



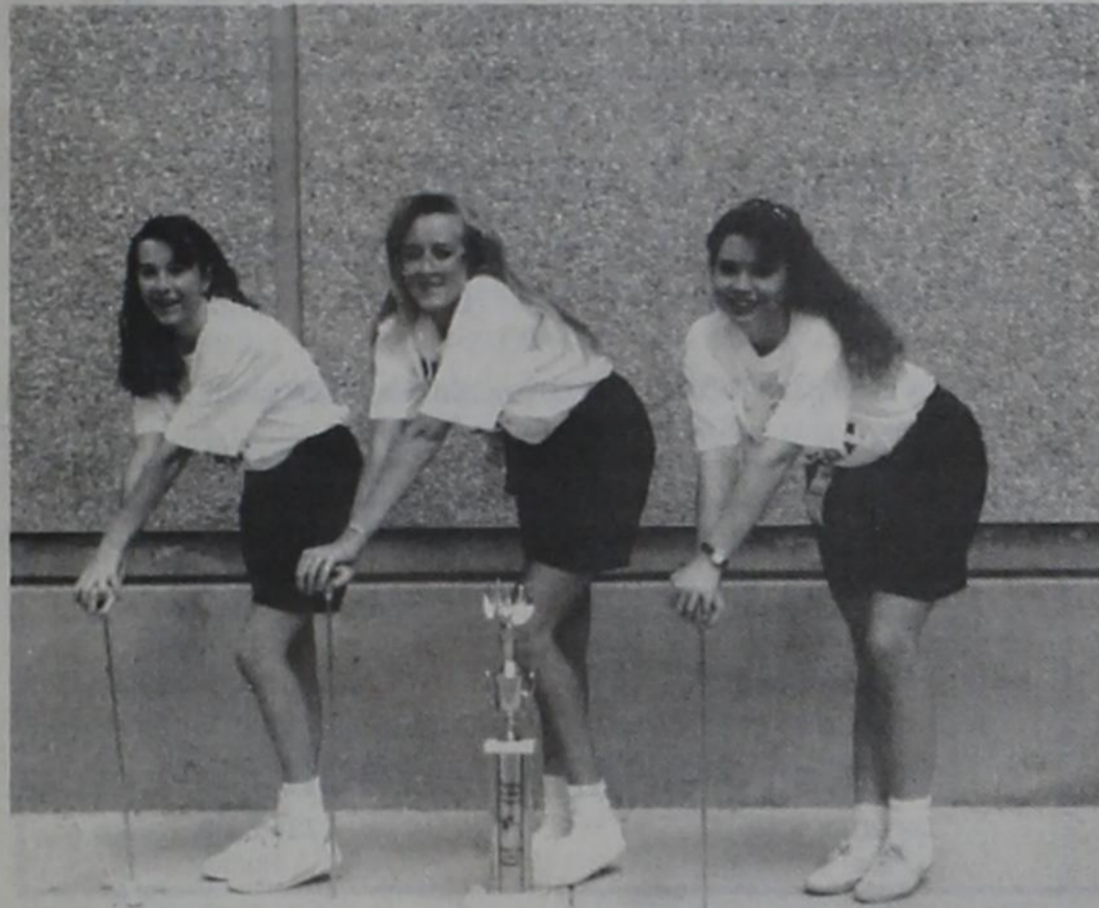
Lion's Club Blood Drive Set July 26th

GHS Twirlers Attend Camp At Midwestern State

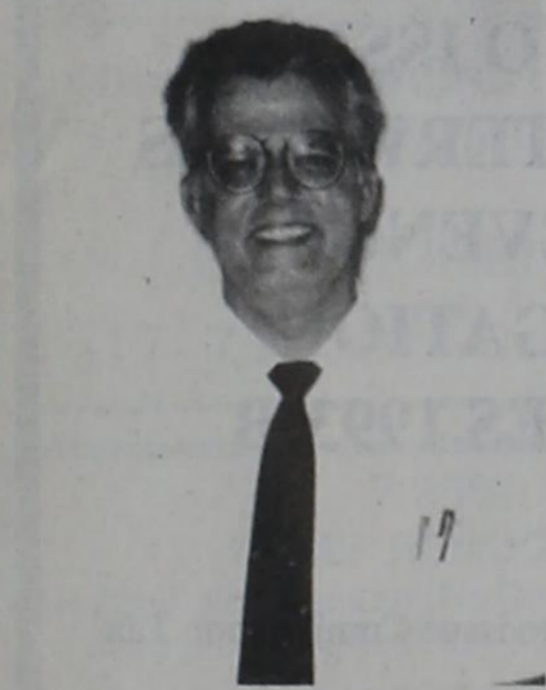


The 1993-94 Gorman High School twirlers attended camp July 5-7 at Midwestern State University.

USDA To Help In Providing Housing For The Homeless

Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a chance to become homeowners under a plan being adopted by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Sidney Woods, FmHA County Supervisor of Comanche County, said today.

Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to homes that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 18 months. Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including

housing authorities and nonprofit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, or in some cases, FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Woods said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or nonprofit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the

lease. Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Woods said that many homeless people work and have income, and have the potential to become homeowners.

"By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Woods said. FmHA officials in Texas are seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to inadequately-housed families.

Information concerning housing for the homeless may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at Hwy. 3381, Comanche, Texas," FmHA County Supervisor said. The FmHA office in Comanche is open from 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday.

Social Security Reporting Requirements

"As a Social Security beneficiary, you have certain responsibilities for ensuring that you continue to receive your benefits in the right amount, delivered to the right place, and on time," said Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. "You probably know that you need to tell Social Security any time you change addresses or if you change direct deposit bank accounts," Hammons continued, "but do you know that there may be other events that affect your Social Security checks?"

You must also report the following:

- * Any change in your estimated earnings
- * changes in marital status
- * name changes
- * births, adoptions, or deaths in the family
- * changes in the circumstances of any child who is receiving benefits, under your care, under 16 or has a disability
- * imprisonment
- * trips of 30 days or more outside of the United States
- * pensions from work not covered
