



Panthers Edge Buffaloes 22-21; Play At Evant Friday

the win column on Friday night when they fell behind the Cross Plains Buffaloes 21 to 7 at halftime, then came back to score 15 points in the last quarter to edge the Buffaloes 22 to 21 in a thriller. The Big Red defense held the Buffs to only 9 offensive plays in the last half to help the Panthers in their comeback victory.

The Buffaloes hit the scoreboard first on a 30 yard pass play from Jason Fleming to Donnie Dillard with 4:14 left in the first period to cap a 66 yard drive in 8 plays. Fleming booted the PAT and Cross Plains led 7-0.

But the Panthers took the ball on their own 49 following the kickoff and went the distance in 9 plays. Jeremy Sanders got the honors from 3 yards out with 11:56 left in the second quarter. Don Mauney kicked the point after to tie the score 7-7.

-GP-Kim Dean Speaks To Gorman School

During the halftime intermission the Panther Marching Band performed with the routine they were to use in the band contest and really brought applause from the fans. The Cross Plains Band also did an outstanding job during the halftime activities.

The Panthers must have really got pumped up during the halftime break as they came out ready to play in the third quarter. They started a drive on their own 49 following the kickoff, but the drive ended at the Cross Plains 14.

Then on their second possession after using almost all the entire time in the third quarter on the drive, the Panthers took the ball on their own 18 yard line and drove the distance in a long time-consuming drive covering the 82 yards in 10 plays with Marco Herrera catching a 34 yard pass from Don Mauney to set the Panthers up at the 12 yard line. Following runs of 6 and 5 yards, Jeremy Sanders got the score on a 1 yard run with 9:45 left in the game. Mauney booted the point after and the score went to 21-14.

The Buffaloes came back with a dri ve of their own, moving from their own 37 to the Gorman 13 yard line before fumbling the ball.

The Panthers then took the ball and moved 87 yards in 14 plays with Jeremy Sanders again getting the honors with a 6 yard run with just 1:20 left in the game. Scotty Walton then added the two points on a quarterback keeper to give the Big Red a 22 to 21 lead. The drive featured an 11 yard run by Walton; an 18 yard scamper by Don Mauney; and an 18 yard pass to Sanders from Mauney to set the ball up at the Cross Plains 15 yard line. On a fourth and goal play Sanders scored the TD. The Big Red defense then took over again as Cross Plains got the ball on their own 25 with 1:20 left. On the first play, the Buffaloes tried a pass, which was picked off by Jeremy Sanders and returned to the Cross Plains 2. The Panthers then ran out the clock and secured their first victory of the season. Brent Skaggs led the Panther defense with 8 tackles and also did an outstanding job of blocking for the offense to take Player of the Week honors, along with Don Mauney, who carried 26 times for 104 yards; passed 5 times for 65 yards, and also did a great job defensively for his honors. Besides the 26 for 104 yards by Mauney, Jeremy Sanders had 45 yards on 18 tries. Jason Monk had 23 on 4 carries; and Scotty Walton got 18 yards on 9 keepers. Walton's total was hurt by the Panthers kneeling down as they were killing the clock

Did you ever want to become a slave or a servant? If you grew up in the U.S.A. the answer is probably, no! Most of us always wanted to become famous or rich or both. At least we all wanted to be successful and thought of others waiting on us or working for us. Some of us have achieved those goals only to find out that we are the ones that are the servants or the slaves. It is amazing that no matter what your position in life, you find yourself a servant or slave to someone or something. Many of us, because of our feelings about the status of a slave or a servant, find this fact to be very irritating. We feel like we are better than that and because of our status, we should be the ones being served all the time.

It is not until you come to really know Jesus, do you find the true value in being a servant. Jesus says: "Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant" (Mark 10:43).
