GHS Twirlers Attend Camp At Midwestern State




The 1993-94 Gorman High School twirlers attended camp July 5-7 at Midwestern State University.

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Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a chance to become homeowners under a plan being adopted by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Sidney Woods, FmHA County Supervisor of Comancge County, said today.

Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to homes that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 18 months. Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including housing authorities and nonprofit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, or in some cases. FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Woods said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

THE GORMAN PROGRESS

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or nonprofit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the

lease. Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Woods said that many homeless people work and have income, and have the potential to become homeowners.

"By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Woods said. FmHA officials in Texas are seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to inadequately-housed families.

Information concerning housing for the homeless may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at Hwy. 3381, Comanhe, Texas," FmHA County Supervisor said. The FmHA office in Comanche is open from 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday.



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



Nicholas L. SOLVE SUMMER BOREDOM WITH READING

During summer, parents are faced with the age old I'm bored!" statement from their children.

One suggestion is Why don't you read something?" Although this is a good idea, it is usually not enough to produce results. Parents may ahve to da a little work to get children to read. The reward for the effort is more than just filling a few empty hours. Summer reading may introduce children to a new way of enjoying life and give a boost to their education. What are some ways parents can encourage their child to

Practice what you preach. Let your child see you reading. Children will see by your actions that reading is important. Remember that action speaks louder than words.

An enjoyable introduction to reading is rading aloud. Choose a "good time" to share a book. Extend the text by asking questions about how the story or characters make the child feel.

Establish a family custom of storytelling. Stories may be borrowed from an y book the child has read. Storytelling allows the use of language and imagination.

Take a family trip to the supermarket for purchasing magazines of their choice. These could be used as rewards for some house or yard work. By making the trip a family outing, children are encouraged to browse the variety of magazines and may become interested in new and different topics.

Another family trip could be to the local library. Going tohether to get library cards and becoming familiar with the library encourages children

to model their parent's behavior. Make sure children have a special place in their bedroom for library and personal books. This gives added value to those "special books". It also helps keep track of

those library books. If the child is asking to stay up later at bedtime, be positive and say "Sure, you can stay up for awhile...if you read".

It is important that the bedroom or reading area has adequate lighting for reading. A 100 watt bulb is the most common recommendation.

Use children's questions and natural curiosity to encourage reading. Rather than answering questions like "what is a turbo charger," try to find the answer in print and let the child read the description.

Use television series or mini-series based on books as a springboard for reading. If the child enjoyed the show, suggest getting the book or one on the same subject.

If the family is planning a vacation get pamphlets and tourist information about the location. Put the child in charge of being the tour guide. From reading the borchures, the child can tell the family about the vacation interest points.

Most of all, remember, summer reading is an adventure and escape from boredom. Share that adventure with your children.




