Tips for Protecting Your Eyes

(NU) - Here are some eye-protection tips for VDT users:

1. Install a high-quality glass antiglare filter.

Position your monitor 16 to 24 inches away from your eyes. 3. Position your monitor so that your head tilts slightly down (10 to 15 degrees) when looking at the monitor.

4. Use a high-resolution monitor if possible. Dark characters on a light background are best.

5. Keep the room's light source behind the monitor, not behind you, to reduce screen glare.

6. Screen brightness should match the overall room brightness. If you experience flicker, turn the brightness down.

Groups Move to Protect Relocation Tax Deductions

(NU) - Restrictions on individual

income tax deductions for moving expenses would limit the mobility of American workers, according to a study conducted by two former government officials. Eugene Steuerle, a former deputy

assistant Treasury secretary, and Joe Cordes, former deputy director of the Congressional Budget Office's Tax Division, also warn that limiting the moving expense deduction would lower productivity by discouraging workers from moving when they could be more productive in another job.

Currently, people who relocate because of a job are allowed deductions for moving their belongings from one home to another and for lodging while house hunting in their

new town. Companies are allowed a deduction too, for buying an employee's old home. President Clinton has indicated

he would retain the deduction for moving belongings, but would eliminate the others. Cordes, who is now chairman of

the economics department at George Washington University, and Steurle say eliminating the deductions will affect businesses as well as workers. "It will make it harder for employers to hire the best worker, who may be unable to afford to move to a new job," they warn.

Their study was cosponsored by the American Movers Conference and the Employee Relocation Council. The groups oppose limitations on the tax deductions.

In the study, Steuerle and Cordes observe that the international weekly, The Economist, has suggested that England adopt policies to facilitate labor mobility, including a tax deduction for moving expenses.

AN OPEN LETTER Victory For Dairy Industry In Calf Feeding Decision

Waco - In response th a recent Texas Supreme Court decision in favor of a Central Texas calf feeding facility, Texas Farm Bureau President S. M. True, said the court's decision is "a victory for the dairy industry and the rights of dairy producers."

The Texas high court's 7-to-2 decision overturned an appellate court's ruling in a case involving the F/R Cattle Company located in Erath County near Lingleville. The state Supreme Court's judgement forced the lower court to reexamine the facts in the case.

"We feel that we've been vindicated," said F/R Cattle Company co-owner Rick Robey. "We feel that we were right. We run a clean, good operation and my plans are to stay and raise calves in Texas," Robey said.

The F/R operation consists of buying day-old calves from local dairies and raising them until they reach 250-300 pounds. When the calves attain their desired weight the cattle company sells the animals to fedlots or back to dairies as replace-

ment heifers.

The Texas Air Control Board received numerous complaints regarding the odor associated with F/R's facility. As a result of these complaints, the State Attorney General's Office brought a suit on behalf of the TACB against F/R. The lawsuit sought an injunction and civil penalties on the grounds that odors from the calf-raising facility violated the Texas Clean Air Act by releasing air contaminants without a permit.

"We had approximately 6,000 calves on our facility and they (TACB) wanted it below 1,000 head where we wouldn't need a permit. In doing so it required us to do a number of things that we couldn't do in order to obtain a permit," Robey

The Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Association of Dairymen, Associated Milk Producers Incorporated, Texas Pork Producers Association and Texas Polutry Federation filed a "friend of the court" brief with the state Supreme Court on behalf of F/R Cattle Company.

"The state Supreme Court's ruling says to all animal agriculture producers in Texas that if they are in compliance with state environmental air and water regulations," True said, "then they are free to conduct their operation without interference from regulatory agencies."

FmHA Reviews Portfolio For Graduation of Borrowers

The U. S. Department of Agricul- Associations, and Federal Land ture (USDA), Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) continues to review its portfolio for possible graduation of borrowers to private credit as mandated by Congress, Robert Hopper, acting, FmHA State Director in Temple, said recently.

The FmHA credit programs are administered in a manner that will assure that they do not supplant or compete with credit available to farmers, rural families and groups from other reliable credit sources. The law requires that FmHA borrowers should graduate to other credit on reasonable rates and terms when they are able to do so, Hopper said.

FmHA, as the lending arm of the U. S. Government, has long been a source of credit for farmers, ranchers and rural home owners that were unable to obtain credit through commercial lenders such as banks, savings and loans, Production Credit

Banks. We have attempted to aid those borrowers as a "Lender of Last Resort", Hopper said. Nationwide, and on an annual basis, FmHA reviews its loan portfolio to determine those borrowers

conducted by the local Farmers Home Administration office, Hopper said. FmHA borrowers in your area may be contacted to furnish information and contact area lenders to ascertain their ability to move their loan to those private lenders.

The mission of the FmHA lending program is that of "Temporary source of supervised credit in modest amounts" to those who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere.

Many years ago there was a superstition in Jerusalem that the waters in the pool of Bethesda had healing power. We all must answer the same question today when confronted with the person of Jesus Christ. This simple question has some profound implications.

First, it requires that we determine if we are sick or not. The word of God declares that "we all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Furthermore, it says that "anyone who sins is a slave to sin." Sin's presence in our lives separates us from the Life of God. Sin is a sickness that manifests itself in many ways. Many are unwilling to face the bondage of sin in their life - this is pride. Secondly, those who are honoest and desperate enough to face the facto of sin in their lives must also be willing to allow Jesus to deal with it. They know their lives are empty, but they honestly don't think Jesus has the answer. So they try other "cures": sports, TV, videos, money, sex, drugs, alcohol, affairs, dead religious, welfare, witchcraft, etc.

Where do you fit in this story? Are you one of the proud "temple worshipppers" whose God has been reduced to a Sunday morning ritual? Are you someone who is unwilling to face the fact that your life is in the shackles of sin and selfishness? Perhaps you recognize your sin, but love it too much to report of it?

However, maybe like the invalid in the story you want to change but try though you may, you have been unable to make lasting progress. Are you at your wit's end? Have you exhausted the world's theories and resources and found that you are still empty? If so, hear the words of Jesus: "Come to me all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Jesus has power to change your life. Jesus Loves You. Will You Trust Him?" Even Christians can reutrn to the joy of their salvaiton if they will face their sin and unbelief with a repentant heart. Jesus Christ offers real life solutions for real life problems.

Energy Taxes Unfair To Farmers, **Rural America**

MAY 27, 1993

Waco - May 6 - According to Joe Rankin, President of Texas Farmers Union, "Texas family farmers are already over-taxed and cannot afford the additional burden of President C□inton's proposed BTU tax".

The Food and Agricultural Policy Research Institute (FAPRI) estimated that in 1998, production costs associated with fuel and lubrication, fertilizer, chemicals and custom harvesting are expected to increase by \$2.34 per acre when the BTU and inland waterway taxes are fully implemented.

"On a typical 600-acre farm, the proposed energy tax is estimated to reduce net farm income by more than \$2,400 per year," Rankin said.

The calculation is from a study by the FAPRI that was released April 1. The study also estimated that by 1998 when the tax is fully phased in, production cotst for corn and cotton would increase by \$2.34 and \$3.37 per acre, respectively.

Rankin continued, "The bottom line is that if farm incomes were up, there would be much less concern about the potential implications of the proposed BTU and inland waterways taxes on agriculture and on rural America."



PECAN NUT CASEBEARER
Preliminary Target Date May 28 - June 2

The pecan nut casebearer is the major pest of Texas pecans. In early spring, larvae of the overwintered generation feed first in buds, then developing shoots, causing them to wilt and die. Larvae of succeeding generations feed on nuts during late spring and summer. Severe infestations may destroy the entire pecan crop.

This insect overwinters as a partially grown larva in a tiny silken cocoon called a hibernaculum that usually is attached to the base of a bud. In spring, as pecan trees start their growth, larvae feed for a short time on buds, but soon begin tunneling in developing shoots and continue until reaching maturity. Pupation may occur in these burrows, or some larvae may crawl down the limb to pupate in the rough bark of larger limbs. In Texas, moths from the overwintering generation emerge in ate April and early May.

Young larvae are white to pink in color, then late become olive gray to green and attain a length of about 1/2 inch. The adult is a light gray moth about 1/3 inch long. Ita wings

are gray and forewings have a ridge of dark scales across them about a third the distance from the base. The moths fly at night and spend the day in concealment.

Two or three days after adult females emerge, they deposit 50 to 150 eggs on tips of nuts. Eggs, just visible to the naked eye, are greenish white when deposited but later become reddish. After hatching, the egg shell is opaque white and remains in place. First-generation larvae hatch from eggs in 4 to 5 days and crawl to buds below the nut cluster to feed for a day or two before crawling back up to the small pecans. They will continue to feed on the pecans until full grown. This migration makes them very vulnerable to insecticides entering their bodies if the nut cluster is covered properly.

A single larva can destroy all nuts in a single cluster. Bits of frass and webbing can be seen projecting from injured nuts. Upon reaching maturity, larvae pupate in nuts and emerge as adults. They require 42 to 45 days to go through a life cycle, so second-generation pecan nut case-bearer will appear in late June or early July.

Count Yourself In The Agriculture Census

A drive to round up report forms that have not been returned by farmers and rancgers in the 1992 Census of Agriculture has been started by the U. S. Bureau of the Census.

According to George Pierce, Assistant Chief of the Census Bureau's Agricukture Division, "...the completeness and accuracy of the census depends on each individual filling out the census report form." Just as important, he says, is the time element; a true picture of the Nation's agricultural industry cannot be presented until the forms are

Agricultural producers received their forms last December. Most have completed and returned them.

The census is the only source of comprehensive, consistent agricultural data for each county in the Nation. It is the basis for major decisions by farmer organizations, marketing associations, cooperatives Congress, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and Federal and State agencies. The data also are used widely by farm publications.

Individual reports are confidential by law and are used only to tabulate totals.

Advance reports for all counties, states, and the Nation will be published starting this fall. Reports will be available through the U. S. Government Printing Office as well as many universities, and depository libraries.

Make it known—America counts on Agriculture!

Adults deposit eggs in grooves on the tip or base of the nut. Second-generation larvae alsi feed inside the pecan nut. A second-generation larva causes less damage because it requires only one or two nuts to complete its growth. Pupation takes place inside hollowed-out nuts and moths emerge from late July to early Septembe.

The third-generation usually follows, but as nut shells harden only a few of the nuts are penetrated by larvae. Instead, larvae feed in the shucks. Many third-generation larvae construct a hibernacula, while the remainder pupate and appear as adults, emerging from late August to October. Adults deposit eggs that hatch into fourth-generation larvae. If nuts are available, their shucks constitute the principle food for this generation. In the absence of nuts. larvae feed on buds and leaf stems. Partially grown larvae construct overwintering hibernacula by mid-November.

Control: Need for casebearer control can be determined by examining trees when shoots start to grow in the spring. If many shoots are wilted, close observation for egg laying is encouraged.

Trees should be sprayed when eggs of the first-generation appear on tips of young nuts in late April or May. Egg deposition commonly follows completion of pollination, when nut tips turn brown. Relatively easy and accurate methods for predicting specific dates for insecticide application are available. (See L-702, Tree Banding...to determine spraying

The discount price for Six Flags tickets are \$20.75. (The price including tax of the regular ticket at the gate is \$26.88.) This is a savings of \$6.13 off the regular gate price.

Also, we have Fiesta Texas discount tickets...they should arrive shortly. The discount price per adult ticket is \$18.70 and \$13.45 for a child/senior ticket. (This is a \$3.80 savings off adult ticket and \$2.50 off child/senior tickets).

Time on Nut Casebearer, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.) Several insecticides will control this pest. For current list, see L-1350 Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Disease on Commercial Pecans, Texas Agricultural Extension Serv-

Recent research shows that one

well-timed insecticide application will control first-generation pecan nut casebearer. A day-degree model has been developed for predicting the best time to spray for pecan nut casebearer each year in Texas. If pecan trees surrounding the treated area are not sprayed, moths can enter the sprayed area and a serious

infestation of second-generation larvae may develop. Under these circumstances, an application may be required in June or early July when second-generation eggs are deposited. Close observation for eggs will help determine this. Preliminary target day is May 28-June


