Panthers End Season With Loss To Santo

The Gorman Panthers ended their season at Mineral Wells on Friday night when they lost a hard fought battle with the Santo Wildcats by the score of 30 to 20. The Panthers left it all on the field as they played their hearts out in the Bi-District playoff game.

The Wildcats showed their offensive punch right off as they took the kick off on their own 17 and went the distance in a time consuming drive of 83 yards in 13 plays with Brent Proctor scoring the first of his four TD's on a 13 yard run with 6:44 left in the period. Jeff Woodard kicked the point after and Santo led 7-0.

But the Panthers answered the Wildcats right back as they took kickoff on their own 22 and moved 78 yards in 8 plays with Don Mauney scoring the first of his 3 TD's of the night on a beautiful 35 yard scamper with 2:50 left in the period. Mauney booted the point after and the score was tied at 7-7. The drive featured a 4 yard first down run by Mauney; a 7 yarder for a first by Marco Herrera; and a 12 yard run for a first down at the Santo 35 by Paul Petree.

The Wildcats came right back for another score, going 70 yards in just 3 plays with Proctor breaking loose for a 65 yard scamper for the score with 1:25 left. Woodard added the point after and Santo was up 14-7.

The Panthers again answered the Santo score with a drive of their own as they got the ball on this own 28 and scored in 11 plays with Mauney getting the honors from 2 yards out with 8:05 left in the half. Don added the point after to tie the score at 14-14. The drive featured a 20 yard run by Mauney; 5 and 23 yarders for first downs by Marco Herrera; and a 9 yard run by Nick Guthery.

The Panthers drove from their own 21 to Santo territory but missed a long field goal try as time ended. The kick had the distance but sailed to the left and hit the upright and bounced back onto the field.

The Panther Marching Band put on a great performance at halftime and got a great ovation from the fans.

After the half the Panthers came out and started a drive on their own 31 that fell short at the Santo 46. They got another opportunity in the next possession by the Wildcats when Jason Johnson intercepted a Wildcat pass on the Gorman 33. However a 10 yard holding penalty stopped a Panther drive.

Then Santo came back for a drive of 62 yards in 10 plays with Proctor getting honors from 23 yards out with 11:25 left in the fourth period. Proctor added the two pointer on a run and the Wildcats were up 22 - 14.

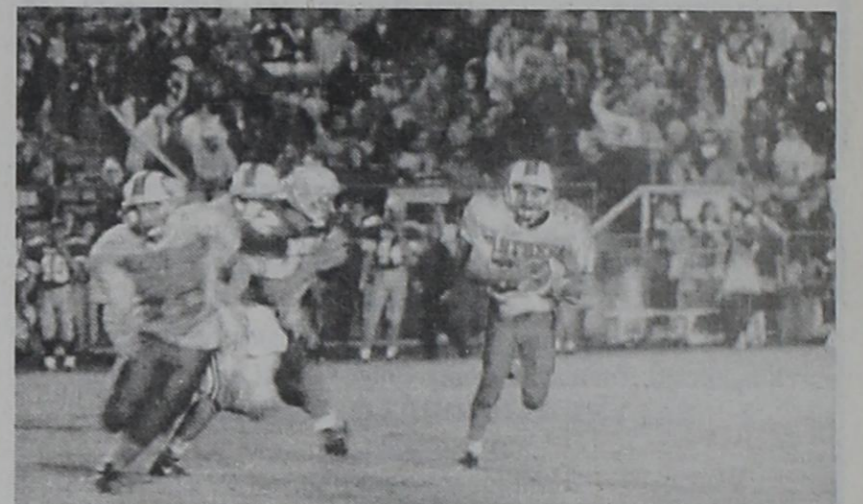
But the Panthers answered the Wildcat score with a drive of their own of 50 yards in 11 plays with Mauney getting the score from 4 yards out with 6:48 left. But the run for the 2 points play fell a little short and Santo still lead 22 to 20.

The Wildcats got another score to insure the victory with 5:18 left going 62 yards in just 5 plays with Proctor running it in from 15 yards out. Proctor again added the 2 points on a run and the Wildcats sealed the victory 30 to 20 and moved to the next round of the playoffs.

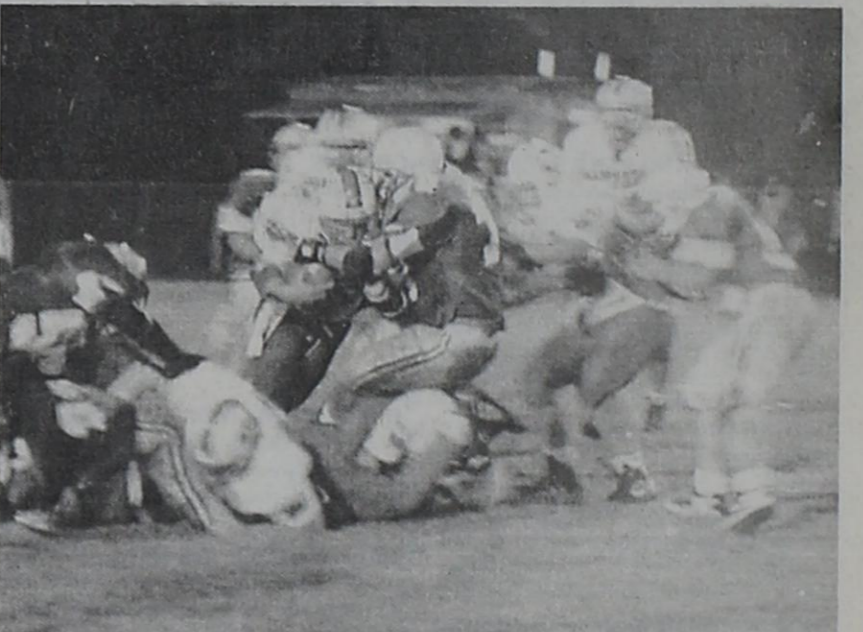
Mauney led the Panthers with 142 yards on 26 carries and caught 2 passes of 3 and 10. Marco Herrera had 100 yards on 21 times. Paul Petree got 51 on 7 carries and Nick Guthery wound up with a minus 1 on 4 keepers, but was caught for losses of 5 and 6 on pass tries.

The Panthers ended the season with this hard fought loss but have no reason to drop their heads as they have played some great battles this year and the fans are all very proud of their efforts.

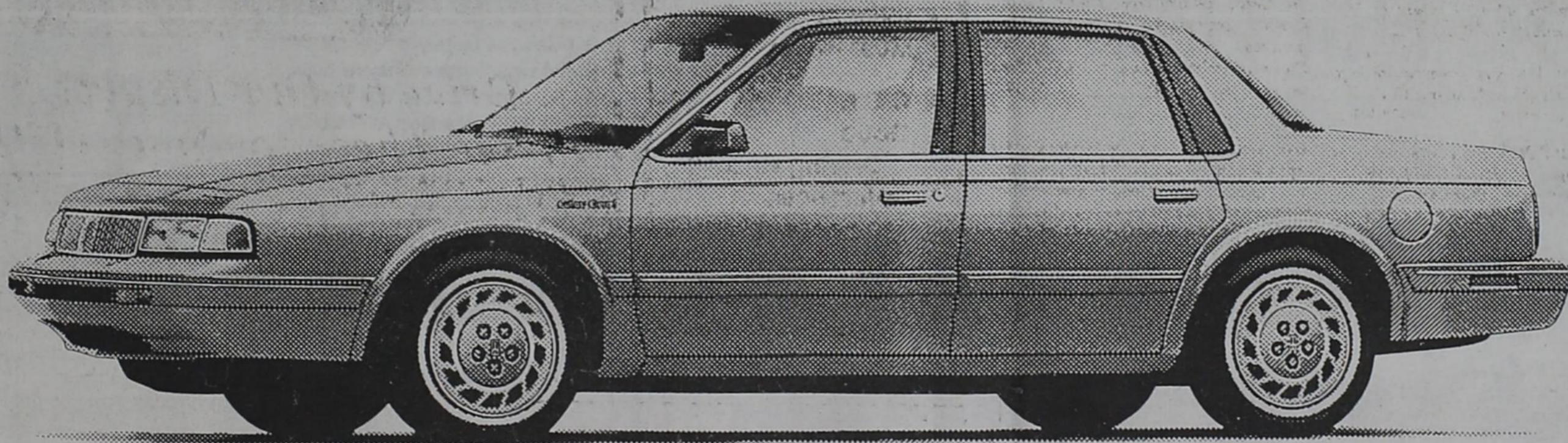

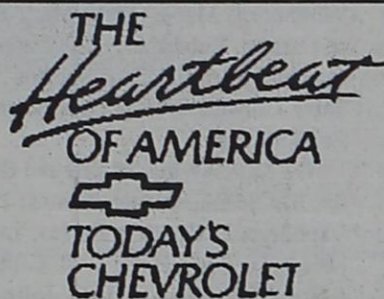

West Texas Meat Goat Conference Set For Nov. 22

Meat goats, West Texas' re-discovered natural resource, will be featured in Eldorado on November 22nd during the West Texas Meat Goat Conference in the Schleicher County Show Barn.

"Meat goats are enjoying more attention than ever before, thanks to an increased ethnic population, the general public's increased interest in leaner red meats and the introduction of the South African Boer Goat", said Dr. Frank Craddock, Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist in San Angelo.

"We've never seen anything quite like the strong, present goat prices. Once leveled out, they may be here to stay. Unlike many other animals fads, meat goats already have a viable and growing market. The problem now is getting enough goats of a certain age and type together to sustain a consistent level.

Meat goat profitability - how to make the most from what the producer already has - is the major purpose of the conference, he said.

"We're simply showing what options are out there and are drafting speakers who have successfully used these options," he added.

Highlights of the morning program include a three-part session on marketing goat meat from the buyer's, processor's, and retailer's perspectives and a two-part session on goat breeding and selection with emphasis on Spanish meat goat selection and intensive versus extensive breeding systems.

Following a goat barbecue lunch, the afternoon portion begins with association updates offered by the American Meat Goat Association, the American Boer Goat Association, the Mohair Council of America, and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. A research update on Spanish versus Spanish Boer crosses is also on tap.

The remainder of the day will be devoted to demonstrations of embryo transfer, transcervical and laproscopic artificial insemination (AI), semen collection, and ultrasound pregnancy detection.

Registration for the conference is \$10 and may be paid at the door.

TIPS ON HOW TO DEAL WITH RABID ANIMALS

More than one million deer hunters are expected in Texas this fall and winter. Many will head for the Texas Hill Country where deer may not provide their only wildlife encounter.

Fox rabies cases have been cropping up across much of the state's prime deer hunting area. Tom Green and McCulloch counties have been hardest hit with 69 and 67 animal cases confirmed this year, respectively.

Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in San Angelo, said that with a little common sense and caution the hunt shouldn't be spoiled.

"Odd behavior in wildlife should be your biggest red flag," he said. "Be aware of animals that don't show fear of humans. Any nocturnal animal seen during daylight hours should be suspect.

"If confronted, shoot the animal, but don't touch it unless there has been some human exposure. The Texas Department of Health receives a flood of specimens for testing. To lighten their load, don't send them more unless there's been a possible exposure.

"If bitten, treat the situation as if the animal were rabid. These tips offered by the health department could save your life."

- Identify the animal
- Immediately cleanse the wound with soap and water. Rinse and disinfect with alcohol, iodine or other disinfectant.
- See a doctor immediately. The physician will decide your best course of action.
- Report the incident to the local health officer and animal control agency.
- If possible, have the biting animal tested for rabies.

"If you are a bird hunter or run hounds, have your dogs vaccinated annually by a licensed veterinarian," Rollins said.

"There's other things to watch out for besides rabid animals," he added. "Don't be in such a hurry to enter your deer blind the first time. Cautiously check it out first. A lot of animals including snakes, bees, yellow jackets, spiders and even bats view these queer structures as prime nesting boxes."

"With a little horse sense this year's hunt should be the best yet."

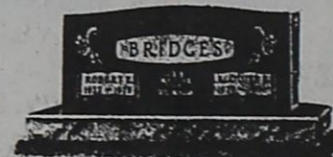

The store features an assortment of confections for snacks. Frequent visitors are school children at the noon hour and weekends.

Seating space is provided for visitors. A group of men meet each morning for fellowship.

Mr. Landers said he is the Nut who operates the Nut House, but he has help occasionally from his wife, Iva, and daughter Ora Beth Hicks of Bend, who manages the family ranch.

Their other daughter Lewvon Hicks lives in South Carolina.

Lewis stated he is happy serving the good people of the area.
