive. Joy kicked the PAT and the final score was 42-0.

Don Mauney led the Panthers with 43 yards on 13 carries. Marco Herrera had 25 yards on 4 tries. Jasin Monk got 21 on 8 trips. Scotty Walton was 5 for 10. Jeremy Sanders ran for 8 yards on three carries before being knocked out of the game with an injury. Eric Monk got 6 yards on 2 carries.

The Panthers were led defensively by Noah Landa, who was named Panther of The Week with his outstanding play. He had 17 tackles, caused a fumble and recovered one

The Panthers will host the Cross Plains Buffaloes on Friday night at 7:30 in another District 13A game. The Buffaloes are 1-1 in district play and the Panthers will really have to play hard again to have a victory over the Buffaloes.

The forty-fourth annual Lasater Beefmaster Plan contract deliveries took place Sept. 14, 15 and 16 at Matheson, Colorado.

Fortypeight buyers from 12 states purchased 70 bulls and 60 cows from the foundation herd of the Beefmaster breed.

The bulls averaged about twelve months of age, weighing between 800 and 900 pounds. Prices of the bulls started at \$3,600 and dropped \$30 after each selection.
