

Adopt-A-Highway Reminder FSA Announces New Crop Loss Coverage for Noninsurable Crops

The noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP) administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA) offers new and improved crop loss coverage opportunities beginning with crop year 2001.

"Unlike the old NAP, and other disaster programs that take time to implement, the new NAP program will provide immediate relief to farmers," said FSA's Eastland County Executive Director David martin. "Appraisers will inspect the damaged crops, the County Committee will review the claim and payments will be issued once the loss threshold is reached." NAP covers 50% of the producer's expected production at a payment rate equal to 55% of the crop's average market price. Benefits are limited to \$100,000 per crop year for each participant.

Since the 1995 crop year, FSA has offered NAP assistance for noninsurable crops each time a widespread catastrophic loss occurred due to damaging weather, Beginning with crop year 2001, availability of NAP benefits will be based on producers' individual crop losses, rather than on losses occurring in a large area. These guaranteed benefits, subject to a minimal administrative fee, will provide risk protection during the time when crops are most vulnerable and will be individualized based on the farmer's ability to produce the crop.

NAP covers all noninsurable, commercially grown crops produced for food and fiber, including honey, forage and grazing crops, turfgrass sod, Christmas trees, seed crops and aquaculture. Crops in Eastland County that would be eligible for NAP include watermelons, cantaloupes, other vegetable crops, pecans, hay and forage crops.

To be eligible for assistance, applicants must pay a nonrefundable administrative fee of \$100 per crop, per county. Fees are capped at \$300 per county not to exceed \$900 for farmers with interests in multiple counties.

Applicants are encouraged to provide prior years' production data to FSA to establish a documented yield history for loss calculations and payments. To be eligible for NAP, a farmer must have risk in producing the crop and must comply with a conservation plan. The applicant's gross income cannot exceed \$2 million.

FSA is currently accepting applications for NAP coverage for 2001 crops. Farmers who sustained weather-related crop damage to a 2001 NAP crop and timely reported acreage and losses may be eligible for coverage. The application period for 2001 crops will end 30 days after the Federal Regulations are published.

Jolene Gilliland age 85, passed away Thursday, July 12, 2001 at the Heritage Manor Nursing Home in Gorman.



Pause To Think

Hebrews 11 is known as the 'Faith' chpater. Paul started this chapter by saying; "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a good report. But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." Hebrews 11:1-2,6

In Hebrews 11, Paul lists many patriarchs of the Old Testament who had a record of pleasing God because of their great faith; Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Rahab the harlot, Gedeon, Barak, Samson, Jepthae, David, Samuel and the prophets.

Last week we discussed that fact that the word, 'faith', appears in the Old Testament two times, but in the New Testament it appears 245 times. The following is another interesting fact to consider. The word, 'believe', appears in the Old Testament 19 times, but it appears 123 times in the New Testament.

It is interesting to note that the first reference that God made with regard to people believing in Him is found in Numbers 14:11. And the LORD said unto Moses, How long will this people provoke me? and how long will it be ere they believe me, for all the signs which I have shewed among them? We discover that God was angry with the people because they chose to believe the evil report of the ten spies with regard to the 'Promised Land' that God had promised to give to the Children of Israel. When Joshua and Caleb tried to convince the people that the land was a good land and that God would not fail to bring them into it victoriously, the people were ready to stone them with stones. This incident incited God to say, "How long will it be ere they believe me."

This incident appears to be the first occurrence of God's people refusing to take Him at His Word. They chose to believe an evil report instead of a good report. As time progresses on, it seemed that more and more references had to be made with regard to believing God and having faith in him.

The Old Testament was a history lesson with types and shadows as well as prophecy, written so that we could understand, perceive and receive the things that God has reserved for our time. Why did God feel that so many references to faith and believing had to be made in the New Testament?

Could it be related to the statement made in the following passage? Luke 18:8, Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh, shall he find faith on the earth?



Possum Kingdom Lake

As the vice-chair of the House Committee on Economic Development, I know all too well the devastating effects that incorrect information and unwarranted fear can have on local businesses. A recent example of this can be seen at Possum Kingdom Lake where earlier this year, biologists identified a large bloom of a golden alga which is deadly to certain types of fish.

Officials with the Texas Department of Health say that golden alga is not harmful or even toxic to humans, so it will not hurt you to swim in the water even if you accidentally swallow some. In fact, they report that fish caught in the lake are safe to eat. However, while there is no documentation of the alga causing a rash or any other health problems in people or other animals, the business-owners that depend on visiting travelers for their financial livelihoods are suffering from the bad publicity that has occurred since the story first broke.

With a geography that ranges from breathtaking cliffs to lush parkland and sandy beaches, Possum Kingdom is one of the most beautiful lakes in Texas. It has a variety of activities including fishing, boating, scuba diving, camping, hiking, horseback riding, and golf. So, while the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department continues its effort to re-stock the lake, I encourage the people of District 60 to lend their support to the residents and businesses at Possum Kingdom by spreading the word on the many positive attributes of the lake.






